December 6: **Celebrating Hope**
10am (family service) and 10:30am (adult service)

This Sunday we will tell the stories and sing the songs of the great December Holy Days: Hannukah (Judaism), Bohdi Day (Buddhism), Solstice (Pagan), Mawlid Alnabi (Islam), and Christmas (Christian). When the days get dark and air gets cold, we light candles, tell stories, and sing songs of hope.

December 13: **Revels: Finding Light in Darkness**
10:15am (one service only)

Children and youth lead us in a multisensory exploration of the stories of the dark time of the year: the baby born in the barn; the wheel of the year; the miracle of the extra-long-burning oil; how hummingbird got his red throat. We'll join others across the globe in a special celebration: December 13 is Santa Lucia Day.

December 20: **Christmas**
10:15am (one service only)

All ages will begin the service together for a Christmas message. Then the children will leave for a one room school house, while the adults remain for a Christmas sermon in the Unitarian tradition.

December 24: **CHRISTMAS EVE CANDLE LIGHT SERVICES**
4:30pm, 6pm, and 7:30pm



Due to serious overcrowding last year, we will hold three traditional Christmas Eve Candle Light services. They will all include the same candle lighting ceremony. The 7:30pm service will be more contemplative. This is one of the loveliest services of our entire church year. What is better than a traditional Christmas Eve candle service on the Town Green! This year there will be plenty of room so bring all your friends and family along.

December 27: **The Serenity Prayer**
10:15am (one service only)

As one year draws to a close and a new one approaches, it seems like an apt time to explore the Serenity Prayer and what it means for all of us, theists and humanists alike.

The Five Point Cluster is composed of Unitarian Universalist Churches in Canton, Foxborough, N. Easton, Sharon, and Stoughton. On Dec. 27th UU's from the Five Point Cluster churches are invited to a special musical service at the Unity UU Church in N. Easton, 9 Main Street, North Easton, starting at 10:30am. This is a chance to visit a different UU sanctuary and meet UU's from the five different congregations.

From the Minister

December is meant to be a time of hope. As the days grow dark, we light candles. As the days grow cold, we celebrate with Holy Days. And this is certainly a year when we need hope. We face terrorism in Paris, Mali, Israel, Iraq (and many more countries). We watch our world leaders make promises at the United Nations Climate Change Conference and worry whether humanity has the will to save itself. We watch the doors being closed to the resettlement of millions of refugees without any solution to the carnage in Syria (from which most of them fled). Added to this are the personal problems we each are facing, for as Plato wrote: "Everyone is fighting a hard battle." So for encouragement, in December we tell a story about a light burning eight days in an ancient Temple (freedom), a story about a peasant child being born in a manger (love), and a story about the return of the sun after the longest night (hope). At this moment in time we must hold two truths simultaneously: the world is a painful mess and there is great hope and love. We gather in spiritual community to renew our hope and love, so we can realistically and effectively work for a more humane world.

Presidential Ponderings

I had a nice day on the second of recent holidays where we find that the story of its origin was not what we were taught in school. Columbus Day celebrates a man who did some nasty things and had little to brag about other than a sense of adventure. Now more and more we hear that the first Thanksgiving wasn't all that great and by that I mean more than just no apple pie. It seems the Pilgrims were not looking for just religious freedom but also for a place to establish their idea of a religious society. The New England natives were familiar with foreigners as trading partners. Squanto (not his real name) had been to Europe for many years, initially and unsuccessfully to be sold into slavery. He eventually made his way back to Massachusetts to find that all of his village and about three quarters of his tribe had died in a recent epidemic allegedly brought on by contact with Europeans. The nearby tribe, the Narraganset, was unaffected by the disease and were a threat to the now much smaller Wampanoag, Squanto's tribe. Previously only liking Europeans in small doses, the Wampanoag saw a tactical advantage in allying with the Pilgrims with Squanto as an intermediary so let them settle. What happened after that is another story.

I don't know about you but I find conflicting accounts of history quite frustrating. The above sounds reasonable but how do I know it is true? I liked and believed the story of happy Pilgrims and Wampanoag when I was a kid. There are efforts, largely starting in Texas since they are a huge buyer of textbooks, to print textbooks indicating that the European colonization of North America was a noble venture and done honorably even though it wasn't always done that way. Efforts like this make one aware of the power history can hold over the present. All I can say is to take announced changes in history carefully. Look for multiple reliable sources and be prepared to be disappointed. You may also need to find better reasons to enjoy holidays, for example Thanksgiving can be a harvest festival where we thank whomever or whatever we think has helped us survive and hopefully prosper. However you celebrated it, I hope you had a happy Thanksgiving.

Parent-Child Communication: The music matters

The parent of a 4 year old proudly states, “I told my child he can ask me anything.” For this parent, keeping the channels of communication open between parent and child was crucial in order to share dearly-held values with her child. It’s an important aspiration. And it’s complicated. Because it means that she gets to field questions about everything from where babies come from and why the sky is blue to less fun topics like war, terrorism, poverty, racism, pornography, etc.

So how do we respond when a little voice pipes up from the back seat – or when a no-longer-little voice calls us to account for the hypocrisies of this world?

The music matters. That’s what I gleaned from the video that we watched at our recent *Our Whole Lives* parent meeting. A woman in the video described what happens when you go to a Broadway musical. Afterwards, you may not remember every word of your favorite number. Yet you are likely to find yourself humming the tune – and smiling. Your memory is not exact, yet the music evokes more of the memory of what you took in. The music matters.

In parent-child communications, “the music” is in the emotions expressed by the parent. If the parent is calm, the moment is not charged. The child may or may not hold on to the content of the message – but they get the idea that this is something they can ask the parent about in the future. If the parent is confused, agitated, or angry, the music is discordant – and the child gets the message that maybe this is not something to ask about.

Managing the music isn’t easy, particularly when a topic triggers strong emotions. Some parents step back to reflect upon what bothers them about a topic. Some check in with other adults. The point is to find that calmer, more centered space within ourselves from which we can connect with our inquisitive child and promote a trusting dialogue. Partner Church Internet Pen Pals



This fall we became twinned (the British phrase) or partnered (the American phrase) with the John Pounds Memorial Unitarian Church in Portsmouth, England, United Kingdom. At our partner church service in September nearly 50 of our members signed up to be internet pen pals with a member of the Portsmouth Unitarian Church. The folks in Portsmouth lost the list but after a month found it again. So in December they will be arranging pen pals and you can expect to hear from someone in January or February.

AIM 2 Update

In its November meeting, the Board of Trustees approved the use of funds remaining from the original AIM project to pay for the cost of the schematic design phase of AIM2 given that the goals of AIM2 are consistent with those for which the money had been raised and authorized by the Church membership. There are \$21,919 currently in the AIM fund account.


At the completion of the AIM construction effort, there was a positive balance in the AIM account as the project came in slightly under budget. Before it disbanded in December of 2010, the AIM committee assembled a list of items that represented possible ways for spending the remaining funds. This “unfunded items” list was a compendium of unfinished tasks (e.g., view panes in classroom doors), additional furnishings (e.g., couch for the nursery), and needed renovations (e.g., updated electrical system and lighting in the sanctuary). The projected cost of all of the items on the list significantly exceeded the amount of money remaining in the AIM fund.

The AIM committee turned over the list to the Board of Trustees to adjudicate. In the five years since that time, the Board approved spending for nearly half of the original 43 items on the list and determined that several others were not required. Of the 19 items remaining, the most costly are within the scope of the AIM2 project (sanctuary electrical and lighting systems, new cushions for the pews, integrating the meetinghouse and the addition’s fire alarm systems, sanctuary video system). The AIM2 committee will make a recommendation to the Board for the disposition of any remaining items.


The cost of the schematic design phase is expected to be \$18,000. As reported in the October Chalice, HKT Architects will create several renderings of conceptual plans that address the topics that we have raised with them which are central for the revitalization of the sanctuary. The plans will be reviewed with membership in one or more workshops to get your feedback on the alternatives presented. Ultimately, once we have been able to agree on a set of options that we want to carry forward, HKT will prepare a final schematic design and updated set of cost estimates.
