February 2 "Change Becomes You"

Change is not easy. And yet we are so often either in the midst of it, or we anticipate changes in our lives. Rev. Jolie will preach on this topic: how can we live into the messiness and necessity of change? And how does change call upon our resilience?

tive Director of UU Mass Action which is the State Action Network for Unitarian Universalists in Massachusetts. Her role is to organize and mobilize UUs to confront injustice and to provide opportunities for us to live our values and principles.

Laura Wagner has been a Unitarian Universalist for more than 25 years. During this time, she has held many lay leader positions but her primary focus has always been social justice.

Black Freedom organizer from the Civil Rights era Ella Baker said, "We who believe in freedom cannot rest until it comes." Rev. Jolie will lead worship today on the renewal of spirit that can come from organizing to change conditions of oppression and exploitation.

From the Minister



We will be considering the theme of Resilience in our worship services during the month of February. I have noticed that the word "resilient" more and more these days, a buzzword in everything from nonprofit mission statements to the blurbs on the back of organic milk cartons. Faced with

climate crisis and a bitterly divided nation, faced with the rise of fear-mongering nationalism at home and around the globe, we may feel anxious and brittle, we may be yearning for an assurance of our resilience. And just like "sustainable," the concept of "resilience" is both crucially important to our survival, and also at risk of being overused to the point of losing meaning. Where can true resilience be found?

Kenny Wiley, a lifelong UU and core team member of Black Lives of UU (BLUU), reflects on the relationship between joy and resilience in a 2015 UU World article. The article is about personal experiences of racial profiling and the power of Black friendship to help him through. Wiley writes, "The healing kind of laughter doesn't minimize the seriousness of what happened [in the racial profiling incident] or give up the struggle against injustice. The healing kind of laughter comes from being in community with people who truly understand." He also writes about Maya Angelou's friendship with James Baldwin, and how laughing with Baldwin helped her in the aftermath of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s assassination. I offer this reflection-within-areflection for its insights into resilience and in honor of Black History Month:

Maya Angelou turned forty on April 4, 1968. She had planned a big party in Harlem, with many of the day's black intellectual elite among the guests. History had other ideas; Dr. King's assassination sent Angelou into a weeks-long depression. It was fellow writer James Baldwin who helped her dig out of it. Angelou recalls Baldwin's assistance in her book <u>A Song Flung Up to Heaven</u>, where she writes that laughter and ancestral guidance got her through:

There was very little serious conversation. The times were so solemn and the daily news so somber that we snatched mirth from unlikely places and gave servings of it to one another with both hands... I told Jimmy I was so glad to laugh. Jimmy said, "We survived slavery. You know how we survived? We put surviving into our poems and into our songs. We put it into our folk tales. We danced surviving in Congo Square in New Orleans and put it in our pots when we cooked pinto beans... we knew, if we wanted to survive, we had better lift our own spirits. So we laughed whenever we got the chance.

Resilience is nothing new, and it's not just a way to attract funders, it doesn't just sound good in ad copy. People have called upon deep resilience in the context of terrible oppression for countless generations. What is it that puts you in touch with your resilience? Faced with the gravity of our times, do you feel tired, or resilient, or

both?

In congregational news, I am happy to report that we have assembled a great team to search for our next Religious Education Director. Andrea Pannone and Christian Roulleau on behalf of the RE Committee, Marcia Tranavitch on behalf of the Personnel Committee, and I are working together on this search. We have decided to search for an Interim DRE, to help guide us through the period to follow Louise Marcoux's 16 years of loving service to our congregation. To hire an Interim DRE accords with recommendations from our Unitarian Universalist Association: after a long-serving DRE, it is good to enter into an intentional time of transition with leadership dedicated to the process of change. Much like an Interim Minister, an Interim DRE serves for one or two years, and prepares the way for our next settled Religious Education professional. We will keep you posted on the process as updates are available, and we welcome your input and questions.

There's a great program for high school youth, who participate fully in GA via Youth Caucus. Visit www.uua.org/ga to lo learn more. The full agenda and program details will be posted there around the end of this month, but meanwhile rest assured that each day will be packed with varied opportunities to be enlightened, challenged, entertained and engaged. There's something for everyone at GA. Just ask some of our members, including graduates of our youth program, who've attended in past years about the GA experience.

You can register for the entire conference, or for one day, and if attending full-time can apply to earn free registration by serving as a GA volunteer. Our congregation is also entitled to three voting delegates for the business sessions. February in RE

What's Happening in RE in February: Love is the Doctrine of this Church

The **Preschool-Kindergarten** class will learn that they are part of a wonderful variety of Unitarian Universalist families that make up the whole congregational family. They will make a special jigsaw puzzle that demonstrates all these connections. In honor of Valentine's Day, the children will share their love for others by making gifts for friends and family.

The **Grade1-2** class continues with Our Whole Lives (OWL) and will learn about: taking care of their bodies, bodily privacy and sexual abuse prevention; family life in all of it's diversity; and the emotions and adjustments that come up when there is change in family (i.e., a new baby is born). Children in grades 1-2 who are not participating in OWL are welcome to join the P-K or Grade 3-6 class. See Louise Marcoux dre@uusharon.org for details.

The **Grade 3-6** class will focus on beloved community and how love can radiate out into the world. They will hear the story of "The Mish-Mash Heart" and learn how love becomes richer when it is given away or shared--they then will have the opportunity to make a collage representation of their own "mish-mash hearts." They will also hear the stories of four influential figures: Joseph Tuckerman, Unitarian Universalism's first community minister who worked with poor families of Boston sailors and Henry David Thoreau, Mohandas Gandhi, and Martin Luther King, Jr., prophetic leaders in different times, who found the power of peace.

The **Grade 7-8** class has been working with the Crossing Paths curriculum studying world religions all year and thus far, have learned about Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. In February, they finish up their study of of Islam, by reflecting on their recent visit to the Islamic Center of New England. For the remainder of the month, they will shift their focus to the study of Hinduism. They will learn about Samsara (the perpetual cycle of birth and death), Bhakti (the path of devotion) meditation and explore the similarities and differences between Unitarian Universalism and Hinduism.






Support Groups

Here is the latest SJC news about what's happening related to social justice here at the UCS. We all participant in these efforts, one way or another, and working as a community, our impact is felt within and beyond our walls. Learn more about some of the current projects that you might want to

keep an eye on this month:

Brown Envelope donations



Every month the SJC selects a program, cause or organization working towards social justice, and we offer congregants a chance to support their work via our Brown Envelope donations when we pass the plate during services. We attempt

to reach out to a range of recipients, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally, on a wide range of topics.

During December, we are once again supported the **5 local food pantries** in our surrounding communities of Foxboro, Walpole, Norwood, Canton and Stoughton/ Sharon through the Brown Envelope program. We raised \$1243.88, which was rounded up to \$1500 when the committee voted to use our discretionary funds, thus allowing us to send \$300 to each pantry. Additionally, as has been our tradition for many years, the entire collection from our Christmas Eve services was donated to the **Father Bill's & MainSpring House** program for the homeless in our area. Your gifts of \$721.00 was again rounded up with SJ funds, resulting in a donation worth \$1200 to our partners in Brockton. As it happens, this gift is eligible for a 1:1 match from a patron of the shelter, so our funds will have twice the impact this year.

In January 2020, the Brown E collection will go to support the work of the **Equal Justice Initiative** (www.eji.org), an Alabama based organization led by Bryan Stephenson. The EJI is committed to ending mass incarceration and excessive punishment, to challenging racial and economic injustice, and to protecting the basic human rights of the most vulnerable people in America. The work of the EJI is the basis for both the book (2014) and movie *Just Mercy* (in theaters now).

The February Brown Envelope collection will support the work of **UUMass Action** (<u>uumassaction.org</u>), the organization that unifies UUs from across the state for social justice causes:

VISION: A WORLD WHERE ALL PEOPLE ARE HON-ORED AND VALUED

"Our mission is to organize and mobilize UUs in Massachusetts to confront oppression. We provide pathways towards justice and identify opportunities in which we

MILITARY AND POLITICAL REALIGN-MENTS IN SYRIA TODAY

STUART SEARS, PH.D.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 2020, 7 PM UNITARIAN CHURCH OF SHARON

The past year has seen the destruction of the caliphate of the Islamic State, the further marginalization of the Free Syrian Army, and the near withdrawal of the United States. This has opened opportunities for nation states in the region, as well as the Russians, to assert their influence over Syrian territory. Syria's future, however, continues to be in doubt. The new configuration of forces does little to resolve the grievances underlying the Syrian civil war. This raises the possibility for insurgencies and new conflict between the states operating in Syria.

Stuart Sears is a scholar of Arabic and Middle East History with a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in Early Islamic History. He is co-founder of the Arabic Language Associates and previously taught at the American University in Cairo, Egypt.

Conversations at the Meetinghouse is a monthly program held on the first Friday of each month (October to June) at 7PM where members of the community share their expertise and experience about important issues of the day.
