May 7: **White Supremacy in its Modern Form**

Five hundred Unitarian Universalist Congregations are focusing this Sunday on how racism exists and oppresses today in modern America and in our own denomination. We will explore the concept of white supremacy. The deeper we can understand the dynamics of racism, the more effective can be our response in dismantling it.

May 14: **Transition and Change (Part 1)**

This service will focus on how the last seven years have gone at the Unitarian Church of Sharon and on why UCS will continue to be a vibrant and healthy congregation as one minister leaves and another arrives.

May 21: **Transition and Change (Part 2)**

This will be Jim Robinson's final sermon. He will share how religion in America, and specifically Unitarian Universalist, has changed during the past four decades. He will also share his personal conclusions, after 40 years in the ministry, about the place of spiritual community in human life.

May 28: **Celebrating and Saying Good Bye**

This service is organized and led by the worship committee and the Board of Trustees. It is a celebration of Jim Robinson's ministry at the Unitarian Church of Sharon and an affirmation that while the relationship between this minister and this congregation is ended, it is not forgotten and is deeply appreciated.

Pastoral Care Coverage in June and July

Junior Youth Card Studio: Saying Goodbye to Jim Robinson

Junior Youth are invited to meet in Program A during coffee hour in May to make "goodbye" cards for Jim Robinson. (This needs to happen outside of their regular RE time, as they continue with the Our Whole Lives curriculum.) Youth can start a project one week and then store their work-in-progress in the studio to work on it during the following week. The studio will be open May 7, May 14, and May 21. The cards will be presented to Jim Robinson during the family worship service (10 am) on May 28.

Making RE Accessible to All Children: Understanding Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD)

All youth and adults are invited to take part in this exciting webinar offered by the New England Region of the UUA. Melissa Plowman, MA, LMHC will help participants gain an introductory understanding of ASD and increase their awareness of evidence-based interventions and strategies for the RE classroom. Melissa will be available at the end of the presentation to answer questions and help us apply our learning to our practices here at church.

RE Registration – Now??

Amazingly enough, May is Registration Month in the Religious Education Program. We ask that parents register all children ages 1 month through 18 years for September 2017 programs. Hearing from you now helps us plan class groupings, staffing levels, and room assignments for the church year. It also helps us be prepared to accommodate children's needs, promote safety, and know whose photos may be posted on our website (never with names, of course!).

Starting May 7, online registration is possible 24/7 at http://www.uusharon.org/religious_education/registration/#form. Paper forms can be picked up from the literature rack outside the RE office (near the Pre-school classroom) and dropped off (with a check) in the "registration forms" tray in the information station in the RE office (in the bookcase closest to the window).

Fees: \$40 for one child; \$60 for two or more children. All registrations received before July 1, 2017 qualify for a \$10 discount. Fees are waived for youth who volunteer in the Sunday morning RE program. Please do not let the fee get in the way of registering: scholarships are available. Please see Rev. Jim Robinson or Louise Marcoux for details.

The Right Stuff

Wondering if you have what it takes to be an RE Teacher? There is no one "type" of person who is best at educating religiously because there are many ways to teach RE. We don't have one type of child at church, after all. Our RE program is effective because of the variety of personalities, skills, and interests among our RE volunteers. We are able to offer our children different ways of exploring and understanding Unitarian Universalism.

If one or more of the following qualities describes you, please explore the possibility of teaching: curiosity, a sense of humor, the willingness to try to see things from someone else's point of view, interest in social justice, creativity, wanting to find out more about what UUism is based on, the wish to support your community, enjoyment of arts and crafts, interest in how children think, attention to detail, love of the big questions (e.g. "why are we here?"), flexibility, playfulness, skills in creative problem-solving, love of theatre arts, enjoyment of working with groups.

Remember, if you circled one of these qualities, you have what it takes. If you circled more than three, what have you been waiting for? Experience is not required. Training and support are provided.

You can find out more about the nuts and bolts of teaching by talking with Kate Parker-O'Toole, Lilly Zhou, or Louise Marcoux during coffee hour. Or just sign up on the poster in the vestry and you will soon hear back from Louise.

May in Religious Education

For the month of May the theme in our religious education classes will be saying goodbye. All classes from **Preschool through Grade 6** will explore ideas related to change in our community and prepare to say goodbye to Reverend Jim. There will be card-making and art projects, as well as age appropriate stories for each class. The activities aim to assist in exploring the feelings associated with change, and help the children learn what is important when saying goodbye.

The **Grade 7-8 OWL** students will continue with their OWL curriculum discussing the topics of pornography, contraception and sexual decision making. They will also have their own card-making studio as part of their preparation for saying goodbye.

The Invisible Crisis: The Female Face of Forced Migration

The Invisible Crisis: The Female Face of Forced Migration is a short documentary produced by Centro Presente with Intercultural Productions that explores the causes of the migration of millions of women and their children from the nations of the Northern Triangle (Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras) to the United States. Through the first-hand testimonies of Centro Presente members, and women and immigrant rights advocates, we hear about the tremendous levels of lethal violence confronted by women in Central America and how flight to the United States remains their only option, not for a better life, but for any life at all. However upon crossing the border after a perilous journey through Mexico into the U.S. these women find themselves once again the victims of a state-sponsored violence which continues their trauma.

Philip writes to us from Denver;

Spring is in bloom here, the strong and nearly constant sunshine has brought the world of flowers to life. I have even managed to hold on to a bit of my tan from last winter!

Work on my house continues on. Just now I am challenged with engineering and building the heating system. The new furnace will put out 40,000 BTUs and have a two-stage motor. The ducts will move 1200 cfm. Geezum, I am learning so much about all of this stuff. By the time I get done with this house I will be able to build a house from scratch. The moral of the story: be careful what you wish for - this is exactly what I wanted, and now I'm being put through the ringer bringing it to fruition. It's all very exciting... and a little anxiety-producing too. Vision, dreams, and hard work - the keys to a long and prosperous life, right?

It's been interesting learning how the weather conditions out here effect building structures and how construction practices vary. My house, for instance, is almost 100 years old and there is not a speck of rot, even on the siding boards that are below grade and in the dirt! Another difference I think I am seeing is that there is not as much emphasis on quality workmanship. I'm not sure why, maybe it's because wages are lower here, or because the population is more transient, or maybe because the old world influence is not as prevalent here. Who knows....

Our Partner Church in Portsmouth!

On a recent Saturday, the John Pounds Church held a quiz night and dinner. They donated the proceeds to an organization supporting those who have been treated for breast cancer at the Queen Alexandra Hospital.

The city of Portsmouth, England, home of the John Pounds Church, is a very unique place in itself. Charles Dickens, Rudyard Kipling, and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle all lived there! Portsmouth is an island, yet it is still one of the more densely populated cities in Europe. It is a port, home of many famous ships such as the HMS Warrior, the Mary Rose and Horacio Nelson's flagship, HMS Victory, the world's oldest naval ship still in commission. The Spinnaker Tower, a tall observation tower shaped like a sculptural sail, reflects Portsmouth's naval history. The iconic shape was chosen by Portsmouth residents in a vote.

SOCIAL JUSTICE UPDATES - MAY 2017

New co-chair for Social Justice Committee: Elizabeth Siftar: We are pleased to announce that Elizabeth Siftar has agreed to serve the SJC in the role of co-chair, along with me, Gare Reid, effective immediately. Elizabeth, while relatively new to the UCS community, has already jumped into the social justice fray on many fronts here in Sharon, and she brings important insights and connections from her many years of justice work in other locations.

Janet Schmidt will continue in her ongoing capacity as Clerk for the SJC, and together with Elizabeth and me, we look forward to serving the UCS community.

Do It Now (for Social Justice)

Do It Now Table: Keep an eye out for recurring opportunities for social justice in action at our regular Do It Now Table every Coffee Hour on Sunday mornings. We are offering simple, concrete, direct steps that can be done NOW to help promote social justice changes in our fast-paced world. If your passion for a cause might fit in, bring it to our attention and your project could get attention NOW!

Helping Immigrant Families: Throughout the month of April, we collected clothing, art supplies, and grocery cards in partnership with the Chelsea Collaborative, a human services organization working with immigrant families in Chelsea, MA (www.chelseacollab.org). We'll report on the results in next month's newsletter.

Brown Envelope Update: Our March Brown Envelope (BE) funds were collected for CAIR-MA (Council on American-Islamic Relations) and April funds will go to the Neponset River Watershed Association (www.neponset.org). We chose MIRA, the Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy Coalition (www.miracoalition.org) as the recipient for May BE donations. In June, along with our Rainbow Sunday service and our church's participation in the Boston Pride Parade on June 10, we will once again support GLSEN (www.glsen.org), an organization that works to ensure that LGBTQ students are able to learn and grow in a school environment free from bullying and harassment.

Nicaragua Service Trip for Adults Postponed: We have decided to postpone this trip until Summer 2018 after our small group of interested people got smaller due to unanticipated conflicts with the chosen dates.
