October 7: Faith and our "Search for Truth and Meaning"

<u>Guest preacher</u>: Barbara Nelkin-Rose, Interfaith Minister

We will explore what faith is, on both an inter-faith and an intra-faith level and the role faith plays in the 4th UU Principle: "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning."

<u>Bio</u>: Rev. Barbara Nelkin-Rose (aka Barbara Rose), one of our own Church members, was recently ordained as an Interfaith Minister this past June, 2018 by One Spirit Learning Alliance in New York City. She is



also a Reiki Practitioner, a composer and facilitator of a meditation/discussion group focusing on inner exploration and spiritual growth. These activities, along with her family – husband Jeff, three adult children and a granddog - bring joy and meaning to her life.

October 14: True Belonging

Our nation is deeply and painfully divided as we head into next month's midterm elections. This morning we explore ways to bridge that divide as we reflect on some of the wisdom from Brene Brown's new book, Braving the Wilderness: The Quest for True Belonging and the Courage to Stand Alone.

October 21: Is Everyone Welcome at the Table?

Guest preacher: Rev. Jane Dwinell

We Unitarian Universalists like to think we are accepting of everyone, but are we really? Do we often make assumptions (often incorrect) about people we meet?

<u>Bio</u>: The Rev. Jane Dwinell is a retired UU minister who specialized in assisting small congregations and is the author of Big Ideas for Small Congregations. Currently, she lives in Burlington, VT, with her partner, Sky Yardley, who has early stage Alzheimer's disease. They



have a blog, <u>alzheimerscanyon.blogspot.com</u>, where they share their experiences of living with this disease. For fun, they garden, spend time in and on Lake Champlain, and take in a round of disc golf whenever possible.

In J.R.R. Tolkien's novel, The Two Towers, as the Hobbits find themselves traveling in great peril, Frodo tells Sam that he's afraid he can't go on. "I know," says Sam. "It's all wrong. By rights we shouldn't even be here. But we are."

With all that's going on in our country right now, including what feels like a continuous assault on women and our rights to bodily integrity, not to mention on democracy itself, I confess that there are mornings that I wake up feeling like rather like Frodo, and needing a pep-talk like the one that Sam goes on to give.

"It's like in the great stories, Mr. Frodo," Sam said. "The ones that really mattered. Full of darkness and danger they were. And sometimes you didn't want to know the end. Because how could the end be happy. How could the world go back to the way it was when so much bad had happened. But in the end, it's only a passing thing, this shadow. Even darkness must pass. A new day will come. And when the sun shines it will shine out the clearer. Those were the stories that stayed with you. That meant something. Even if you were too small to understand why. But I think, Mr. Frodo, I do understand. I know now. Folk in those stories had lots of chances of turning back only they didn't. Because they were holding on to something."

Frodo asks, "What are we holding on to, Sam?"

And Sam replies, "That there's some good in this world, Mr. Frodo. And it's worth fighting for."

There is so very much that is good in this world. That belief has long been fundamental to the Unitarianism that we inherited from our religious forebearers. As has been the belief that it's worth fighting for.

I hope that in the midst of this busy fall of the ministerial search process, as you attend cottage meetings and the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop on Sunday, October 21st, and as you carry on with the business of church...I hope you will remember how important the work of this liberal religious community really is. For we are called by our tradition to defend human dignity and truth and democracy - all core to our Unitarian Universalist Principles. Together we are part of one of those great stories, the ones that really mattered. Let us not turn back.

From the Director of Religious Education



Agreements

Our agreements with one another matter. This statement forms the cornerstone of Unitarian Universalist religious education.

In September, our children and youth began the church

year by making agreements of how they would be together – how to make RE be a fun and meaningful time together. They wrote up their covenant and each signed their name – thereby agreeing to be called back to the covenant at times when they stray from it.

From our children came some standard inclusions: "One person talks at a time." "Gentle touch (with permission). No hitting, please!" and "Allow everyone to share or pass."

And some surprising additions: "Respect different learning styles." "Opportunities for safe movement during class." "Be brave. Take risks."

My take-away: our children take covenant-making seriously. They are willing to put themselves out there to make being in community work for both themselves personally and their group as a whole.

Last spring, the committee chairs discussed ways of helping adults in our congregation look out for one another as a group. Responding to concerns from RE teachers, they created a procedure for "what to do when worship continues after 11:30." RE is supposed to end at 11:30. Parents are expected to pick their children up by 11:35, so that teachers can clean up and then participate in coffee hour or leave for a family commitment. Now, if worship continues past 11:35, parents are asked to leave the sanctuary, pick up their kids, and then return to the sanctuary (if worship continues) or coffee hour (if worship has concluded). This way, these volunteers have confidence that their commitment ends at 11:35 and can plan their lives accordingly.

Getting used to a new set of agreements can be challenging. We may discover glitches in this procedure. Some people may forget that the procedure exists. Only by communicating with one another about our observations will we be able to fine-tune this arrangement and figure out how best to work together.

BEYOND CATEGORICAL THINKING

"Will the new minister hear me? Will my concerns and needs be met? Will the minister understand what I'm living with? How will the community respond to our minister?"

In answering these questions, a picture of the "ideal minister" (categorized by age, gender, gender identity, nationality, physical ability, race, and sexual orientation) comes to mind. With this picture in place, it can be easy to unintentionally exclude ministers who fall into certain categories. At times, as we get caught up in comparing candidates to our "picture," we can even forget what it is we hoped for in a minister.

On Sunday, October 21,we will participate in the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop offered by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) for congregations involved in the search for a new minister. The Search Committee invites all congregational leaders, members, and friends to participate in this workshop.

The Beyond Categorical Thinking program is designed to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair discrimination in the search process for a new minister. This program includes a three-hour BCT workshop and a Sunday morning service with Rev. Jane Dwinell, a facilitator trained by the UUA. In the workshop, attendees will:

- Consider the hopes, expectations, and concerns they have for a new minister
- Learn more about the ministerial search process, and
- Explore how thinking categorically about people sometimes interferes with choosing the best candidate.

Please plan to come on **Sunday, October 21**, to participate in this important and thought-provoking workshop, which will meet from 12:30 to 3:30 PM. We'll provide child care, and a nice sociable lunch beforehand for all who'd like to stay straight through after the worship service.

Religious Education News

October in RE

October will find our **Preschool-Kindergarten** class talking about trees. They'll visit some trees on the church grounds to explore their beauty, talk about ways we can care for trees, and learn about recycling. The effects of rain will also be discussed. A Halloween themed session will complete the month with the children playing pumpkin games and making masks.

The **Grade 1-2** group will be learning about family and faith ancestors and their legacies. They will explore the similarities and differences among families of all shapes and sizes, as well as learn about graces and blessings while making a grace table tent to take home. The last week of October will see the class beginning their Revels sessions which focus on the solstice.

The **Grade 3-4** students will spend part of the month learning about the practice of prayer. They will also explore empathy as a tool to help them treat others with kindness and respect. Then at month's end they will begin their Revels sessions focusing on the stories and traditions of Hanukkah.

The **Grade 5-6** class will explore the power of growth and place; learning about the journey our food takes and planting herbs, thinking about one's connection to one's location and learning about partnerships that exist between UU churches despite distance. They will also reflect on how the themes they've discussed so far this year can be expressed in life and further explored. The class will also jump into Revels at months end.

The **Grade 7-8** students will be continuing their OWL curriculum. The sessions in October will include the language of sexuality, anatomy and physiology, personal concerns about puberty and discussing body image.

October is Fire Safety Month

What can we do to honor Fire Safety Month in our congregation?

- Know what to do when the fire alarm sounds.
 We will have a fire drill at the end of a worship service during the month of October.
 - a. When the alarm sounds, parents/guardians should resist the impulse to rescue their children. They should exit the sanctuary as quickly as possible through either the front or back exits and then gather on the side lawn of the church, well away from the building. Parents/guardians should wait with other worshippers on the side lawn until the fire department gives an all-clear signal, at which point they may pick up their children from their RE Groups.
 - b. RE volunteers and nursery staff have been trained to evacuate all children from the building. They will bring the children to the lawn in front of the shed, where they will re-take attendance and stay in a group until the all-clear by the fire department. RE volunteers will stay with the children until parents/guardians pick them up.
- 2. Take action to promote fire safety at church.
 - a. We are a chalice-lighting people. If you see matches left out after a gathering, feel empowered to put them away in a chalice lighter's supply box (on the top shelf of the either coat closet).
 - b. Help keep hallways clear of objects. Everyone is empowered to move the rolling bulletin boards from the vestry to Program C AFTER the children have been picked up from Program C. (The boards are stored in C, but cannot be put there until the children have left)

Support for urgent Social Justice needs

September has been a difficult month, with several painful events making headlines. At the September SJC meeting, a lengthy discussion resulted in a number of actions being taken

to support critical efforts. In response to the gas line explosions in the Merrimack Valley, we designated \$1000 from our Shopping for Justice fund to sustain Lawrence Community Works as they support numerous families driven from their homes. Additionally, we have begun to collect specific items needed by the victims of this tragedy (see below). We also released \$500 from our discretionary Fair Trade fund to support the educational work of Freedom for All Massachusetts, related to the Transgender Rights ballot initiative in November (see below). Lastly, or October Brown Envelope collection will support the UUA's Disaster Relief Fund, which focuses on flexible responses to long term needs in communities recovering from a range of disasters, including Hurricane Florence and similar events.

Living Our Faith in Response to the Tragedy in the Merrimack Valley

The City of Lawrence is requesting donations of desperately needed items for victims of the recent gas explosions and fires. We will be collecting hand sanitizers, alcohol pads, socks, underwear for kids and adults, blankets, toiletries, feminine products, toilet paper, and towels. Please place your donations in the marked boxes in the Vestry, which will then be delivered to Lawrence.

CommUnity Closet: Volunteer to help on 13 October

It will be our church's opportunity to staff the CommUnity Closet in October. The Closet is an effort by 6 local UU churches (the Five Point Cluster) to distribute clothes to needy people in Brockton. It is based at the Universalist Unitarian Church of Brockton on West Elm St. Staff will help people find things, distribute bags, restock and clean when possible in 2 ½ hour shifts (9:30AM to noon and 11:30 to 2PM). Helpers generally find the work easy to learn and rewarding. Their shift goes by quickly. We will need at least five volunteers: three in the morning and two in the afternoon. (Donations of new and gently used clothing can be placed in the collection bins in the Vestry.) Transgender Rights Question 3 on the Massachusetts Ballot

In November, Massachusetts will vote YES on 3 to uphold respect and dignity. Here's what you need to know: On Election Day, Massachusetts' voters will face the first -ever statewide popular vote on protections for transgender people from discrimination. The referendum, if it fails, would repeal our state law that protects transgender people from discrimination in public places, including restaurants, stores, and doctors' offices. A "yes" vote on Question 3 keeps the current law as it is. Here is Question 3:

Do you approve of a law summarized below, which was approved by the House of Representatives and the Senate on July 7, 2016? This law adds gender identity to the list of prohibited grounds for discrimination in places of public accommodation, resort, or amusement. Such grounds also include race, color, religious creed, national origin, sex, disability, and ancestry. A "place of public accommodation, resort or amusement" is defined in existing law as any place that is open to and accepts or solicits the patronage of the general public, such as hotels, stores, restaurants, theaters, sports facilities, and hospitals. "Gender identity" is defined as a person's sincerely held gender-related identity, appearance, or behavior, whether or not it is different from that traditionally associated with the person's physiology or assigned sex at birth.

A YES VOTE would keep in place the current law, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of gender identity in places of public accommodation.

A NO VOTE would repeal this provision of the public accommodation law.


