From the Minister

If you would like to meet a modern day UU hero then come to our Sunday evening service, September 25th, 7pm. Our speaker will be the Reverend Mark Kiyimba. Rev. Kiyimba, a citizen of Uganda, trained to be a Minister in an evangelical tradition. Then he discovered Unitarian Universalism. It inspired him to create two Unitarian Universalist churches in Uganda (one in Kampala and one in Masaka), an orphanage for children whose parents have died of AIDS, and a school (New Life School) for children grades one to eight who otherwise would have no school to attend. You can learn about his work by visiting “ugandaunitarian.org”. They are liberal Christians within a UU framework. Recently Rev. Kiyimba had to leave the country (not permanently but until things “cooled down”) because of his outspoken support of the gay and lesbian community in Uganda. His churches empower women and reach across tribal boundaries.

I met Mark while I was serving a Unitarian Church in London, England. His work deeply impressed us and the church became partnered with his church in Masaka. One of our members travelled there and saw Rev. Kiyimba’s work first hand. It is remarkable. With very little money or resources great things have been accomplished. Now the Unitarian Universalist Partner Church organization, based here in the US, has become involved. To provide on-going funding for the school and orphanage, each grade (grades 1-8) has been paired with a USA UU congregation. It is an honor that we have been paired with the 1st grade (turning into second grade in January of 2012). Our children will be “pen pals” with their children and our church will contribute \$2,500 yearly. All the financial mechanisms have been put in place for the safe transfer of funding.

One thing that Mark said to me really struck me: “You English and American Unitarians don’t know how lucky you are. You take your religion for granted while we celebrate it.” Our on-going connection with the New Life School and UU’ism in Uganda can be a source of renewed inspiration for all of us.

Religious Education News

Meet Our New Religious Education Assistant

We are proud to announce that Kate Parker-O'Toole has joined the Religious Education team as our new RE Assistant. In this very part-time position, Kate will provide support to RE teachers after class, make sure that supplies are available for upcoming lessons, make sure parents have information about what is happening in their child's RE class, and keep our bulletin boards looking spiffy. All in four hours per week!

In the past, Kate, a gifted graphic designer, has created several beautiful posters and brochures for the church. She has taught in our RE program for many years and served on the Religious Education Committee for the past year. We feel lucky that she will be sharing all her skills – and her contagious enthusiasm about religious education – in her new role as RE Assistant. Welcome Kate!

Sunday Morning Religious Education for Children and Youth

Please mark your calendars: our religious education program begins on Sunday, September 18. We'll welcome old and new friends, make name tags, and decide how we want to be together (by making a covenant with one another). Then, on Sunday, September 25, we'll dive into our curriculum.

Children in Preschool (ages 3 and up) and Kindergarteners will meet in Program C. They will be exploring everything amazing about themselves, their families, their church, and the natural world through Celebrating Me and My World. Fall classes focus on their senses, their bodies, and all the wonderful things that they can do. Look forward to spellbinding stories, active games, colorful art projects, and energetic dance and movement in Program C.

Children in Grades 1, 2, and 3 will meet in Program B. They will be looking to the constellations in the night sky as they explore the metaphor of being guided by the stars –with the curriculum Love Will Guide Us. Each session will explore the many sources of our faith – the sense of wonder, the women and men of long ago and today whose lives remind us to be kind and fair, the ethical and spiritual wisdom of the world's religions, Jewish and Christian teachings which tell us to love all others as we love ourselves, the use of reason and the discoveries of science, the harmony of nature and the sacred circle of life, and examples of faithful belief and action from our Unitarian and Universalist heritage. Storytelling, costume-box theatre, active games, cool interstellar art projects, and much more.

Children in Grades 4 and 5 will meet in Program A. They will be continuing their exploration of "covenant" -- of their connections and responsibility to each other, the church, the larger community, and the world with the curriculum Love Connects Us. Expect more activities involving yarn, rope, embroidery floss, and other things that can be tied, looped, knotted, and otherwise connected as we play games, make things, and worship together.

Youth in grades 6, 7, and 8 – the Junior Youth – will meet in the Library. For the first 7 weeks, they will explore the rituals and meaning of Coming of Age in Judaism, Catholicism, and Unitarian Universalism. Guests from these traditions will lead discussions and answer questions.

YEAH -- YOUTH EVENTS BEGIN!

Senior Youth Group begins on Sunday, Sept. 11 from 5 to 7 PM. All high school age youth are welcome to join us in planning for weekly meetings, overnights, retreats, youth worship, congregational events and social action projects. We want everyone there!

Junior Youth Fellowship will meet Friday, Sept. 30 at church from 7 to 9 PM for fellowship, fun, food and games! JYF meets once a month for a variety of activities that include conversations, questions, caring, and lots of laughter. All sixth, seventh and eighth graders are welcome.

Small Group Ministry for Youth will meet on Sunday, Oct. 2nd from 10:45 to 11:30 in the Minister's Study. This is an opportunity for youth to gather with a focus on deep listening and greater sharing as they worship together and reflect on their spiritual lives. These meetings are facilitated by the youth participants, and continue on the first Sunday of each month.

All youth activities are anchored in mutual respect, youth empowerment, leadership development, spiritual exploration and lots of fun!

Social Justice Update - September 2011

UCS Response to Crisis in Somalia - At the August planning meeting of the Social Justice Steering Committee, it was apparent to all present that the unfolding humanitarian crisis in Somalia was a situation that required prompt action; one which could not wait for the resumption of the fall schedule of Sunday services. By a unanimous vote, we determined to release \$500 from the newly created Shopping for Justice fund to be sent to the UUSC Somalia and East Africa Relief Fund. We know that the impact of this donation via the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee will provide prompt relief via proven and effective channels. While we have been pleased with the growth of the Shopping for Justice fund to well over \$2,000, which has meant the church has not had to loan the program as much money to help launch this new effort to address hunger and homelessness, we felt that it was very appropriate to make a substantial donation to the Somalia crisis from this resource. With your help, we will continue to build this fund in the weeks and months ahead, and we have already begun using it to pay for our ongoing MainSpring House food programs.

Once the new church year begins, we will designate the September "**Brown Envelope**" collections to further our help to the starving refugees in Somalia and East Africa. This will allow you to make additional personal donations as you see fit, but now you also know that the church community has already made an important donation on your behalf. Thank you for your continued support of the many causes that the Social Justice Steering Committee brings to your attention each month - sadly, there is never a shortage of worthwhile needs, both here at home, and across the world. Together, we are making a difference.

We will continue to sell **Fair Trade** coffees, teas and chocolates during the coffee hour on Sundays in the new church year. We will also be selling these fine products at the new Coffee House program to start on October 15th. **Shopping for Justice** gift cards will be available for purchase every Sunday during coffee

hour for Shaws, Stop & Shop and Hannafords. Thank you for purchasing these cards and making a difference towards homelessness and hunger with your grocery shopping. And, can food donations for the Ilse Marks' **Sharon-Stoughton Food Pantry** may be dropped off in the collection box in the church entry. We will ensure that they are delivered.
