From the Minister



During worship on Sunday, September 17th, I suggested that the Interim Time in a congregation might be best thought of as a journey, and that the specific focus of an Interim Minister is to help a congregation move from the past, through the present, and into the future with intentionality.

I shared my Interim Backpack, filled with symbols for the work we will do together:

- A box of tissues to represent the work we will do around looking back at the congregation's history, work that will include both sadness and celebration
- A mirror to represent my role in helping the congregation examine its identity, taking a look at itself to discover what it especially likes and what, if anything, it might want to change
- A compass to help us navigate the changes, including changes in leadership, that will likely occur along the way
- Binoculars to help us see what is ahead of us and where we want to go as we do the work of envisioning your future
- A book about Interim Ministry to represent all the wisdom from outside the congregation upon which we can draw during this time
- A chalice water bottle to remind us to stay connected with our fellow Unitarian Universalists as we travel
- A heart to remind us that the most important work we are called to do is the work of loving one another
- A wall hanging with a quotation from the Dalai Lama to remind us to be kind to one another
- An otter to remind us to play and laugh and have fun as we travel together
- A walking stick with a lizard on it as a reminder both to dream big and to let go of whatever old habits, old ways of doing things, old assumption, etc., that might get in the way of fulfilling your dreams, in the same way that some lizards (which represent dreaming in many cultures) can let go of their tails when in danger and then grow a new one

If there is a theme with which we begin October, it might be "Journey." During the first three Sundays of the month we will continue to reflect on this idea that the Interim Time is a time of journeying. And we will consider what skills and attitudes might serve us best along the way from here to there, from "the now" to the "not yet," both in the context of the Interim Time and in the context of our own lives.

Building faith



Community builds faith. Of course, parents are their child's primary religious educators. And when a child reaches a certain age, they need to reach beyond the boundaries of their family and test the meaning of what they are learning

at home in the larger world. A community which reflects those values AND which encourages the testing of those values in a broader context – that's where children and youth can build a faith that they can rightfully call their own.

This church is one such resource for parents. And there's another I need to let you know about: Religious Education Week at Ferry Beach in Saco, Maine. UU families gather at Ferry Beach for a week of fun, friendship, worship, reflection, and exploration. Children learn to live in covenant while playing Newcomb and climbing trees. Youth step into roles of community leadership. Adults deepen their appreciation of the beauties and challenges of living in community. It's fun AND transformative.

In my 13 years at Ferry Beach RE Week, I have watched children become adults who embody love in action, who walk the talk, who can step into roles of community leadership and then can step back and support the leadership of others, and who understand what they are called to be and do as Unitarian Universalists.

I hope that you will explore this faith-building opportunity.

Religious Education News

October in RE

Our **Preschool-Kindergarten** children will explore what they can do with their feet, their movements, their ability to talk, and to hear. They will learn how all of these wonderful gifts enable them to share their thoughts and feelings, and make each child unique. The children will hear stories, play games and create some unique artwork such as tissue butterflies and musical instruments.

The **Grade 1-2** class will continue exploring thresholds and journeying. They will have a session about faith symbols; learning about our chalice symbol and designing their own faith symbol. The class will also use an investigation of bees to learn about family homes. They will further this investigation the following week as they learn about the homes of other animals and how they compare to each other as well as our own homes.

The **Grade 3-4** group will begin the month discussing the role love plays in our faith and congregation and will hear a story about Jesus. They will spend two session exploring the awe and wonder of nature while they create fairy houses. The students will use items they found in nature that inspired awe in them. Another session will ponder the question "what happens when someone dies?" and will explain some of our UU beliefs and practices.

The **Grade 5-6** class will learn about Judith Sargent Murray in a lesson that focuses on love being the foundation of our religion. Another session will help them to identify ways we share love in our community. They'll be introduced to the topic of serving others with the story of Social work founder Joseph Tuckerman, and they'll learn about seeking change through peaceful means in the ways of Gandhi, MLK and Thoreau.

The **Grade 7-8** students will discuss death in a session that will allow them to share experiences and stories while exploring what death means in our society and culture. One session explores the idea of life after death, while another covers the topics of heaven and hell, and the students will also create altars for the dead.

The final week of October will see all classes beginning their Revels preparations!

Tech support needed!


The RE Program is looking for tech-savvy individuals to operate the projector for certain video-oriented RE lessons this year. Your involvement will help RE teachers lead the lesson without

October is Fire Safety Month

What can we do to honor Fire Safety Month in our congregation?





- a. When the alarm sounds, parents/guardians should resist the impulse to rescue their children. They should exit the sanctuary as quickly as possible through either the front or back exits and then gather on the side lawn of the church, well away from the building. Parents/guardians should wait with other worshippers on the side lawn until the fire department gives an all-clear signal, at which point they may pick up their children from their RE Groups.
- b. RE volunteers and nursery staff have been trained to evacuate all children from the building. They will bring the children to the lawn in front of the shed, where they will re-take attendance and stay in a group until the all-clear by the fire department. RE volunteers will stay with the children until parents/ guardians pick them up.
- 2. Take action to promote fire safety at church.
 - a. We are a chalice-lighting people. If you see matches left out after a gathering, feel empowered to put them away in a chalice lighter's supply box (on the top shelf of the either coat closet).
 - b. Help keep hallways clear of objects. Everyone is empowered to move the rolling bulletin boards from the hallway outside the vestry to Program C AFTER the children have been picked up from Program C. (The boards are stored in C, but cannot be put there until the children have left).

Men's Support Group - Meets on Thursdays, October 12 and 26, at 8pm in the church library. New men are always welcome to join.


Women's Support Group – Meets on Thursdays, October 12 and 26, 7:30pm in the minister's study. New women are always welcome to join.

Brown Envelope Update

We collected \$1144.26 in Brown Envelope (BE) funds during the summer services (late June – Labor Day Weekend) for the Unitarian Universalist Urban Ministry's summer youth programs. September funds (beginning September 10th) will

support our Partner Church in Gyulakuta, Romania, specifically for subscriptions to the European Unitarian magazine to help members connect to other UUs, for an organist to play at one Sunday service each month, and to continue to pay part of the tuition for one student's high school education. October funds will be collected to assist people affected by the recent hurricanes, Harvey and Irma. We will designate a portion of the funds for the UUA/UUSC Hurricane Relief fund (which is primarily for those affected by Harvey) and will consider and choose one or more organizations that are providing relief to residents of Florida and the affected islands in the Caribbean, to be announced at October worship services.

CommUnity Closet

We are pleased to announce that the Cluster Group of local UU churches has launched an ambitious project to offer free clothing to the greater Brockton community. Starting in September, the Closet is open on the 2nd Saturday of the month, 10:00 am – 2:00 pm at the UU Church of Brockton (325 W. Elm Street). Each visitor is provided with a bag that they can fill with needed items. Donations of gently used or new clothing will be collected in our Vestry in a designated area. Please note that some new (never used) items are always needed, for all ages and sizes: socks, underwear, diapers, and sanitary products for women.

Also, we will be requesting special donations for specific occasions or situations. This month's Special Donation Request is for children's **Halloween costumes** (all sizes), to be made available when the Closet is open on October 14. We will be recruiting volunteers from our community to help categorize, sort, and stock the donations received. We are also looking for volunteers to staff the Closet once every 5th month, in rotation with the other Cluster Group churches. "Hate Has No Home Here" Showing the Spirit of Sharon

Have you seen these blue and red signs popping up on lawns around Sharon and other towns? Almost 200 signs have been distributed here as part of a recent effort by two Sharon residents, Dede Komisar and Lisa Crist, who decided that this message of acceptance and unity represented the heart of this town. Encouraged by the response to the interfaith vigil on August 15 (reported in last month's Chalice), several participants began the yard sign campaign to cover Sharon with our statement that "Hate Has No Home Here." This campaign, which is not associated with any political party, is happening in many towns across the country, so you don't have to live in Sharon to display this powerful message with your own yard sign.

The campaign itself articulates the need for sharing this sign of solidarity in every neighborhood: "Hate, unchecked, can make neighbors feel fearful and unwelcome in their own communities. The Hate Has No Home Here project reminds us what it means to be American."

So What's a Rain Garden?

If you have begun attending church/meetinghouse after the completion of the 2009 addition, then you might have wondered why a large ditch sits by the parking lot. To be exact there are two, and each serves to keep the water that falls on our property staying on our property.

Otherwise water would be entering the storm water system and polluting the Neponset River. The water runoff from the building is captured at the church entrance underground, and by pipe taken under the parking lot into the main basin or Rain Garden. The water running off the parking lot first flows into the smaller basin which allows the water to percolate through sand and rock, sieving out some pollutants before seeping either straight down or into the large basin. Ecologically, this makes complete sense. Only once did the Rain Garden overflow, right after it was constructed, from incessant rain, and we had to release some into the street which carried it to the storm drain. I'm looking forward to finishing a path in our Rain Garden and maybe even placing a bench under the River Birch. Right now the yellow Golden Rod is feeding birds, insects, moths and butterflies, and, also doing its part to grow a healthy and diverse habitat that sustains the Neponset River Watershed and the plants and animals that call it home. Anyone interested in learning more or helping with the path, see Ellen Schoenfeld-Beeks (It is a misnomer that Goldenrod makes you sneeze; that would be ragweed! So enjoy the spectacular show.)
