Sunday, Nov. 22, 7pm at Our Lady of Sorrows, 59 Cottage Street, Sharon

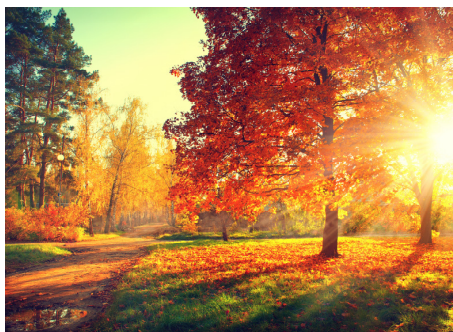

Gratitude and Survival

It is commonly said that the Pilgrims celebrated Thanksgiving because they were grateful to have survived the harsh winter. But I think a deeper understanding is that they were able to survive the harsh winter because they had an attitude of gratitude which kept them going, even during the darkest hours. Humanity is in a similar situation today. The scientific models predicting the results of global warming range from painfully difficult (if we cut back carbon emissions) to human extinction (if we do nothing). From Nov. 30 to Dec. 11 the United Nations is sponsoring a Climate Change Conference in Paris, France. The objective is to realize a legally binding agreement on climate to which all the nations in the world sign up to. This is an opportunity to save humanity. It means we must choose gratitude over greed, humility over grandiosity. When we are deeply grateful we don't need a lot of stuff. We don't need a lot of carbon emissions. We already know what joy is. But if we lack gratitude we forever have a hole in our heart and try to fill it up with more and more stuff requiring carbon emissions. So let's be grateful and work towards the survival of the human community.

November in Religious Education

Stories of darkness and light have been told by many different people all over the world, so as we enter the dark time of year the Religious Education classes will focus on the special stories and traditions associated with this season. The month of November will be filled with exploration and preparation as we approach Revels on December 13th.

Preschool-Kindergarten will be learning the story of the baby born in the barn and the children will create their own barn complete with animals to share with the congregation in December.

Grade 1-2 will be exploring our relationship with the life-giving power of the sun. Their focus will be on the lifecycle of the sunflower, and as they create their own flowers and learn a seed scattering dance, they will be preparing to share all they are learning at Revels.

Grade 3-4 will explore the stories and traditions of both Hanukkah and Yule. They will hear the story of Hanukkah and learn about lighting the Menorah, and then they will dive into Yule traditions such as decking the halls, creating the wheel of the year for Revels. Throughout November the students will also learn more about our Revels celebration and what it means to lead worship.

Grade 5-6 will continue the tradition of the story in the dark. The story they will share this year is "How Hummingbird Got His Red Throat." Their month will be filled with storyboards and puppet building while they prepare their shadow puppet presentation for Revels.

Grade 7-8 will focus on Santa Lucia. The group will learn about coming of age traditions in other cultures, and will prepare to share the Swedish traditions when they lead worship with their fellow RE students on December 13th.

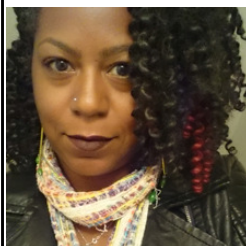

Emergency Preparedness: How to evacuate the building

If the fire alarm goes off during worship, everyone in the sanctuary should leave the building by the nearest exit. This includes parents. All should gather on the side lawn and await instruction from emergency responders. Once the emergency responders have given the all-clear, parents may pick up their children from the RE caretakers at the meeting point.

Religious education volunteers and childcare staff are trained in evacuation procedures. They will escort all children in their care out of the building. They will assemble their groups at the meeting point by the shed and the playground fence. There they'll re-take attendance and await instruction from emergency responders. Once the all clear sounds, they will be ready to turn children over to the care of their parents.

Partnership Updates



The Unitarian Church of Sharon has two “partner Unitarian churches”: the Gyulakuta Unitarian Fellowship in Transylvania, Romania and the John Pounds Memorial Unitarian Church in Portsmouth, England, UK. In September our brown envelope collection was for aid to the Gyulakuta Unitarian Fellowship. It is a small Unitarian community without a church building and where the average cash income is just a few dollars a day. We raised and sent them \$761. Of this, \$300 will be for a scholarship for their one teenage youth to attend high school, and the other \$461 will be for whatever needs they deem most important.....At our recent Sept. 27 service we celebrated a new partnership (or “twinning” in British English) with the Unitarian Church in Portsmouth, England. Two members of the Portsmouth Church spoke that morning to us. They brought back a list of UCS folks who signed up to be internet “pen pals” and they are working on making those connections. They have about sixty members and you can learn about them by googling their name. The photo on the left is of the interior of the John Pounds Memorial Unitarian Church.

When Are You Coming Back?

This was the question asked by our Partner Church in Gyulakuta, Romania when Paul and I, the McGregors, and David Nelson visited four years ago. This September, I revisited the friends we made then and received the same warm welcome. This was also an opportunity to present David with his scholarship. Public schools in Romania are very poor, so all parents try to send their children to competitive high schools. There are many expenses: uniforms, books and supplies, tuition, boarding costs and transportation. David’s mother has lost her teaching position because of health issues, so this financial assistance is tremendously welcome.

I also had an opportunity to meet the congregation’s new minister, Rev. Lorant Tokes, and his delightful family. Over a delicious dinner, he and I talked about his hopes for his ministry in Gyulakuta and the needs of our partner congregation, which is small and aging. David is the only remaining youth; young people leave for an education and there few employment opportunities after they graduate.

Transylvania is very rural, but its lack of development means its historic villages are still beautiful and unspoiled; many are UNESCO heritage sites. The UU Partner Church Council arranged the details of my stay: a car and a driver who spoke excellent English and seemed to know the Unitarian minister in every village. David served as my translator, and we had a memorable time. (The UUPCC was also there to help when the ATM ate my bank card!)

Transylvania is also part of our religious heritage. During the Reformation/Inquisition, Unitarianism was ruthlessly extinguished in Italy, Poland and the Netherlands. But in Transylvania, on the edge of the Ottoman Empire, was it able to survive under the protection of the sultans, who wanted trouble-free borders. After centuries, it gradually spread westward.

“When are you coming back?” I was asked again. I promised that I will return for David’s graduation in 2020. I am hoping that when I do, I will be traveling with some of you, enjoying the beautiful countryside, the historic Unitarian churches, and the warm hospitality of our Partner Church.
