And you are left with that uncomfortable sense that you are dissatisfied and that there is probably something interesting happening to other people in the world, but not you. That uncomfortable feeling motivates many people to put down the phone, get off the couch, and look for something new and genuinely engaging to do in the world.

Parents: if your kid is casting about for a new adventure, please be aware -- there are things to do at church in August. Making copies. Putting together teacher orientation packets. Scanning documents. Organizing the online RE Archive. Organizing the art paper in the RE Storage Closet. Unclogging the caps of the glue bottles. Organizing the children's library. And much more.

Many children and youth can benefit from a volunteer gig at church. Katherine Reynolds Lewis has talked about the negative effects of the "unemployment" of children and youth. "They're not asked to do anything to contribute to a neighborhood or family or community," Lewis told NPR in a recent interview. "And that really erodes their sense of self-worth — just as it would with an adult being unemployed." 

Stuff, Space and Storage Taskforce

It's a long road to getting better organized, folks. How



will you know when we get there? For sure, Stuff will have a home. Closets will post a directory, shelves will have labels. And you and I will know where to put back the vase, the easel, anything that was taken out for a meeting and anything someone else has taken out for anything.

When I first came to the church in 1976, we were a tiny congregation with no minister and no paid RE director, and we did all the work that needed to be done and we all pitched in. I knew where the markers were kept and I felt a keen responsibility to put them back.

In a mid-size congregation people have a different mindset, for reasons. There's a lot more stuff and a lot more people. And we have a lot of shared, multi-use space as well. It's no surprise we need more efficient storage and explicit systems for effective use of space. And we need ways of communicating, not just to a few, but to all. We are all in this together:)

As we move into our 10th year of the addition, space is at a premium. The taskforce and committees have completed inventories (office and minister's office to be done in summer) and have purged items not useful. We have identified specific storage needs, adding better access to one closet, and remakes of large RE items that are hard to store, as well as requesting help with off-site storage which frees up one entire closet. A full report forthcoming.

Beyond our Walls

The Beyond our Walls Committee follows denominational events between our church and other churches, other churches in the UUA (Unitarian Universalist Association), and with the UUA. Some items of note are as follows:

Rev. Wendy Bell belongs to an Interfaith Clergy Group of Sharon houses of religion. It is a busy group and there may be a vigil on gun violence soon.

On November 4th there will be a Cluster Potluck Dinner at our church. The Five-Point Cluster is a cooperative grouping of the Foxboro, Sharon, Canton, Easton, Stoughton and Brockton UU churches. The Cluster regularly schedules trainings and other events so that we can interact with other churches and UU's and together do more than we might as individual churches. One very interesting event is one church inviting the members of the remaining churches to attend their services on a holiday weekend. On October 11th the Canton Church is hosting this shared service. We have an open invitation to all the other Cluster churches for the entire summer since some of them close for the summer. We will also host the shared service on February 17th.

We help with the CommUnity Closet at the Brockton Universalist Unitarian Church. At the closet we distribute used clothes targeted to needy people in the Brockton area once a month. Used clothes can be donated at the Social Justice table in the Vestry. In August we could use some volunteers to run the open day. See Jim Mullin if you are interested.

We have partner churches in Romania and England. In Romania we support a young man through school and pay the subscriptions to the UU magazine. Colleen Tuck has visited Romania several times and has interesting stories about our partner church. The Portsmouth, UK church interaction is primarily social with several pen pals continuing over recent years.

Lastly, at least two of our members will attend the General Assembly (the UUA annual meeting) later this month in Kansas City. We hope they enjoy both the GA and the city.

UU Sharon supports GA delegate status for religious educators

This February, the UCS Board of Trustees was among 30+ UU church boards from across this country that voted to support an initiative that would give professional religious educators (those who serve congregations but are not members of them) delegate status at

General Assembly (GA). At GA, UUs come together to make decisions about the present and future of the association. Only delegates are allowed to speak at the microphones and vote on the articles.

The initiative succeeded. A vote on the question of delegate status was scheduled for GA 2018 in Kansas City.

The professional organization of religious educators then reached out nationally to find a graphic designer to draw attention to this important decision. Our very own Kate Parker-O'Toole responded to this request. Kate designed this huge banner, as well as buttons, stickers, postcards, and social media.

The Liberal Religious Educators Association expresses their gratitude to Kate Parker-O'Toole and to the Unitarian Church of Sharon for their support for a voice and a vote for religious educators at General Assembly. Results TBA



Call to Action - A key law protecting transgender people here in Massachusetts is at risk. In November 2018, Massachusetts voters will be asked at the ballot box whether to uphold the law that protects transgender people from discrimination in public places, such as restaurants, shops, and hospitals, or to repeal these protections. New keyless doors coming to UCS this summer!

B&G and the Board of Trustees are developing a plan to convert several of the doors at church to a new keyless-entry system, thus eliminating the need for most of us to keep track of our churchissued keys.
