We celebrate the beginning of a new church year with our annual intergenerational water communion service. You are invited to pour water into a common bowl (water which you brought with you or is provided in a pitcher for you) and share about an important place or event from your summer. At the end of the service we will use the water to bless each other and our spiritual community.

The themes of the Jewish High Holy Days are important and universal: self examination, making amends, reconciliation, and gratitude. We will explore these themes individually and as a community.

Sept. 27 (10am and 10:30am): Partnership Sunday

This Sunday we celebrate our long standing partnership with a small Unitarian congregation in Transylvania. Colleen Tuck visited our partner church recently and will tell us about her experience. And we will also celebrate our new partnership with the John Pounds Memorial Unitarian Church of Portsmouth, United Kingdom. Two visitors from the Portsmouth UK Unitarian Church will share about their congregations interesting history and what the congregation is like today.



From the Minister

Life is full of wonderful surprises!

During my years serving a Unitarian chapel in London, England, I had the opportunity to visit many other UK Unitarian congregations. One of my favorites was located a 90 minute train ride south of London, along the English Channel, in the city of Portsmouth. I was invited to preach at the Unitarian Church in Portsmouth this past summer. I mentioned to them that there was now an official program, sponsored by the UU Partner Church Council, pairing US and UK Unitarian congregations.

After the service they invited me to attend their annual meeting. During the meeting a motion was made and unanimously passed (with great cheering) to ask the Unitarian Church of Sharon to partner with them. Such a lovely surprise! I brought this request to our Board of Trustees at their August meeting and they unanimously approved the partnership.

At the September 27 service we will begin this partnership by hearing from two members of the Portsmouth Unitarian Church (officially named the John Pounds Memorial Unitarian Church). There is no financial cost, on either side, for this partnership. And because everyone speaks English it means you can easily become an internet "pen pal" with a British Unitarian (email, skype, facebook, facetime, etc.). So this partnership promises to be a lot of fun while encouraging us to understand Unitarianism as a world-wide movement. Presidential Ponderings

The "Nones" are coming!

I've been preparing for a speech at work on People without Religion. One of the topics I will want to talk about will be the "Nones". The Nones got that name because on surveys, when it asked about Religion, they checked "none of these". They are sub-grouped into Atheist, Agnostic, Secular unaffiliated, and Religious unaffiliated classes. The number of Nones has increased steadily over the years and there is finally about 15% of the country and 25% of the people between the ages of 19 and 29 fitting into that category.

The Pew Research Center looked into their makeup. About 30% of the Nones are religious people that haven't found a church they like or don't think they need a church. That leaves 70% which either don't believe in a religion, are unsure, or think it is unimportant. About 40% of the Nones think religion is unimportant and 31% are either atheist or agnostic. The non-religious classes have been increasing year to year especially among the younger adults. What this means, as the Pew Center folks say, "Fully on-in-four adults under the age of 30 (25%) are unaffiliated, describing their religion as "atheist" "agnostic" or "nothing in particular". As an atheist I am happy to see our numbers growing. This may indicate increased acceptance for us in this country. Although UU's as a group are very accepting, other places aren't. Seven states won't let atheists hold public office. In a University of Minnesota survey atheists were at the bottom when people were asked "would they let [type of person] marry their daughter?". There is a seemingly unending battle between state-funded entities trying to impose their religious practices on non-believers and the non-believers with the media often unsympathetic, if not hostile, to the non-believer's position. Outside of our country there are seventeen countries that can execute someone for atheism. Let's hope non-believers can gain the increased acceptance that other previously disfavored groups have made through their increased presence.

What's Happening in Religious Education

Welcome to all our Religious Education students! Classes begin on September 20th, and the RE department is excited to catch up with familiar faces and greet new ones as we dive into a fresh year of discovery, reflection and fun!

Our first session will include welcome to RE activities such as making nametags, discussing class covenants and just getting acquainted with one another and our surroundings.

The second session will find the **Preschool - Kindergarten** students making "me" collages as they discuss how everyone is unique and important. They'll identify ways they are special and talk about the importance of being kind and friendly.

Grade 1-2 will embark on a session that introduces the students to the symbols and rituals that will be part of their future sessions. The class will explore the term "threshold" as a place of entrance and exit where journeys begin and end. The students will decorate name stones and will experience journeying while remaining at "home" in the classroom

The **Grade 3-4** curriculum begins with the idea that love is an unseen, guiding force unfolding in the universe. The students will be introduced to sources of UU faith with an emphasis on love. They will hear the story "The Everything Seed," and create a universe seed art project.

The **Grade 5-6** students will explore how individuality creates a lens through which we view everyone and everything. They'll hear a story about Charles Darwin and talk about being true to oneself. Their art project will consist of creating two self-portraits; one portraying how other see them and the other of how they see themselves.

The theme for **Grade 7-8** will be transitions, and they will talk about change as a growth experience. Their activities will illustrate that change is inevitable and can be sought after or unexpected, exciting or scary, but that even unwanted changes can lead to positive growth.

Special Message to the Parent of 3rd and 4th Graders

Your child's enjoyment of their Sunday morning RE lessons will be enhanced if he or she has the opportunity to explore the natural world from home. **The first exercise:** collecting cool stuff from the woods and keeping it in a shoe box at home. Things to collect could include: pieces of bark, twigs, dried leaves, dead bugs, little stones, acorns, epiphytes and tree lichen, pine needles, seed pods, etc. We will use these natural materials at church later this year. Please contact Louise Marcoux if you need a shoe box (or if you have extra shoe boxes that you're willing to donate to the church).

The night sky will also be a touchstone metaphor for this class. Every week, we'll be talking about how the North Star helps people find their way and about how love is our North Star. See if you can find the Big Dipper from your backyard. Can you recognize any other constellations? As the sky darkens earlier and earlier, you'll have more opportunities to check out the night sky with your child.

If your child will participate in Sunday morning classes, nursery care, youth group activities (including the retreat or CONs), Our Whole Lives, or Com-

ing of Age, we ask that you register your child in the RE program. Registration helps us take good care of your child at church because we'll know about allergies or other special needs, whether we are allowed to take your child on local walking trips on Sunday morning or post photos of your child on a bulletin board or on our web site.

You can register online at www.uusharon.org. Or you can register on paper: forms are in the rack outside the church office. Fees: \$40 for one child, \$60 for 2 or more children. Fees can be waived; please see Louise Marcoux or the Rev. Jim Robinson for a scholarship.

Honoring our Partner Church Service - On September 27th, Colleen Tuck will share her experiences visiting with our partner church in Gyulakuta, Romania. UCS has a long standing partnership with this small congregation, through the work of the Unitarian Universalist Partner Church Council that helps support these fellowships and fosters ties with fellow UU's in Transylvania and around the world.

Brown Envelope offerings for September will help this rural congregation stay connected with the larger UU world through subscriptions to the Transylvanian Unitarian magazine and create a scholarship for one of the members to attend High School, which is tuition based in Romania.

UUA Common Read for 2015-2016 - We invite you to join the social justice committee members in reading the New York Times Bestseller, "Just Mercy", by Bryan Stevenson in September and then participate in discussions with other readers in October. We will have copies of the book available to share in September at the social justice corner during coffee hour. The book is also available at Amazon and is likely at your local library. It the desire of the social justice committee that reading and discussing this book together will gives us a shared experience, shared language towards justice, and a basis for meaningful conversations together.

Michelle Alexander, author of The New Jim Crow, (UUA Common Read 2012-13) states: "Bryan Stevenson is one of my personal heroes, perhaps the most inspiring and influential crusader for justice alive today, and "JUST MERCY" is extraordinary. The stories told within these pages hold the potential to transform what we think we mean when we talk about justice"

This will be a showing of the Ware lecture by Cornell West from the UUA General Assembly in June.
