Religious Education News

January in RE

January will see our **Preschool Kindergarten** children engage in lessons about the wonder of their sense of smell, the benefits of asking questions, the importance of sharing and how they help others. They will create a collage of herbs and spices, participate in activities that

promote sharing, and make "I can help" hats.

The **Grade 1-2** students will learn about Henry David Thoreau in a session that lets them experience observing and appreciating nature. They will also explore the literal and metaphorical meaning s of the term "hearth" while creating their own hearths to take home. The class will then begin the Our Whole Lives curriculum.

Strengthening love of learning and discovery as well as interest in science is the aim of the **Grade 3-4** sessions this month. The students will learn about UU astronomer Cecilia Payne while they engage in a star charting activity. They will use science to learn something new about themselves, and they will also create a taxonomy collage.

The **Grade 5-6** group will explore peace-making through a story of a Christmas truce during World War I, and they will play cooperation and

conflict resolution games. They will also be introduced to the non-denominational Serenity Prayer in a session that helps them think about situations that call for change versus those that require acceptance. They will end the month exploring the idea of seeking truth and begin the planning of their own social action project

The **Junior Youth/Grade 7-8** group will begin the Building Bridges curriculum which surveys many different faiths. This month's explorations will include delving into Unitarian Universalism and learning about Judaism.

As Hart's mental and physical health declined, however, Rodgers began collaborating with Oscar Hammerstein — who had already built a stellar career working with composers such as Jerome Kern and Sigmund Romberg. Together they created such classic songs as "Oh, What A Beautiful Morning," "Edelweiss," "Getting To Know You," "I Whistle a Happy Tune," and "It's a Grand Night for Singing." Singer Will McMillan and jazz planist Joe Reid will breathe new life into these beloved standards and share a few stories about how they came to be written.

Envelope Update As reported in last month's Chalice, we

raised

\$2509.11 for hurricane relief during Sundays in October, and donated \$500 to the UUA for Hurricane Irma relief in Florida and \$500 to the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) for Hurricane Harvey relief in Texas. The Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Shelter Rock matched hurricane relief donations to the UUSC, thus doubling our contribution. The balance is being distributed as follows: \$754.11 to United Way Virgin Islands (for U.S. Virgin Islands Hurricane Relief) and \$755 to Pirate Surf Club Hurricane Relief of Puerto Rico. Camelia Rodriguez from our church community is working with this group to coordinate distribu-

tion of supplies in western Puerto Rico. In addition, the SJ Committee decided to allocate an additional \$600 from the Fair Trade fund to help provide school uniforms for over 90 Puerto Rican students from 5

public schools that are struggling to return to normal operation (see photos). Look for an update in a future newsletter from Camelia, who will tell us more about her December trip.

Throughout November, we collected \$1358.14 in BE funds, which has been split between MIRA (Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy) and Centro Presente. December donations collected at Sunday morning services will be split among five local food pantries, and all donations on Christmas Eve will be shared with MainSpring House in Brockton. In January, our BE funds will support UU Mass Action, whose director, Laura Wagner, will be our pulpit guest on January 21. The February recipient will be the Equal Justice Initiative (eji.org), an Alabama-based organization led by Bry- Students from Puerto Rican public school with Camelia Rodriguez.

"Do It Now" Action Updates

RAISE Up Massachusetts

Ballot Initiatives - \$15 Minimum Wage, Paid Family and Medical Leave.

GOOD NEWS: The statewide signature collection goal for Paid Family and Medical Leave and a \$15 Minimum Wage has been met, with over 274,000 signatures collected, and the two issues will be on the 2018 ballot. *So what's next?* Over the next several months, the Massachusetts Legislature has a window of opportunity to take up and pass these questions in the legislature.

Please contact your legislator and ask them to take action for Paid Leave and a \$15 Minimum Wage. Massachusetts has spoken loud and clear; let's ask our Senators and Representatives if they've heard our message.

ONGOING: The Massachusetts Fiscal Alliance has been mounting a rolling attack on the 95 co-sponsors of the Safe Communities Act. An immediate response is needed. The Alliance's anti-immigrant postcard campaign is sowing fear about the bill, using false and misleading information disseminated by the Federation of American Immigration Reform (FAIR), which the Southern Poverty Law Center has identified as a white supremacist hate group. UU Mass Action reports that the postcards are generating hundreds of calls to cosponsors from angry voters who misunderstand and oppose the bill. Legislators need to hear from supporters. We need to thank them for their commitment to the Safe Communities Act and to state residents who are immigrants – and assure them of our support! You can email or call. To find out if your legislator co-sponsored this (or any) bill, find their web page, click on the "cosponsor" tab, and scroll down to the number of the bill. Bills are listed in numerical order.

The major components of the Safe Communities Act

- Ensures that law enforcement maintains public safety and fights crime, and that local resources are not used to enforce immigration laws.
- Ensures due process rights
- Prevents the state from assisting in the creation of a Muslim registry
- Prevents 287(g) agreements (state and local law enforcement partnerships with ICE)

UUA to Participate in Poor People's Campaign

At a press conference on December 4, UUA President Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray announced the UUA's full participation in the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival at a press conference with Rev. William J. Barber and Rev. Liz Theoharis, among other faith leaders. Frederick-Gray said, "As people of faith and moral conscience, we must raise our voices and work tirelessly for the good of everyone, not just for the rich or the privileged...Together, we will hold our leaders accountable. Together we will create a more just, loving and hopeful future for the generations who will come after us."

Nicaragua Service Trip for Adults Update

Nicaragua Service Trip for Adults: Is it time for you to travel to Nicaragua? If yes, or maybe, consider joining a proposed 7-day trip in July 2018 to Chacraseca, outside of the Pacific coast city of Leon, in cooperation with FNE international



(fneinternational.org). Participants may include adult UCS members and friends, and members and friends from the other churches in our Five Points Cluster. The SJ Committee has decided to support FNE International with May Brown Envelope donations. If the trip goes forward, these funds will go toward the \$2500 needed for construction of a house for a local family. If we don't have enough participants for a trip, we can still provide support for FNEI's housing, health, and education programs.

Daily activities will include a mix of work and play. Our central purpose is to help a family get a new, sturdy house and outdoor stove. We can supply some of the labor, but individual participants can choose to do this or not. Professional builders and family members will complete the project after we leave. Other possible activities: gardening projects, visiting schools to meet with teachers and students, teaching English to adults and/or children, visiting a community of artisans, and seeing some of the natural wonders of the country. Individual costs will be \$500 per person (including a place to sleep, good food, ground transportation) plus airfare (\$500-\$700). Deadline for commitment to the trip will be no later than March 1, 2018. Please contact Janet Schmidt for more information, to ask any questions, and to indicate your possible interest in participating.



How Refugees Are Transforming the Middle East

STUART SEARS, PH.D.

Stuart Sears, Ph.D. is a scholar of Arabic and Middle East History with a Ph.D from the University of Chicago in Early Islamic History. He is co-founder of the Arabic Language Associates and previously taught at the American University in Cairo, Egypt.
