October 4: Service is Our Prayer

We say each Sunday in our covenant that "service is our prayer". We will explore what this means and how each one of us can find our way to serve. Finding our authentic way to serve others is a key ingredient for personal meaning and deep joy.

October 11: Neurotheology

Neurotheology is the scientific study of spiritual and religious experience. Using modern techniques like EEG, MRI, and social science surveys, we can get an objective understanding of the value of religious and spiritual practices.

October 18: Black Lives Matter

Pastor Lois Adams of the First Baptist Church of Sharon and our Minister Jim Robinson will be exchanging pulpits this morning. Pastor Adams, who is African American, will speak about the message of the Black Lives Matter movement.

October 25: White Privilege

Our democratic ideal is that everyone has human dignity and people should be able to get ahead by hard work. The reality of America is that certain groups have an easier time getting ahead, not by their merit, but by their gender, class, sexual orientation, or another quality. This service will focus on the reality of white privilege in America and how we can dismantle it.

During October Sunday services, our brown envelope collections will go entirely to the UUSC refugee crisis fund.

The 10:30am service on Oct. 18 will focus on Black Lives Matter and the service on Oct. 25 will focus on White Privilege. The movie night on Oct. 9 will feature the movie Selma. The movie night on Oct. 23 will feature the movie "White Man's Burden". We have purchased copies of "Just Mercy" (our UUA common read book) and will discuss it on Oct. 25.



From the Director of Religious Education

You are your child's primary religious educator

Parenting has gotten a lot more fraught over the past 30 years. The number of activities in which children can participate has exploded. Adults also typically work longer hours than they did 30 years ago. Parents are busier than they've ever been.

The RE Committee and I have been discussing how to support busy parents in their role as their child's primary religious educator. No, we're NOT suggesting that you need to start using flash cards at home to drill the 7 principles into your child's head. NO! We ARE thinking about how to support you in sharing your values with your child and in helping your children find their inner compass and learn how they can respond compassionately to a hurting world.

Some things are not easy to talk about. It's possible that our families of origin never talked about them – so we have no template for how to discuss and explore these topics with our own children. What is a good way to talk about sexuality? about the state of racial injustice in our country? about the meaning of social justice and what to do about it?

The questions go on: What is age appropriate? Why or why not? What resources could I use to open up a discussion with my child? How can I tell if it's too much for my child right now? I don't know much about this stuff myself – is there a nottoo-overwhelming place for me to get started?

Whoa! It's starting to feel overwhelming. Time to recenter ourselves with our UU song:

It's a blessing we were born and it matters what we do. What we know about the holy is a piece of the truth. Let the beauty we love be what we do, And we don't have to do it alone.

We don't have to do it alone. We have each other's support and compassion – we have the love of this community to lean into – as we begin to explore these challenging questions. What we need to do now is discover where to begin. What would you like to explore? We can find a way to do this that is supportive, affirming, and energizing.

The RE Committee and I will be reaching out to you by email for your input. Feel free to reach out to us with your ideas. Together we can begin this gentle journey.

What's Happening in Religious Education


October will find our Preschool-Kindergarten students talking about making friends and how to make their group a friendly and welcoming place. They will spend a session experiencing the wonder of interacting with nature and learn that each tree is special. The class will have a Halloween themed session where it is explained that the images and costumes are fun and not to be feared while the children make their own masks. They'll end the month learning about caring for others.

The Grade 1-2 class will complete their threshold themed session by decorating their classroom threshold. The students will discuss faith symbols while being introduced to the UU symbols the chalice and the hymn "Spirit of Life." The class will also learn about Henry David Thoreau as they explore our connections to nature. Learning about bees will illustrate how our family homes and those of animals have commonalities. Their class ritual of using the sundial will continue as well.

During October the Grade 3-4 class will be introduced to some of the Sources of UU faith. The class will continue to use the theme of the night sky and one session will focus on experiencing the wonder and awe of nature and themselves as a part of nature. They will hear a story about Jesus and discuss loving others as you love yourself, as well as what it means to be a part of a community. The sessions at months end will focus on death, the circle of life, and the eternal nature of love. The students will create memory flowers, and learn about some UU rituals such as the memorial garden where they will plant some bulbs.

A central theme for the grade 5-6 group is "windows and mirrors." This month they'll begin a long-term project of creating window/mirror panels which will reflect how each participant sees him/herself and share their thoughts and experiences, but the panels will also act as windows showing others who the students are. During October the class will discuss the relevance and meaning of church attendance, explore the importance of our faith heritages, learn about forgiveness, and reflect on the UU belief that we do not need to be perfect to be loved, respected and appreciated for our unique gifts.

An apt theme for this month leading up to All Souls Day is death, and the Grade 7-8 group will explore this theme in sessions that discuss what death means to us, our society and culture. They will hear stories from those who have experienced losing someone, and examine beliefs about life after death. The concepts of heaven and hell will be discussed, and the students will be asked to think about what it means to live a "full" life. The final session this month will be dedicated to learning about and creating altars for the dead to honor a connection to a lost loved one.

> "The Middle East and the Refugee Crisis" Presenter Stuart Sears, PhD

Stuart Sears is an Arabic language and cultural scholar who received his PhD from the University of Chicago in Arabic and Islamic Studies. He is Co-Founder of the Arabic Language Associate and formerly Professor at the American School in Cairo, Egypt.

Professor Sears will describe the current situation in the Middle East and its relation to the refugee crisis.

Accessibility and Improvements to the Meetinghouse II

We are getting ready to move into the schematic design phase of the project. We need to come to terms on the contract and cost for this with HKT before we proceed.

In the schematic design phase, HKT Architects will create several renderings of conceptual plans that address the topics that we have raised with them for the revitalization of the sanctuary. These plans will present:

Develop options for seating arrangements Options for accessibility Options for windows Options for ceiling Options for AV systems and configurations Schematic HVAC and Fire Protection

The plans will be reviewed first with the AIM committee and then they will be presented to the congregation in one or more workshops to get your feedback on the alternatives presented. Ultimately, once we have been able to agree on a set of options that we want to carry forward, HKT will prepare a final schematic design and updated set of cost estimates.

Racial Equality – UCS will focus two consecutive worship services in October on improving racial equality in our communities and country. On October 18th, Rev. Lois Adams will share her perspectives on why Black Lives Matter. On October 25th, Rev. Jim Robinson will speak on "white privilege". Plan to attend these two thought-provoking services.

The Brown Envelope offerings for October will be directed to the **UUSC-UUA Refugee Crisis Fund**. Donations to this Fund will go directly to our UU partners operating on the ground in countries receiving refugees. A portion of the funds will also be channeled through the Hungarian Unitarian Church to the Hungarian Interchurch Aid.

Clothing Collection – Rory McGregor has offered to spearhead another Clothing Collection for new immigrant families. The clothing will be distributed through the Chelsea Collaborative. These families need good quality used or new items of clothing of all sizes, especially warm clothing. Donation boxes will be available on Sunday mornings in the Vestry from October 11th through November 22nd. Please help these families stay warm this winter. Thank you!
