On March 28th, we will have submitted our rankings of final candidates to the UUA. Shortly thereafter, the UUA will have confirmed a match and we will have made an offer to our #1 candidate. If accepted, contract negotiations will have begun as soon as possible. When our candidate is confirmed, an email will be sent to the congregation to let you know who that person will be.

And then, get ready for **Candidating Week**! Sunday April 28th through Sunday May 5th, our candidate will be at church for a variety of "meet and greet" activities, will preach on both of the Sundays, will participate in meet-

Once again, I am writing after another act of terror, this time at a mosque in New Zealand that left fifty dead and many injured at the hands of a hateful and cowardly man. I am heartened by the response from around the world and impressed with

the leadership of New Zealand's Prime Minister, Jacinda Ardern. I am also tired. I am deeply concerned (and sad) about what is happening in our country and around the world and very grateful to be part of our Unitarian community and congregation.

From the President

I was heartened by the demonstration of our values in diversity, love, respect, equality, honesty, integrity, peace, and justice during a vigil at the Islamic Center of New England on Monday, March 18th. Many, many people from our congregation were there to lend support with hundreds of others from churches, synagogues, mosques, and the community. I was struck by the welcome of the members of the Center. Our Muslim community was so grateful that we had come to their Center to support them, and I heard many comments about the isolation that they increasingly feel. There was some genuine surprise that the community had come there in support, and my heart broke at that surprise. Of course we were there. Where else could we be? We need to continue to do good and do better, so that our brothers and sisters of all faiths know that we are one community; support should never be a surprise.

During the vigil, attendees were challenged to respond to this latest terror attack by doing fifty good deeds to remember the 50 victims as a way to drive out evil. To take our sadness and anger and move it to something greater - loving kindness. These good deeds include continuing our practice as Unitarians and advocating for justice, love, and respect. Clearly, continued support for those impacted by terror attacks is needed. It all feels too big. But, I know that universal change begins with us, and our community, and each of us can start by doing 50 MORE acts of kindness. I challenge you not to stop with your 50 acts – let them never stop.

I am so grateful to be part of this community. Thank you for always showing me what human kindness is.

April in RE

April begins with RE Sunday on the 7th! Every agegroup is excited to share with the whole congregation something they have accomplished or learned in this year's RE program.

On the second Sunday of April students in grades 1 through 6 will join together for a session with special guest Laurie Wallace of the Search Committee who will explain the ministerial search process to the students.

Another multi-age class will take place on the third Sunday of April when grades 1 through 8 will celebrate Easter with art and meditation activities.

Preschool Kindergarten will join the children in the nursery for their mid-month sessions and will end April exploring the changes spring brings while taking a color walk outdoors.

The **Grade 1-2** group will end the month exploring how their family and faith homes are tied to their memories. They will make foil handprints.

The **Grade 3-4** students will participate in a session that focuses on generosity and empathy. They will make a gift to share with one of the younger RE groups.

The story of a girl who inspired her family to move to a smaller home in order to donate money to charity will be the focus for the **Grade 5-6** class at month's end. They will explore how one's passion can lead towards acts of goodness and justice.

The **Grade 7-8** students will return to their OWL curriculum for the last week of April. They will explore the topic of unintended pregnancies.

Laurel, who studied with Master Irish fiddler Séamus Connolly, was an instructor for the Boston College Irish Studies program from 1994 until 2007 and currently teaches at the Indian Hill Music School in Littleton, Massachusetts. Laurel has released two solo recordings, The Groves and Larks & Thrushes, and a book and CD set Forget Me Not: Fifty Memorable Traditional Irish Tunes. Both Laurel and Kathleen are members of the renowned Childsplay fiddle ensemble.

Sarah Martin grew up in a house full of music. Trained as a classical violinist and violist, Sarah has gradually moved towards traditional Irish fiddle music. Sarah also loves singing, composing and playing guitar, and in 2010 she released an album of her own songs, In-Between Lullabies.

On May 1st, at 7pm, we will dis-

cuss Excellent Women by Barbara Pym. Mildred Lathbury, a clergyman's daughter and mild-mannered spinster in 1950s England, is one of those "excellent women," the smart, supportive, repressed women who men take for granted. As Mildred gets embroiled in the lives of her new neighbors, the novel presents a series of snapshots of human life as actually, and pluckily, lived in a vanishing world of manners and repressed desires.

Our choice for June 5th is Cat Country: A Satirical Novel of China in the 1930s by Lao She. When a traveler from China crash-lands on Mars, he finds himself in a country inhabited entirely by Cat People. Befriended by a local cat-man, he becomes acquainted in all aspects of cat-life, including language, poetry and the local narcotic. Curiosity turns to despair when he ventures further into the heart of the country and the culture, and realizes that he is witnessing the bleak decline of a civilization.

Brown Envelope donations:

We recently discovered that the Brown Envelope donation from our 2018 **Christmas Eve** services, which was sent to **Father Bills & MainSpring House** in Brockton to support their ongoing work to end homelessness, was eligible for a 1:1 match by a generous donor; thus our \$975 gift became \$1950.

Our Brown Envelope collections in February raised \$1,190.35 for the **Equal Justice Initiative**. The EJI is committed to ending mass incarceration and excessive punishment in the United States, to challenging racial and economic injustice, and to protecting basic human rights for the most vulnerable people in American society. Your financial support is greatly appreciated.

In March, following the informative Sunday worship service presentation by **Annawon Weeden** on Native American culture and related environmental concerns, we have chosen the **Native Land Conservancy** (nativelandconservancy.org) as our Brown Envelope recipient. "After centuries of hardship and economic struggle, it is only now that we can finally attend to the important work of protecting sacred spaces, habitat areas for our winged and four legged neighbors and other essential ecosystems resources to benefit Mother Earth and all human beings."

During April, the Brown Envelope collection will be dedicated to support of the annual **Mother's Day Walk** for Peace, hosted by the **Louise D. Brown Peace Institute** (mothersdaywalk4peace.org). This year the SJC will field a team of walkers from Dorchester to Boston City Hall on Mother's Day, Sunday 12 May, and the Brown Envelope collection in April will contribute to our financial commitment to the cause.

<u>Rise Up and Tip the Scale Toward Justice</u>: The Annual Mother's Day Walk for Peace -May 12, 2019

Every year in the United States, approximately 15,000 people are murdered. For every homicide victim, there are at least 10 immediate people directly impacted by that loss. It is safe to say each year there are at least 150,000 new survivors of homicide victims dealing with the emotional, physical and financial stress of losing a loved one to a traumatic death such as murder. This is not including families who are impacted by a loved one committing a murder. Together we can heal and have an impact.

The Annual Mother's Day Walk for Peace started in 1996 so mothers of murdered children could receive support and love from their neighbors. Twenty-three

years later, the Mother's Day Walk continues to be a powerful way to honor our loved ones who have been murdered and embrace our partners in peacemaking. The Mother's Day Walk is also the Peace Institute's most important fundraising event. We hope you will help us raise our goal of \$400,000. Transgender and Non-Binary sensitivity within the UUA and UCS

An article in the Spring 2019 edition of UU World, titled After the L, G, and B while written with the intention of encouraging the inclusivity of trans and nonbinary people within our UU congregations, ended up with a strong backlash from those it was intending to support, and an apology by the Editor acknowledging the damage it had actually inflicted. We cannot take away the harm this article has already caused to those identifying as trans, non-binary or any other non-traditional gender identity, whether within or without our congregation. We can however, honor their right to feel whatever pain this article has caused them, and seek to limit additional harm in the future. We can use this as an opportunity to revisit what we can do to insure that we are truly an inclusive congregation, which fosters respect and open-mindedness in all of our relationships - to people of all gender identities, including trans and non-binary.

This article has reminded us that we need to continually examine our core values as a UU congregation and how we can keep our commitment to truly being an inclusive community. The ideal of inclusivity is easy. Putting it into practice is much more challenging and may indeed require us to go to places of discomfort and call upon us to look within to that which we fear and resist, individually and as a community. It is the goal of the Social Justice Committee to help the congregation explore honestly and with an open mind just how inclusive we actually are and how to continue building respectful relationships.

Some of us met in the immediate aftermath of the UU World article to explore how we as a congregation can best understand and support transgender and nonbinary members both here and elsewhere. We discussed a wide range of ideas spanning from more immediate actions we could take to those more long term and ongoing. As one of our first steps of action, we are offering a 'Tip Sheet of Key Practices' at the **Do It Now** table. These tips were provided by The Transforming Heart Collective, a group "of four trans and queer faith leaders that support congregations in becoming radically welcoming spiritual homes for queer and trans people of all races, classes, abilities, sexualities, and ages." The SJC, in partnership with RE, is in the process of developing a series of workshops and discussions based on their resources to be offered to the congregation in the future. We invite you to check out their website: transformingheartscollective.org as one excellent source of information.

Some of the short- and long-term ideas that may help educate us and support us in our broader goal of being a truly inclusive community include:

• **Use of pronouns** - Prior to the meeting, some congregants had already expressed a desire to include on their name tags the identifying pronouns they would like used (i.e. him/her/they, she/him/them);

• **Teaching Tools.** For instance, we have committed to making available to interested congregation members a 6 session course provided by the Transforming Hearts Collective and an opportunity for shared discussion. The course is designed to help us be a congregation that is "fully inclusive and affirming of the full breath of gender diversity" including trans and non-binary people;

Addressing the signage on the bathroom doors;

• **Providing a workshop** to educate ourselves on how we can be BOTH curious AND respectful at the same time, in all our relationships and in all our discussions, balancing a need for greater understanding with a need for privacy.

We invite you to share with us any other ideas you might have and we look forward to working with you to make this a truly inclusive community, respectful and open-minded to all.
