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



What is RE Sunday?

There are some kinds of learning that happen best in a classroom. But some things are best learned by doing – and learning how to lead worship definitely falls in that category.

Religious Education Sunday is the day when children lead a worship service for the entire congregation. The children are asked to share something they have learned this year. On that day, everyone in church is a religious educator: the children (who offer their ideas) and the entire congregation (who offer their attention and openness to these worship-leaders-in-training).

RE Sunday is more than a month away. RE classes in from mid –March onward will focus on deciding together what to share and how to share it, deciding who will do what, building props (if necessary) and practicing. It'll be challenging AND fun.

RE Sunday is April 10.



March in Religious Education

Feelings is the primary theme for the **Preschool-Kindergarten** group this month. They will be talking about being scared and being angry in sessions that aim to help build awareness and acceptance of these feelings, and develop their abilities to share and talk about them in appropriate ways. The class will also talk about wishes and how wishing is connected with doing. An Easter themed lesson at months end will explore sharing memories of loved ones who have died.

The **Grade 1-2** group has two more OWL sessions; one covers the birth of a baby and the other explores celebrations at all stages of life. The second half of March will see the class making "Love Glasses" and preparing a song for RE Sunday. The children will join together with another group for an Easter themed session on the 27th.

The **Grade 3-4** students will spend the first few weeks of March focused on the food pantry which they will visit after class on March 6th. They will spend time thinking about how they can spread the message about the food pantry with the rest of Sharon. They will also prepare a song for RE Sunday and participate in a joint session with Grade 1-2 for Easter.

The **Grade 5-6** group will explore the topic of economic inequality in a session that will give them a working definition of class but also link to the First UU principle to treat all individuals as valuable and worthy of respect. Another session will introduce them to Charles Dickens and the terms "haves" and "have nots" in order to illustrate that identifying inequality is a necessary step toward battling injustice and can help guide our faithful actions. The class will also begin preparations for RE Sunday and will join with the older RE students for the Easter session.

The **Grade 7-8** class will visit temple Sinai on March 6th to conclude their study of Judaism. They are going to dive into an exploration of Islam in the following weeks, as well as doing some preparations for RE Sunday, and participating in a class with the Grade 5-6 students on Easter.

SOCIAL JUSTICE UPDATES - MARCH 2016

The Social Justice Committee has chosen a dynamic neighboring organization, Community Connections of Brockton (www.ccbrockton.org), for the March 'brown envelope' offering. Community Connections works to empower Brockton residents and increase neighborhood-based networks of support. One of its missions is to strengthen families and prevent child abuse and neglect, through its Family Center. Their programs (all free and open) include parent education, ESOL classes, children's and family activities, finance and life skills workshops, citizenship preparation, support groups, and a community garden. They collaborate with area colleges in the Clemente program of adult college education. Working in multiple languages as needed, they help advocate for people and connect them to needed services.

We have particularly committed to support their 6th annual South Shore Leadership Conference on April 30th at Stonehill College. Anyone is welcome to register for this grassroots conference of workshops, advocacy and resource-sharing, free of charge including food and child care. We hope that this will be the start of an ongoing connection.

"Brown Envelope" Collections from July 1st through January 31st donated \$7,819 to support nonprofit organizations locally, nationally and internationally. These donations are helping address homelessness, youth and family services, racial justice, immigration rights, the refugee crisis, and climate change. In January, \$1,188 was donated to the Equal Justice Initiative from the brown envelope offerings. Thank you for your abundant generosity!

"We the People Act" H.3127 – Please contact your state representatives and senators and voice your opinion on the impact of "big money" on our democratic election process. H.3127 must move out of committee for a vote by the entire legislature by March 16th or there will be a two year delay until the bill is reintroduced. Governor Baker Postcard Campaign - Please sign a postcard to Governor Baker expressing your opposition to an additional tax on your utility bill to pay for Spectra Energy's new \$3 billion gas pipeline project in Massachusetts. Postcards will be available after the service from Kathy Farrell, who is part of the No Sharon Gas Pipeline team. Other team members from this congregation include Bri McAlevey, Ellen and Chuck Bordman, Kerstin Gallant, Ellen Schoenfeld-Beeks, Liz Moore and Mia Joiner-Moore.

The pipeline would be harmful in many ways:

- It would add additional fossil fuel infrastructure rather than sustainable energy infrastructure.
- The gas carried in the pipeline would come from fracking fields of Pennsylvania and contain methane, which is far more destructive to climate stability than carbon dioxide. Pipelines inevitably leak. A recent Harvard study suggests that leaks from the gas infrastructure in the region is 2-3 times higher than government estimates.
- They're dangerous pipelines carry toxic chemicals and have a history of leaking and exploding. The large 30" high-pressure pipe would abut many homes, wetland areas, conservation land and businesses. They're expensive to consumers – Governor Baker and the pipeline owner, Spectra Energy, propose to pay the \$3 billion for this pipeline expansion by adding a tariff to your utility bill, so YOU pay for it but Spectra shareholders get the profits.

THE PIPELINE IS NOT NEEDED for our energy consumption, as stated in Mass. Attorney General Maura Healy's report released last fall. Senator Markey recently warned that it appears the real purpose of the pipeline is not to aid New Englanders with their gas supply but to carry the gas to Canadian ports for export to more lucrative overseas markets.

Syrian Refugee Relief – We raised nearly \$1,500 earlier this church year for Syrian refugee relief through our UU Service Committee. In addition, we recently sent a check for \$75 to the Syrian relief efforts sponsored by the First Congregational Church of Sharon, and \$100 to the Islamic Center of New England for their sponsoring of a Syrian child.
