October 6: Though We Have Broken Our Vows a Thousand Times

Our Jewish friends will be observing Yom Kippur this week, the holiest day of the Jewish year, a day to atone for sins. As Unitarian Universalists we may not be comfortable with the language of "sin." Still, to reckon with how we may have failed ourselves or one another opens the possibility of transformation. This sermon will focus on the sin of racism and how racism has arbitrated who "belongs" and who is an "outsider" in our culture.

October 13: Choosing Courage

There is simply so much we cannot control in our beautiful and hurting world. How do we cultivate resilient communities in spite of all the uncertainty around us? What does it look like to make courage into a daily practice in our lives? Join Guest Minister, Rev. Natalie Malter, to reflect on choosing courage amidst the messiness.

The guest speaker is, **Rev. Natalie Malter** is a UU minister, who is currently a doctoral student in the Study of Religion at Harvard University. Her research focuses upon 19th and 20th century American religious history and the relationship between religion and



women's rights movements, particularly the lives of religious feminists in the 1970s. She served on the editorial board of *A Documentary History of Unitarian Universalism* (Skinner 2017) and is passionate about the ways in which UU history shapes our present and our future.

October 20: Whose Is This?

My two-year-old is very concerned about what's hers, and making sure everyone in the sandbox knows it: "Mine!" This morning we will consider: what belongs to us, and to what do we belong?

October 27: All Souls

A community of remembrance is a community of belonging. As part of our traditional All Souls service, you will be invited to light a candle and to name loved ones who have died. We will reflect on grief and loss, and the power of love to move us through it all.

From the Minister



Even though our apartment is in the middle of the city, it feels rather like a treehouse on our third-floor back porch. We're surrounded by trees, thanks to the scruffy patch of woods in the vacant lot behind our house and our next door neigh-

bors' small wooded backyards. There's a couple of black locust trees, some kind of pine tree with long needles, and a huge Norway maple tree. Norway maples are a non-native invasive species. Invasives make me frown and grumble because they tend to cause problems for native wildlife and thus can endanger the diversity of local flora and fauna. So I have had mixed feelings about this tree behind my house. Adding to the sort of sinking feeling I would get when gazing at my Norway maple, the last several seasons, every single leaf on that tree developed black spots and fell off. This was not in the usual "my leaves are elegantly changing color because it's fall" kind of falling off, but in a "ugh I'm sick and so I plummet" kind of falling off.

My daughter has a totally different attitude towards this tree. She loves watching the squirrels play in the branches and she loves listening to the woodpeckers hammer away at the trunks. She does not seem to mind the black splotches nor does she care that this tree is not native to the region. Her enjoyment has helped me realize that I can enjoy this tree too. I doubt it's close enough to an intact forest to threaten any biodiverse ecosystems, so I can let my guard down about the whole invasive thing. I have begun to appreciate how peaceful it is, how lovely its green leafy shade is, even with the spots. And how resilient it is! Year after year this tree has weathered this disease and still it keeps growing, leafing out and starting fresh each spring. It is a home to wildlife and it shades my house in the hot summer. And so this tree is reminding me that even something supposedly undesirable and sick can still be beautiful, strong, and welcoming. Our worship theme for the month of October is "Belonging" and I have realized, even though this tree is diseased and invasive, it still belongs in my backyard. I always love a lesson from a surprising

teacher, like a tree. What have been some unexpected teachers in your life lately?

It has been wonderful to get to sit down for conversations, coffee, and meals with several of you. Please do continue to reach out – I want to get to know you! This is the Mission Statement of our Church. I have to admit I need to read it every so often, to site with it and think about what it means as a board member and a congregant.

The Board's primary focus is to uphold this Mission by ensuring the Church can sustain itself financially and structurally. In addition, the Board supports the Ministerial work of the Church (worship, religious education, social justice, caring, music, adult education, youth). We do this with the staff and the volunteers who work hard for all of us to help create our Church community. Every member and friend helps build our Church community!

At the Board retreat on September 18th, we began to delineate our goals for the coming year. We are also continuing a discussion about our roles as a Board and how our work overlaps and contributes to the ministry of the church with the leadership of our Minister, Jolie Olivetti. At this writing, the Board is reviewing a draft of the goals as well as working with Jolie to establish her ministry goals. When they are finalized (hopefully at the Board's October meeting) we will share them you.

I can share a general overview for the October Chalice. The Board wants to ensure our financial sustainability, update the Church Bylaws, and update the Church Safe Congregation Policy from June 2018 to include protocols to secure the Church from an armed intruder and to respond if an attack occurs (awareness, prevention, preparedness and response). This work will include a process that includes your input and ability to get involved with task force participation as well.

Religious Education News

October in RE

The Preschool-Kindergarten group will encounter the beauty of nature, make chalices, discover some of the people who make up this congregation, and explore sad feelings (on the day that, during the family worship service, we light candles in memory of loved ones who have died).

The **Grades 1-4** group will explore awe and wonder as they build houses out of leaves, sticks, shells, and other natural objects that they gathered. They will also consider how flawed things can also be beautiful and how people live on in our memories after they die.

The **Grades 5-6** group will continue their exploration of the power in the qualities of flexibility, persistence, and gathering ("water power") by creating a learning experience for themselves to deepen their understanding of these qualities.

The **Grades 7-8** group will learn about Judaism and the 8 practices of welcoming as they prepare to visit Temple Sinai on October 20.

The family worship service on Sunday, October 27, will include an observance of All Souls Day. Everyone will have the opportunity to light a candle for a loved one who has died. The loved one need not be human -- children need space to honor and remember pets as well.

Should I register my children

in the RE program?

Eventually, yes. If you are new to the church, please come with your family a few times to make sure that you feel comfortable here. Please fill out a visitor form so that we know if your child has allergies and so that we can send you email warning you about an upcoming paint activity in your child's class.

All children and youth ages 0-18 years should register (eventually). Forms are available outside the RE office and on the church web site. Scholarships are available through the minister, the Director of Religious Education, or Christian Roulleau or Andrea Pannone (chairs of the RE Committee).

October is Fire Safety Month

What can we do to honor Fire Safety Month in our congregation?

- 1. Know what to do when the fire alarm sounds. We will have a fire drill at the end of a worship service during the month of October.
 - a. When the alarm sounds, parents/guardians should resist the impulse to rescue their children. They should exit the sanctuary as quickly as possible through either the front or back exits and then gather on the side lawn of the church, well away from the building. Parents/guardians should wait with other worshippers on the side lawn until the fire department gives an all-clear signal, at which point they may pick up their children from their RE Groups.
 - b. RE volunteers and nursery staff have been trained to evacuate all children from the building. They will bring the children to the lawn in front of the shed, where they will re-take attendance and stay in a group until the all-clear by the fire department. RE volunteers will stay with the children until parents/guardians pick them up.

2. Take action to promote fire safety at church.

- a. We are a chalice-lighting people. If you see matches left out after a gathering, feel empowered to put them away in a chalice lighter's supply box (on the top shelf of the either coat closet).
- b. Help keep hallways clear of objects. Everyone is empowered to move the rolling bulletin boards from the vestry to Program C AFTER the children have been picked up from Program C. (The boards are stored in C, but cannot be put there until the children have left)

Al-Anon Meeting - An 11th step Al-Anon group meets at UCS each Sunday evening at 7:15pm. It is an open meeting.



SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS



Here is the latest news on what's happening in the area of social justice here at the UCS. We like to say that everyone in the church community is a participant in this work, one way or another. Whether you come to monthly meetings and lead a sub-group on a cause

that stirs your passion, or if you do your grocery shopping via our Shopping for Justice program to help fundraise for the homeless and hungry neighbors in our communities, or if you roll up your sleeves and help build (nut-free) PB&J sandwiches for MainSpring House each month, or, rain or shine, join in a rally, vigil or march to raise awareness for an pressing cause, young and old, tall and short, we are all engaged somehow in the work of Social Justice. Here are some of the current projects that you might want to keep an eye on this fall:

Brown Envelope donations

Every month the SJC selects a program, cause or organization working towards social justice, and we offer congregants a chance to support their work via our Brown Envelope donations when we pass the plate during services. We attempt to reach out to a range of recipients, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally, on a wide range of topics.

During our lay-led services in July and August, including Labor Day weekend, the Brown Envelope collections supported the Summer Youth Programs of the **UU Urban Ministry in Roxbury** (<u>UUUM.org</u>). We raised \$736.06, to which we added funds from our Fair Trade profits to send them a check for \$800.

Our Brown Envelope collections in September are directed to our Partner Church in Gyulakuta, Transylvania. During the Reformation/Inquisition, Unitarianism was ruthlessly suppressed throughout Europe. But in Transylvania, on the edge of the Ottoman Empire, it was able to survive under the protection of the sultans, who wanted trouble-free borders. After centuries, it gradually spread westward, reaching England, and then moved on to North America. One way we can recognize the contribution Romania has made to perpetuate freedom of religious thought is to help support the Unitarian churches there, which are often very small and struggling. For many years, our congregation has supported our Partner Church in Gyulakuta. The money we raise via our Brown Envelope Collection in September pays for a musician during their worship service and for a copy of the monthly Romanian Unitarian magazine for each family, as well as other urgent local projects. They are enormously grateful for this support.

In October, we have chosen to support the **Environmen**tal Relief Fund of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (www.uusc.org). We struggle to find the best

way to respond to the ever-growing list of communities around the planet devastated by a range of environmental disasters, knowing that each has its own particular needs and often overlooked victims. By partnering with the UUSC, we know that critical needs will be responsibly met, thanks to their commitment to "help rebuild, provide resources, support families, and establish relationships with local groups that serve the communities that are often overlooked by mainstream relief efforts." Their current primary focus is on the devastation brought to the Bahamas by this season's hurricanes. Your gifts are gratefully received.

The 5C Group

Responding to the Climate Crisis through Curiosity, Compassion and Connection

As a result of a sermon addressing the climate crisis, given by Rev. Barbara Nelkin-Rose last March, a group called the 5C Group was formed. Its purpose was twofold: 1) to provide a space where congregants could authentically share their thoughts and feelings about the climate crisis, including their grief, overwhelm and despair, AND 2) use the qualities of Curiosity, Compassion and Connection to find ways to help us move, both individually and as a nation, from a reactive state of fear, anger and guilt to a responsive state of hope, solution seeking and centeredness. The group met twice last year where we shared our feelings, ideas and information about the climate crisis and supported each other through some spiritual practices. Our next meeting is scheduled for Sunday, October 27th at noon, where we will continue to explore our feelings about the climate crisis, the ways each one of us is called to take action and how we can become stronger allies to the youth, both within our congregation and within the wider community, determined to face the crisis head on.

And speaking of the youth - Members of the 5C aroup who were involved in supporting the Sharon High School students participating in the Boston Climate Strike on September 20th were inspired by the number of students who chose to attend the Boston rally and who shared with us their fears and calls to action prior to catching the train into Boston. They left us with a greater resolve to work even more strongly as their allies, to help educate our members and those in our community about the scientific evidence supporting the need to act now to address and allay fears about the goals of the climate strikers and find ways in which people can take action which they feel called to do. So let's keep asking ourselves these questions: What am I called to do? What do I choose to do now? What am I inspired to do now? Please join us at our next meeting on October 27th at noon. We hope to see some new faces, including those of our youth. (Join <u>the5cgroup@lists.uusharon.org</u> to stay informed.)

Climate Action Protest

On Friday, September 20, youth in over 120 countries walked out of school to express their deep concerns, fears, disappointment, grief and anger over what they believe is the failure of adults to put solutions into place that would begin to mitigate climate change - and in their view - a global climate crisis which threatens life on this planet. Young climate activists believe that the foundation of a stable climate, which shaped our way of life for millennia, will crumble in their lifetimes. Immediate and decisive action to transform our energy system is the only solution. These young climate activists see current and worsening impacts of climate change - floods, fires,

who are scared of what the climate crisis means to the people and place they love. And these young climate activists are organized. They are gathering in class-

rooms, living rooms and places of worship across this country and around the world. They believe that everyone has a role to play, and that by uniting in the millions, they (and assuredly we) can turn the movement into political power to put solutions into place to end climate change. The youth climate movement is organized under several networks - Youth Climate Network, StrikeWithUs, GlobalClimateStrike, SunriseMovement, and ZeroHour. Of these, Sunrise Movement is a Massachusettsbased organization started in 2017. To learn more about Sunrise Movement, go to https:// www.sunrisemovement.org. A new chapter of the Sunrise Movement (Blue Hills Chapter) will be starting here in Sharon, meeting at the

sea-level rise - as evidence of an increasingly deadly climate crisis. These activists are "building an army of young people who are working to make climate change a priority and to elect leaders who will stand up for the health and well-being of all people, and end the corrupting influence of fossil fuel executives on our politics." They are ordinary young people

Here in Sharon, approximately 100 Sharon High School students joined the climate strike, first rallying at the school, then marching to town center to join the interfaith rally held by adult allies at Unitarian Church of Sharon, then continued their march to the Sharon train station to join the actions in Boston. At the rally at UCS, they chanted, sang, gave speeches expressing their deep fears, grief and anger at the failure of leaders to work to end the climate crisis, but also expressed their vision and hope for a better future, as well as their willingness to work for it. They called on all adults to become adult allies to their movement and many of us who attended the rally feel ready to learn more, get involved and become those adult allies. We hope that you will join us!

Green Team Update

At the recent Bean Supper the Green Team organized a sorting station in order to ensure that compostable items were separated from trash and that there was rinse water for those who brought their own table service. Because we are in the process of transitioning to compostable or reusable items for all of our various communal events, it was decided to use up previously purchased plastic silverware and noncompostable plates. That said, some compostable plates were used as well as compostable plastic cups. One full black pail of

- .849 Kilograms of fossil fuel (one litre or .26 gal) and
- Emits 562 grams of Greenhouse Gases (1.2 pounds).

Being a Welcoming Congregation Inclusion of Transgender and Non-Binary Congregants

In the April 2019 Chalice we reported on a backlash to an article in the Spring 2019 edition of UU World, titled <u>After</u>



the L, G, and B. The pain this article caused to many UUs who do not identify themselves by traditional gender terminology, reminded us that we continually need to examine our core values as a UU congregation and honor our commitment to be a truly inclusive community which fosters respect and open-mindedness in all of our relationships and to people of all gender identities, including trans and non-binary. At that time, we purchased a 6-session course provided by the Transforming Hearts Collective designed to help congregations "Deeply explore the intersection of trans identity, spirituality, and faith community, and gain the grounding, context, and skills to transform yourself and your congregation." This course is a very important resource, for as we look to becoming re-certified as a Welcoming Congregation, we will need to specifically account for how we welcome people of all gender identities.

A number of UCS congregants have already watched all, or part, of this course and have had very positive responses, finding them to be informative and helpful in creating discussion around this important issue. Additionally, SJC is working in close conjunction with our Religious Education Director, Louise Marcoux and our new Youth Coordinator, Katie Byron, to insure that the youth of our church are included in any future projects. Our goal is to create time and space for congregants to watch the sessions, either individually at home, or as a group in church, and then come together for sharing and discussion. We will keep you posted once specific dates have been determined, however, if you are interested in watching the modules sooner or would like to become more involved in the planning of this effort, please contact Gare Reid.

Community Closet

The CommUnity Closet is a project of our Five Point Cluster of UU churches in the area. We collect donated clothing and other items and offer items for free to the community on the 2nd Saturday on most months, operating out of the UU Church of Brockton (325 West Elm Street). Donations of gently used and new clothing can be left at the Do It Now Table in the Vestry. The focus now is on fall and winter items, as well as the everpresent need for new socks, underwear, diapers and sanitary items. Donations are greatly appreciated. Regular volunteers on Wednesday mornings are needed to transport and sort donated items. And it will again be our turn on Saturday, 12 October to staff the shop in Brockton: 2-3 volunteers are needed for either the 9:45-11:30 or the 11:15-1:15 shift. Ongoing Social Justice opportunities: you can support social justice causes in other ways as well: visit the Social Justice Corner in the Vestry, following Sunday worship services, where you can buy Fair Trade coffees, chocolates and other items. as well Shopping for Justice supermarket gift cards in various denominations for Shaws, Stop & Shop, and Big Y (+/-5% of the value is donated by the stores and stays with the church to help fund our social justice projects in support of people who experience food and housing insecurity). We also collect non-perishable food items for the local Food Pantry in the front Lobby, along with toiletries for the overnight guests of MainSpring House homeless shelter in Brockton. Once a month we also assemble 100 bag lunches for MSH. Clothing items for the CommUnity Closet are always welcome (drop-off in the Vestry). Don't forget to learn more about our monthly suggested offering for a worthy cause via our Brown Envelope donation program, and keep an eye out for our occasional Do It Now action requests at Coffee Hour for participatory efforts on a range of topics. Surely there is something related to social justice going on here at church that calls out to you - don't wait, jump right in!
