#### Jan. 3: Celebrating Islam

#### About Quotations from the Wayside

More than forty years ago, a despondent Korean War veteran stood on the Brooklyn Bridge ready to jump. His suicidal mood was brought up short when he remembered a message he had seen posted outside his neighborhood church. It read: "When you come to the end of your rope—tie a knot in it and hang on."

The man decided to hang on to life because of hope offered by a bulletin board. Roadside messages like the one he remembered once dotted church grounds in 500 cities on four continents. How this tradition began can be traced to two differing tales, one starting in Massachusetts and the other in England.

The roadside bulletin board was first introduced to North American churches in 1919 by Henry Hallam Saunderson, minister of the First Parish Church (Unitarian) of Brighton, Massachusetts, and secretary of the American Unitarian Association's publicity department from 1915 to 1921. Saunderson noticed that "many bulletin boards in front of churches were ineffectual because they were either kept empty or held notices which had outlived their usefulness." Inspired by the local wayside shrines he had seen in Europe, he decided to create "wayside sermons," liberal messages that would make people stop, read, and search their conscience.

Breathing New Life into the UCS Wayside Pulpit

The Unitarian Church of Sharon has a prime, central location in Sharon where our Wayside Pulpit can reach thousands of local residents each month! We'd like to reinvigorate and expand the options for our Wayside Pulpit by asking the entire congregation to propose and vote on new messages to add to our repertoire. During the first half of January (3rd, 10th, 17th) we will be asking people to post their quote suggestions in the vestry, and in the second half of January (24th, 31st), we'll let everyone vote on their favorites. We'll take the top vote-getters, create 40" x 28" posters of them, and start proudly displaying them in front of the church.

Some guidelines on the quotes:

- 1. Because we want the message to be clearly visible from the street, the quote should be no more than 75 characters
- 2.Look for quotes that are positive, loving, and reflect Unitarian Universalist ideals
- 3. Seek out quotes that represent a broad and diverse set of sources

#### **Presidential Ponderings**

"Sign, sign, everywhere a sign, Blockin' out the scenery, breakin' my mind
Do this, don't do that, can't you read the sign?"
- "Signs" Five Man Electrical Band, 1970

UCS has a lot of signs. There's the Wayside Pulpit (the sign holder at the corner of our property by the traffic lights), the board that lists the upcoming service along North Main St, and signs on and in the building. At times we are asked to post other signs. Sometimes this is requested by the UU Association like the *Black Lives Matters* signs. Other times they are requested by members about a social activity or an issue that most of the congregation supports. Recently there was a request for a sign about a proposed local natural gas line expansion. It was a delicate issue with limited third party information available and apparently little openness on the issue by the town. The signs identified other sources of information to review before a town meeting on the matter and suggested an anti-pipeline bias. Sign were posted for several days under an old policy but the Board of Trustees did not approve it for the longer period which had been requested. Many, but not all, of the congregation who viewed the sign felt uncomfortable with the posting whether they supported the pipeline or not. They usually felt that the church should not appear to present an opinion on this issue.

This article is not about the pipeline and I trust that the people of Sharon and other towns on the projected route will make a wise decision on the matter. This article is about our policies on signs. Although problems with signs are rare (this is the only one I know of in my 5 ½ years on the Board), it is time to relook at our policies. For now the Board and Rev. Robinson will look at proposed signage of a potentially controversial nature but if you feel a different policy is called for now is the time to contact the Minister or members of the Board or even a Committee Chair about your opinion. You can use email if personal contact is difficult. We'd love to hear from you.

#### From The Director of Religious Education

#### "I know"

I've been thinking about my little friend Madison lately. She's 20 now, but I knew her best when she was three and four. Whenever I explained something to the children in our playgroup, Madison's reply was predictable: "I know." Madison was one of the best-informed people I ever met. Or at least, she claimed to be.

In a knowledge-based economy, there is such a premium placed on being "in the know." No one wants to be seen as being "out of the loop." By leaning into what I am familiar with, I can seem quite knowledgeable. A simple "I know" preserves the illusion that I am on top of everything. Except I'm not. And by covering up what I don't know, I miss out on the chance to be curious and find out more.

As we ring in this new year filled with new experiences, we can lean on the past and know new things purely based on what we already know. Or we can lean into our "not knowing" and get very curious. How does that work? Who does that help? Is anyone hurt by it? Does someone else see this in a different way than I do? How do they make sense of it? Some of these questions may push us outside our comfort zones – but they provide us with lots more information about what is happening in the world around us. Some of that information may not fit in well with our current way of looking at the world. Hmm.

In January, we'll be celebrating difference at church. This celebration is richer when we bring our curiosity to discover all the different ways of understanding the world among the people we know (or think we know). I encourage you to lean into your "not knowing," ask questions, and listen with an open mind.

# Coming of Age in January: Right-doing and wrong-doing

Tuesday, January 5, 7:30-9 pm – youth Tuesday, January 19, 7:30-9 pm – youth and mentors

#### Our Whole Lives - Grades 1 + 2

Bodies, families, birth, and babies will be the focus for our first and second graders in January, February, and March. The Our Whole Lives (OWL) comprehensive lifespan sexuality education program starts with this series of 8 lessons. We're beginning conversations at home and at church which will continue for our whole lives – conversations in which we learn about our individual differences, in which we gather important information which will help us stay healthy and safe, in which we share our values.

The program launches with the Parent-Child Orientation on Sunday, January 10. Trained OWL leader Kate Barber will meet with the children, while Louise Marcoux meets with parents. This mandatory program runs from noon to 3 pm and includes lunch for all as well as childcare for siblings of participants.

## January in Religious Education

January will find the **Preschool-Kindergarten** children exploring their similarities and differences. Their sessions will promote self-esteem while celebrating differences. They will also talk about gender roles and diversity. Other topics they will cover are caring for trees, and exploring seasonal change in a session focused on cold, snowy winters.

The **Grade 1-2** class begins the month examining the topic of animal homes. One session focuses on beehives and reveals commonalities between the homes of bees and our family homes. The next session will explore other types of animal homes while still focusing on the parallels to our family homes. The group will then begin their Our Whole Lives (OWL) curriculum which includes sessions discussing the human body, gender roles, and how to keep one's body healthy and safe.

The **Grade 3-4** class will learn about the 5th Source of UU faith which counsels heeding the guidance of reason and science. They will be introduced to UU astronomer Cecilia Payne and use a night sky display to engage in activities that foster discovery through reasoning. They will hear a story about dinosaur bone discovery and participate in a taxonomy activity. One session touches upon how flaws can be turned into strengths and thus inspire wonder, and another session shares a story about Ralph Waldo Emerson which illustrate the importance of the gifts of time and love. The group will have the opportunity share these gifts by visiting one of the younger classes.

Our **Grade 5-6** group will begin the month learning about racism and social justice through the lens of the media. They will hear about African American Television producer Henry Hampton and make their own comparison study of media clips. The students will also learn about becoming social justice allies through a congregational audit which will get them thinking about how our congregation works for social justice. There will be a lesson promoting appreciation of our multigenerational community, and another that will challenge the students to think about being effective communicators.

The **Grade 7-8** students will spend the next few months learning about different faith traditions. The first Sunday in January the group will join the congregation for our service about Islamophobia. Their classes for the rest of January will include discussing Unitarian Universalism as a faith Tradition and then they will launch into a series of sessions about Judaism.


# Mainspring House Items Needed

#### ICUU PUBLIC UPDATE STATEMENT ON BURUNDI

Violence in Burundi has escalated with government forces killing civilians, leaving the bodies in the streets to further terrorise their people. The still active charges against the leader of the Burundi Unitarians are now being used to seek to arrest and intimidate the lawyers and those of others faiths who were of assistance.

Regrettably, it is now necessary for Burundi Unitarians to join the multitudes fleeing the country for personal safety. Assistance is being offered to all our congregants who need to leave and several large homes in another country are being rented to provide shelter.



So far everyone has been able to leave safely, although some Unitarians remain in country. It is likely we will need to house and feed people away from home for a number of months.

Provisions have been made for the Unitarian Church Building in Bujumbura to be secured and guarded. When possible, worship and prayer continues there.

The Rev. Fulgence Ndagijimana is living in one of the rented shelters, organizing relief efforts and looking after the spiritual needs of both Unitarians and non-Unitarians.

A significant grant from the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) combined with the generous donations from Unitarians and Unitarian Universalists around the world is making all this possible. Any funds the Burundi Unitarians had have been frozen by the Burundi government.

The International Council of Unitarians and Universalists (ICUU) is working closely with the Unitarian Church of Burundi to support these efforts. Partners are assisting through a special multi-organizational working group coordinated by the ICUU and also including representatives of the Canadian Unitarian Council, International Bridges for Justice, UUA International Office, UUSC and the ICUU Francophone Mentoring Coalition.

If you are contacted by individual Burundian Unitarians seeking support or assistance, please refer them to this joined-up support effort rather than offering direct assistance. Please send any questions to Rev. Steve Dick at execsec@icuu.net.

#### SOCIAL JUSTICE UPDATES - JANUARY 2016 HAPPY NEW YEAR!

On January 17<sup>th</sup>, the Unitarian Church of Sharon will celebrate the birthday of **Martin Luther King, Jr.** In accordance, the social justice theme for the month of January will be racial equity and will support of the Black Lives Matter movement. We are grateful to Adrienne and Janet who will lead our worship service on the 17<sup>th</sup>. The following day will be Sharon's interfaith service honoring Martin Luther King, Jr. held at UCS at 10:00 AM. Please plan to participate in both services.

Additionally, a second book group meeting on "**Just Mercy**" will occur on January 31<sup>st</sup> at noon. The group will have an opportunity to explore UU ethicist and theologian Sharon Welch's position that states, "People who are comfortable often turn away from the day-to-day issues of oppression because solutions to complex social problems are not within easy reach." The group will explore these questions from the UUA Guide:

- If you are forced by circumstances to confront injustice daily, what sustains you through times of hope and despair?
- If you are not forced by circumstances to confront injustice daily, what spiritual practices might keep you engaged and help you to do the work of justice making?
- How does your UU faith sustain you and strengthen your resolve, even when you see the problems of racism, mass
  incarceration, poverty, and other forms of injustice in their full magnitude?

We welcome new readers to "Just Mercy" after experiencing this "unforgettable true story about the redeeming potential of mercy" and others who would like to continue the conversation. Copies of the book may be borrowed from UCS library on the second floor.
