February is Black History Month, and on February 11 we will be hearing the voices of some of our black UU siblings from around the UU world. As part of this service, USC's own Wilbur Edwards will share some of his thoughts on black experience within the UUA.

February is also a month many of us associate with the heart and with love because of the mid-month holiday known as Valentine's Day. This month - and continuing into early March - I will spend a few Sundays reflecting on belief and what it means to believe. The word "believe" comes from an old root that means to "belove" or "to give one's heart to."

Who has a voice?

UUA Bylaws change

We teach children that our fifth principle says: "every person deserves a voice and a vote in matters that concern them."

Every member of every UU congregation is eligible to become a delegate at our association's annual General Assembly (GA). Delegates get to vote on the business before the UUA -- about where our resources will be directed, about which issues we'll focus on, about who will preside over our Association. Every congregation is allowed a certain number of delegates. And every minister is given a delegate's credential as well.

Last spring, a difficult conversation was begun at the highest levels of the UUA about who could lead within our Association. One person in leadership stated that he believed that religious educators did not have the authority to be accepted as leaders -- that ministers were the appropriate choice. The conversations that followed -- about who can lead, about white supremacy culture within the UUA, and more -- have been painful and have helped people see old situations in new ways.

One surprise that came to light was that most religious educators are not eligible to serve as delegates at General Assembly -- and therefore could not vote last June on who would be the next president of the UUA. How could this be? What about our 5th principle??

There was a time that religious education directors (DREs) were members of their congregations, and were thereby eligible to be chosen as one of their congregation's delegates. Over the past 40 years, UU religious educators have sought to professionalize. One part of assuming a professional identity has involved stepping away from church membership in order to put service to the congregation's needs front and center. This change removed most DREs from the pool of delegates at GA. The UUA changed its bylaws to offer delegate status to professional religious educators who had achieved a "Master's level RE Credential". This credential, however, requires considerable time, effort, and expense to achieve -- it is awarded only to those at the very pinnacle of the profession. Most UUs didn't even notice that most



voices of professional religious educators were excluded from GA. Until last spring...

The professional association of UU religious educators (LREDA) is beginning a movement to include DREs' voices at GA. A change in the UUA's by-laws (about who can be a delegate) can be voted on at GA if at least 15 congregations request the same exact change. So LREDA approached congregations with a request to endorse a change of the by-laws which would allow all religious educators who are both serving a congregation and-active-members of LREDA (i.e. people like Louise Marcoux) to be given delegate status at GA. The goal is a vote on this change at GA 2018.

The UCS Board of Trustees received this request in January. They viewed it as a justice issue and a way of standing up for the congregation's values about religious education. The Unitarian Church of Sharon has long understood the importance of religious education to the health of this congregation and of our movement. Even when UCS was a small congregation, religious education was a priority. Over the years, the Board of Trustees has listened to its religious educators' counsel and budgeted resources so that the program -- and the congregation -- has grown and flourished. They believe that the UUA will benefit when the voices of DRES are included in the mix of delegates at GA. **Their vote was a unanimous yes.**

The Board has submitted this motion to the UUA. If at least 14 other congregations have submitted this same motion by February 1, there will be a vote this June at GA -- so that religious educators could have a voice and vote at GA 2019.

Our Committees

Membership Committee

The Membership Committee strives to encourage the congregation's growth and help newcomers deepen their involvement in the UCS.

We have around 190 members and influx of newcomers. Many of our visitors have heard about UCS through a friend or the local newspaper, or have seen our rainbow banner or website before they visit us. We put a lot of our energy into welcoming newcomers at our Sunday service, since that is typically their first contact with our congregation. We always have a Membership Committee member at the door, watching out for people who might be first-time visitors; we answer any questions they might have, and encourage them to stay after the service for our coffee hour. If they have children, we try to connect them with someone in the Religious Education (RE) program. We also ask them to fill out a brief visitors form and if they would like to receive our newsletter. Together with the Linda Cveckova, the Office Manager, we maintain the membership database. Regular visitors who want to join the congregation are asked to complete a membership application, which is submitted to the board of trustees for approval.

What seems to motivate the visitors to become members and what seems to keep our members engaged over many years? Interesting worship services including good music, strong RE classes, meaningful social justice work and good programing that offers the members a role on the multiple committees that keep things going. It is not just the membership committee, but the entire congregation has to play a role to provide opportunities for people to be active participants in the life of the church.

Our committee has two major rituals: we introduce new members to the congregation as part of a membership-book-signing ceremony during a regular service, and we organize an all-ages holiday potluck dinner early in December.

Religious Education News

February in RE

This month our **Preschool-Kindergarten** children will explore the themes of listening, love, remembering and waiting. They will discover that listening and talking are ways of sharing, and they will create valentines and discuss how feeling loved brings people joy. They will also play a memory game, be encouraged to share their experiences and feelings about waiting, and create a dripping paint project.

The **Grade 1-2** group will be continuing their OWL curriculum Their sessions will cover keeping their bodies healthy and safe, exploring all types of families and talking about the feelings associated with being a part of a family, especially when there is change. The class will join with the Grade 3-4 class on February 18th for a special joint RE lesson.

In addition to teaming up with the Grade 1-2 group on February 18th, the **Grade 3-4** students will visit the preschool-kindergarten children for a session that demonstrates that giving time and love are the most valuable gifts. Later in February the group will discuss the idea that our flaws are sometimes revealed to be beautiful and give us strength. They will also talk about gender stereotypes and try a role-playing activity.

The **Grade 5-6** group will continue to work on planning a social action project of their own design. The class will explore the topic of being true to oneself as they hear the story of Charles Darwin. They will discuss the idea that imperfections can be beautiful, and the group will join with the junior youth on Febraury 18th for a joint session in which they'll create cards of caring for members of our community.

In addition to their joint session with Grade 5-6, the **Grade 7-8** students will have a busy month. They have been learning about Judaism and are preparing to visit Temple Sinai on February11th. The group will then turn their studies to Islam at months end.



Brown Envelope Update

Thanks to the generosity of our community, we collected \$1,250 in BE donations for five local food pantries (Sharon/Stoughton, Foxboro, Walpole, Norwood, and

Canton) during the three Sunday morning services in December. (Interesting factoid: one pantry reports that our monetary donation allows them to purchase food in bulk from the Boston Food Bank, and that our \$250 equals 3.3 **tons** of supplies!) In addition, a total of \$1375 was collected during the offertory at the two Christmas Eve services, which was turned into grocery gift cards and donated to MainSpring House in Brockton.

In January, our BE funds will support UU Mass Action, whose director, Laura Wagner, was our pulpit guest on January 21.

The recipients of BE funds collected on three Sundays will be the Equal Justice Initiative (eji.org), an Alabamabased organization led by Bryan Stevenson, committed to ending mass incarceration and excessive punishment in the United States, to challenging racial and economic injustice, and to protecting basic human rights for the most vulnerable people in American society. (Stevenson's book Just Mercy was a recent UUA Common Read that we explored in detail.) During the BLUU service on February 11, donations will support a nation-wide UUA fundraising effort on behalf of BLUU, with a possibility of one-to-one matching. See the Order of Service in February for details.

Social Justice Sunday January 21

Thank you to Laura Wagner, Executive Director of UUMass Action, for leading our service, sharing her personal story and bringing us information on the many ways our faith calls us to change the world. Here in Massachusetts, oppression, racism, mass incarceration, environmental injustice, immigrant criminalization, LGBTQI rights, economic injustice are all issues needing our response. Laura gave us many ways to work for justice in all of these areas. She spoke of intersectionality, ways UU Congregations and other organizations can come together to build unity and strength in working for justice. The UU Mass Action weekly newsletter gives current information on actions needing justice work to which we can respond as individuals, teams, congregations, and interfaith organizations. Laura gave us information on current bills in legislative committee needing citizen advocacy. After the service during Coffee Hour, the congregation gathered at the Do It Now table to sign letters to senators and representatives sponsoring the bills remaining in committee and needing to be moved out by the February 7 deadline. Those bills are Safe Communities Act and nine clean energy bills.

Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism (BLUU) Worship Service

On February 11, the special worship service "The Promise and Practice of our Faith" will be built around the words and experiences of Black Unitarian Universalists. We will introduce the UU organization Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism (BLUU) and join other congregations and our Association's leaders in committing to support this ministry. Interfaith Vigil in Solidarity with Immigrants

On Sunday, January 21, 60-70 people (including Linda Fingerson, Gilly Gilson, John Schumacher and Janet Schmidt from our church) gathered near the South Bay House of Correction in Boston for an interfaith vigil of prayer and song, to stand up for the rights of immigrants detained by ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) in a section of the jail. We carried paper hearts, each labeled with the name, country, and date of death of an immigrant detainee. As we waved and held up the hearts, detainees responded by banging on the windows, holding up signs and waving back. (See pictures below.) The vigil was sponsored by MCAN (Massachusetts Communities Action Network (www.mcan-pico.org), and the next one is scheduled for March 18th at 2pm.

Nicaragua Service Trip for Adults
