Stonehill College Consultants

Hello! Our names are Tim Dupuis, Meghan Jordan, Emma Prinos, and Brenna Trefethen, and we are students from Stonehill College. This semester we are taking part in a learning community class within the college. Our class is called Climate Change, and we are so fortunate to be able to be working with the Unitarian Church for the next few months. The basis of our class is that we are taught the principles and ethics behind climate change. Armed with this knowledge, our class is sent into the Sharon community to act as consultant for different religious institutions. As I'm sure you can tell, our group was assigned to help the lovely, welcoming, and friendly Unitarian Church.

As the consultants for the church we will be addressing the social justice issue of climate change, and the ways your church community can fight it. Our work so far has included putting together a Greenhouse Gas Inventory of the building. At the end of the process we will be able to tell you what types of greenhouse gases the church gives off and how much of them are emitted by you. We hope to provide some ideas about energy savers within the building, as well as helping to educate the congregation about climate change. During the month of April you will see us frequently. We will be attending the April 3rd service to collect data, and talk about carbon emissions produced via cars. We will also be a part of the Earth day service on April 17th. We are all passionate about helping the environment and we would love to answer any questions you have about climate change. We look forward to continuing our work with the Church and meeting you all very soon!

Presidential Ponderings

We have a great chance to fix up the sanctuary and bring the Sanctuary into the 21st Century. Please pay attention to the AIM2 (or is it AIM II?) opportunities coming up. AIM2 took a number of smaller improvements that had been previously discussed, some necessary repairs, and some potential upgrades and put them into one big package.

The important thing about the package is that we don't have to do all of it or, in fact, any of it (although I seriously hope we do the needed repairs). That was because the membership made sure that they took the many opportunities available to ask questions, see the proposals, and voice their opinions on portions of the project. Changes were made because of those sessions. AIM2 hopes to do the same. Do you love the old rickety wooden windows with 200 year old glass? Do you think we should be able to project the hymns onto a screen so that we can look forward when we sing instead of having out head in the hymnal? There are so many things to think about in this project. Please make sure that you are part of it.

Contents under pressure

When Yvonne was asked to stay after for Math Team in 4th grade, she came home elated. A team devoted to her favorite subject in the whole world! But then her face clouded over. I asked what was bothering her. "[+++] says that she's doing it because it will help her get into Harvard." My girl wasn't sure about this Harvard business. I told her I didn't care about Harvard, but I sure hoped Math Team was fun. She brightened and cheerfully recounted the problems that she got to solve.

Our kids are under so much pressure. They rarely get to decide for themselves what goals they might have or whether they met their own goal. The social pressure to be the best at everything is corrosive. It erodes children's capacity to decide for themselves what is good for them. Instead of enjoying an activity for the sheer pleasure of doing it, they see themselves from the outside or recognize only that they "aren't as good as" someone else.

Letting some of the air out of this pressurized situation isn't easy. As parents we receive messages about what is necessary for our child to make the A Travel team, the Accelerated level course, the admission to a "good" school. It's hard to think about my child losing access to a wonderful opportunity that might open doors for her. In the moment, I can forget that in this enriched environment, there are so many opportunities to learn and grow. And it can be hard to see the unconventional opportunities that might in fact suit my child's needs better.

So what can we do to release some of this needless pressure? Maintain perspective; remember it's rare that all is lost (even though some folks will insist otherwise). Encourage our children to set their own goals (no matter how random-seeming to others) and to discover what they love. Allow mistakes to be learning opportunities. Life's journey is a lot more fun when we get to make some decisions about where (and how fast) to wander.

April in Religious Education

Our big event this month is RE Sunday on April 10th. Each class is excitedly preparing to share something special they have explored or learned as part of the Religious Education program this year.

Preschool-Kindergarten begin the month talking about people that live in different parts of the world and recognizing that we are all a part of the human family. The children will share their felt Chalice on RE Sunday. Later in the month there will be a session all about rain, and the children will be joined by their older peers for a spring themed Color Walk at month's end.

The **Grade 1-2** students will be busy making "respecticles" and preparing a song to share on RE Sunday. During the second half of April the class will have a session that focuses on the hearth as the literal and metaphorical heart of their family homes. Then they will join the PreK-K class on their Color Walk which aims to foster gratitude and wonder towards the gifts of nature.

A song about the food pantry is being prepared for RE Sunday by the **Grade 3-4** students. The class will spend the last two sessions of April focused on gratitude. Their activities will help them think about how gratitude is felt and expressed, as well as encourage appreciation for nature's gifts. The class will also plan a gratitude promoting activity for the congregation.

Making the invisible visible is the aim of the **Grade 5-6** class as they prepare their contribution for RE Sunday focusing on the topic of the hymnal. The remainder of the month will find the students exploring the dignity of work and how this connects to our first UU Principle. They will identify work they do in their own lives, learn about child labor, and be introduced to collective bargaining as one method to obtain fair working conditions.

The **Grade 7-8** group will share a skit about King Solomon on RE Sunday. Their class will then return to their study of Islam, extending their learning from their visit to the Islamic Center of New England which is scheduled for April 3rd.

Architect's Presentation of Sanctuary Renovation Options



On Friday evening, April 8th at 7:00 and Saturday morning, April 9th at 9:30, Eric Kluz of HKT Architects will present a series of different design options for the renovation of the sanctuary. Eric will show different approaches that we could take to address the priorities that we identified during the visioning sessions we held last year. Solutions for accessibility, greening of the sanctuary, restoration (walls, ceiling, floors, lighting, and windows), seating, and audio/visual will be shown and discussed. Schematic designs will be included to help visualize the possibilities.

The format for the presentation will begin with one hour of presentation by Eric. We will break at that point for refreshments and then reconvene for questions, and no doubt, a passionate UU discussion of the options that were presented (and we're sure some that were not!). Friday's presentation will be repeated on Saturday morning so that as many of us possible will be able to attend. Childcare will be provided on both days.

This is the beginning of the earnest effort to arrive at final design plans for the renovation of the sanctuary. The AIM II committee will collect your feedback during the sessions. Based on the feedback, we will schedule follow-up workshops or sessions as needed including focus groups on specific topics as necessary. Once we reach an agreement as a community on the overall approach for the renovation of the sanctuary, HKT will go to work on final design drawings that will be the basis for initial estimates and for bid documents to determine final costs.

We are looking forward to welcoming all members and friends as we move forward towards our future. Bring curiosity and imagination enabled by open minds and open hearts.

SOCIAL JUSTICE UPDATES - APRIL 2016

Earth Day Celebration - On April 17th, the Unitarian Church of Sharon will celebrate Earth Day and the worship service will be led by Sue Mooney and students from Stonehill College.

Honoring Earth Day, the Social Justice Committee has selected the Neponset River Watershed Association as the recipient of April's "brown envelope" offerings. This is a grassroots, member-supported conservation group working to clean up and protect the Neponset River, its tributaries and surrounding watershed lands. Its goal is a clean, healthy, accessible river and watershed, from the smallest headwater stream to the wide-open brackish water of the estuary. For more information, please see www.neponset.org

"Brown Envelope" Collections from July through February donated \$8,889 to support nonprofit organizations locally, nationally and internationally. These donations are helping address homelessness, youth and family services, racial justice, immigration rights, the refugee crisis, and climate change. In February, \$1,070 was donated to UU Mass Action from the brown envelope offerings. Thank you for your abundant generosity!

Access Northeast Educational Forum will be held on Thursday, April 7th, 7:00–9:00 PM at the Sharon High School. The goal of the forum is to provide attendees with a better understanding of the Spectra proposal, why additional pipeline infrastructure in Massachusetts is opposed by so many, what is being done to counter the proposal at the state level, what to expect if Spectra builds a pipeline in your town, and what attendees can do to effectively oppose Spectra's Access Northeast project.

Spectra's Energy Access Northeast gas pipeline proposal includes the Q1 loop, a high pressure 30 inch fracked gas pipeline. The pipeline is slated to run through Franklin, Medway, Bellingham, Norfolk, Millis, Walpole, Sharon, Canton, and Stoughton. For more information, please see www.NoSharonGasPipeline.org
