From the Minister

This month our 2015-2016 church year comes to a close. We begin our summer services on June 26. There will be childcare each Sunday in the summer along with excellent worship services led by members of the congregation (coordinated by the minister).

Here are some figures from our 2015-2016 church year:

- Median attendance at the 10am service – 50 adults and children
- Median attendance at the 10:30am service – 83 adults
- Adult membership as of June 2016 – 192 adults
- Religious education enrollment – 90 children and youth
- Number of adults and children who came on an average Sunday morning: 135
- Number of persons who came to UCS programs or meetings on an average week at a time other than Sunday morning: 140
- Percentage of the congregation (adults and children) who have participated in leading worship on a Sunday morning during the past church year: 50% of the congregation

Of course, some of these figures are my “best educated guess”. But they are roughly accurate. What it tells us is that we are a seven day a week spiritual community. We are a highly participatory spiritual community. We are a lively spiritual community. In summary: it was a great year.

It’s hard to imagine that this is the forty-eighth of these messages following twenty-four as Vice President and a few as Chair of Building and Grounds. Thank you for reading these over the years. I hope most were good but I also know that a few were pretty bad. A foxy friend of mine lets me know about the bad ones. It will feel odd not writing these after so many years but I’ve run out of offices I can write from.

I hope you will be at the Annual Meeting on June 10th. In addition to the budget and election of officers there will be a couple of amendments to the Bylaws, one regarding the quorum needed for the Special Meeting to form a Ministerial Search Committee. Right now the Bylaws require 50% of the voting members of the congregation to be at that meeting. In spite of a lot of notice we did not meet that quorum on May 22nd and perhaps it is an unrealistic goal at this time. We must not lose the concerns of the people who originally wrote the Bylaws however: that this is an important matter and sometimes it is not in the best interests of a congregation to search for a new minister right after one leaves. I’m sure we can pass an acceptable amendment that respects these concerns like the one that will be proposed.

Working with Youth at UCS – an invitation to adults

There's a right-sized task for you within our youth ministry. Youth groups (for middle- and high school youth) offer our youth the opportunity to take the lead. Adults are welcome to support youth leadership and build beloved community. Here's a sampling of volunteer roles for adults:

- **Youth advisor** (support weekly Sunday evening meetings of the Senior Youth Group);
- **Chaperone** (drive/accompany youth on a local adventure – for social justice, or fun and fellowship);
- **Retreat advisor** (accompany youth on an overnight retreat coordinated by our Youth Coordinator);
- **CON advisor** (accompany youth to a local, youth-led UU overnight conference).

Never done this before? Don't worry: training is provided. Please contact Louise Marcoux if you are interested in being part of the community of adults who support youth empowerment.

Who? Me?!? Teach RE?!?

If you enjoy hanging around and doing fun things with spirited, thoughtful people, please consider signing up as a religious education teacher.

Don't worry – you aren't signing your life away. You choose how many Sundays are right for you to commit to: 6? 9? 12?... over a period of 42 weeks. You'll still have plenty of Sundays left for worship; a whole season of sports; travel; *and* hanging around in your PJs.

Uncomfortable with adolescents? There's a place for you on the preschool team. Interested in Social Justice? Grades 5-6 will explore social justice all year long! Let Louise know your interests and needs; she will find the right teaching assignment for you.

June in Religious Education

We have had another wonderful year of RE classes and just two sessions remain before we break for the summer!

The **Preschool-Kindergarten** children are going to learn about people with disabilities. The aim is to foster empathy and positive images, and demonstrate to the children that while differences do exist they share much in common with disabled people. Their final session will celebrate all they have done and learned as a class this year by sharing memories and playing some favorite games.

The **Grade 1-2** students will make stick puppets as they learn about a 19th Century Unitarian Minister Mary Collson in a session that explores different ways to help someone. Their last session of the year will include making flowers and learning about Norbert Capek and the UU tradition of the Flower Communion.

The **Grade 3-4** class is going to celebrate Rainbow Sunday while learning the story of the rainbow flag and creating their very own rainbow here at church. The theme for their final session will be gratitude and appreciation, and they will be creating Father's Day cards.

The first Sunday of June will find the **Grade 5-6** group completing their chalking project. The following week they will work on an art exhibit showcasing some of their creative endeavors from the past year.

The **Grade 7-8** students will spend the last two sessions of the year concluding their exploration of Christianity.

FOUR HANDS, ONE GRAND



We're not exactly sure of the demographics concerning piano duo teams, but it would seem that there are a great many siblings involved, sometimes more than two, with an extra one or two for stand-ins, as well as any number of married pairs. Belonging to the former category, we started piano lessons during our respective first-grade years. Perhaps it was our three-year age difference, but we didn't actually begin playing piano duets for some time – about thirty years, that is. By that time Chris had moved to Virginia, and David to Massachusetts, providing one or

the other of us with a 400-mile trip in order to be able to play together on the same piano. The impetus to do this actually came by way of an invitation to give a memorial concert for our first teacher. More excuses for the commute followed, and we've been doing one or two concerts a year since then. In the Boston area we have performed in Jordan hall, The Art Complex at Duxbury, on WGBH radio, as well as here in Sharon.

The business of sharing a piano keyboard is not unlike eating at a diner counter: working in a narrow space, watching out for your neighbor's elbows (and your own), passing things back and forth, not being able to move your seat, not always being sure what to do with your feet, and someone reaching over to take your fries. To illustrate some of the situations duo-pianists can get into, we'll be playing a group of pieces by Mozart, Schubert, Rossini, Brahms, Gershwin and Sousa.

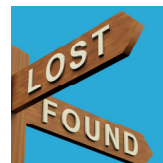
NEWS FROM OUR MEETINGHOUSE COMMUNITY

PARTNER CHURCH NEWS

From Our Partner Church in Transylvania

Our Dear Friends,

Spring has arrived at Transylvania too. And as usually, the nature, the work, the agriculture have called the people to the fields. But they still have time for the life of the congregation, too. On the 15th of March, on the occasion of our national holiday we organised a celebration. This holiday is very important for us, because it reminds us to the revolution which burst out in 1848, where our ancestors lost their lives for freedom, equality and fraternity. I know that these are important things for you too, as you fought for the same things during the American Civil War.

In the church at Csokfalva, we organised an ecumenical celebration together with the Reformed congregation and after that at the monument which was established in front of our church in 1931 for our heroes we had a festive speech, where the children recited poems and we wreathed the monument.

During this national holiday at Erdoszentgyorgy, in the parks of the castle we organised an open-air celebration, too, together with the Romano-Catholic and Reformed congregations. Here different politicians held their speeches, including Hungary's ambassador, too.

Together with Easter a new interesting thing came into my life too. I had to hold a festive speech in a public radio which covers all our country. I don't have to tell you how excited I was. But this challenge filled me with pleasure and excitement.

April was a bit busy. I accepted to hold a presentation at the meeting of the priests with the topic SAMSON , THE GOD OF SUN. After a few days I had examination from the dean, where they checked all our movable and real estate. The end of the month was even busier, I had to attend a priest training at Kolozsvar in the building of the episcopate. It was a real mental refreshment and experience for me.

Now we had a short holiday, where our family could spend some time with the children and in this way we could realise what a great blessing they are for us, and how little time we can spend with them during our everyday life.

I am happy that the members of our congregation who have facebook, can follow those events which you share in your photos. With the personal meeting I hope that this relationship will become stronger. Up to then I send all my regards and love,

SOCIAL JUSTICE UPDATES - JUNE 2016

Rainbow Sunday - On June 5th, the Unitarian Church of Sharon will celebrate our annual Rainbow Sunday. The morning worship service will be led by Mia and Lionel. Mia will share on the momentous ruling for marriage equality by the U.S. Supreme Court and the resulting backlash in several states promoting "Religious Freedom". Lionel will share his experience coming out as a transgender youth. Plan to wear a colored shirt of the rainbow for the annual UCS photo after the service.

Honoring LGBTQ Equality, the UCS Social Justice Committee has selected the Gay Lesbian Straight Education Network (GLSEN) as the recipient of the "brown envelope" offerings for the first three Sundays in June. This is an organization of educators creating safe and affirming environments in schools for LGBTQ students through training for school faculties and the formation of Gay Straight Alliances for the youth. UU Urban Ministry Anti-Racism Network – UUUM is forming a UU network of congregational leaders to do anti-racism educational and action oriented work. These leaders will meet quarterly. The hope is to create a resource network that will strengthen the capacity of each individual congregation and the movement towards racial justice. Spectra Pipeline Update - Spectra is only going to go away if WE ALL help make it too expensive for the company to continue. That means throwing up roadblocks and delays at every possible opportunity and making every aspect of this project expensive for them. That's the reason Kinder Morgan terminated its pipeline project and we can do the same for the Access Northeast. The Sharon Board of Selectmen is now doing its part. It's time for us to join with UU congregations and other groups along the pipeline route doing all sorts of fun community events this summer. It also involves doing some heavy reading and combing over EIS reports coming out—no one can read 22,000 pages in a short time by themselves! Join us at our No Sharon Gas Pipeline meeting to hear a full update and help plan for summer activities including an historic pipeline march that will come through Sharon! NSGP meeting Monday, June 13th, at 7 PM Moose Hill Wildlife Sanctuary.

Shopping for Justice Update - Don't forget to keep in mind our fundraising effort on behalf of ending hunger and homelessness as we enter the busy summer season. The Social Justice Committee offers grocery gift cards from local grocery stores for sale at Coffee Hour, and while you get the full value of the card for your shopping needs, approximately 5% of the amount remains with the church to help fund our MainSpring House lunchmaking efforts and other social justice work. Planning on being away for chunks of the summer? Stock up for your grocery shopping needs before you leave. Heading for Maine for some R&R? Hannaford's stores are easily found up and down the coast! And remember, at Stop&Shop, Hannafords and Roche Bros., you can buy your choice of hundreds of other gift cards to merchants, restaurants and service providers by using your grocery store cards, and thus benefiting the church when you pick up graduation, birthday or other gift cards for you or for others. It's a great way to 'shop for justice' while you go about your everyday tasks.

FYI, with the recent closure of some of the Roche Bros. stores in our area, sales of their cards has fallen off. Thanks for your support of this important justice work of the Church.

During the Summer – Canned food donations will continue to be collected at UCS for the Stoughton-Sharon Food Pantry. We will continue to make lunches for MainSpring House one Sunday a month. Shopping for Justice gift cards and Fair Trade items will continue to be available for sale during coffee hour on Sundays.
