From the Minister



Dear Friends,

The headlines are unnerving right now, with daily reports on the spread of coronavirus, talk of pandemic, travel bans, and quarantines. As in any intense media cycle, we might ask ourselves, how do we distinguish the coverage that helps us pre-

pare and stay informed from the coverage that exacerbates panic and generates clicks and high ratings? This is a good time to stay in touch with the things that keep us grounded in the face of uncertainty. Sometimes when the news makes me feel frantic, I take a deep breath and start with just noticing how scary it can all seem, and then I make some space for that emotion and try to offer myself some compassion. This can also be a time for prayer: for health and wellbeing, that we can contain this virus, and that our efforts to contain the spread of illness don't just become another theater for repression. And for those impacted by grief, for the lives lost, for the loved ones of those who have died, let us hold them in our hearts and prayers as well.

I wonder, how do you feel about election season? Maybe you are energized by election time, or hopeful and excited about it. Or perhaps you are stressed to think of the long, potentially quite dirty slog ahead of us. The stakes are high, with climate crisis and fossil fuel usage continuing largely unchecked, humanitarian crises at our border and in our prison system, and a host of other social ills. I am concerned about the impacts of new laws that increase voter suppression and threaten voting rights. I also get frustrated by the tendency of elections to reduce democracy to what amounts to a contest, a competition, a horse race, A healthy democracy takes so much more than choosing between what so often feels like the lesser of two evils. Twentieth century Unitarian theologian James Luther Adams lived in Germany during the rise of Nazism, and his experience with the entrenchment of totalitarianism there led him to ask himself as an American, "What disciplines of democracy (except voting) have I habitually undertaken with other people which could serve in any way directly to affect public policy?" He wrote of the importance of voluntary associations for practicing shared decision making, conversing across different viewpoints and perspectives, and dispersing power. What inspires you to engage in building a just and thriving society?

I have another question for you: Have you come to church at 10 am lately? It's pretty great in our sanctuary at 10; you should come! In fact, we're so proud of what we do at 10 that our DRE, Louise Marcoux, and I will be presenting on our highly engaging multigenerational worship at General Assembly this year. (General Assembly, by the way, is another thing you should consider attending - it's in Providence this year, nice and close! More on that here.) Our 10 am services include singing hymns, sharing joys and concerns, telling stories, and reflecting with people of all ages about matters of the heart and the spirit. It's good for our community to practice being truly multigenerational. It's good for us all to flex those muscles we have that allow us to try worshipping in ways that we may be unfamiliar with, to share sacred space and have sacred conversations with children and adults together. Every week when I'm collaborating with Louise on our family service, I am invited into a space of imagination, and a space of remembering, remembering the curiosity, the insecurity, the convictions, the fears, the hopes of childhood. I am so grateful to our children, youth, and families for helping me stay connected to the truth that Unitarian Universalism comes alive for people of all ages.

GA is an unforgettable experience for the thousands of UUs who attend, returning home with renewed energy and ideas to share with their congregation and community.

The theme for the June 2020 General Assembly is *Rooted, Inspired, & Ready!* It's an opportunity to get in touch with our theological roots, get engaged in transforming our faith, and get fired up to take action in the wider world. March in RE

What's Happening in RE: March into Spring!

The **Preschool-Kindergarten** class will build a neighborhood together out of blocks, using their sharing and caring skills and working cooperatively. From 3/8-3/29 the children will be invited to bring their teddy bears to class to broach some potentially scary situations - being sick or lost - in a non-threatening way. The month will end with a teddy bear party! For RE Sunday on 4/5, the P-K children will light the chalice.

The **Grade1-2** class continues with Our Whole Lives (OWL). The children will learn about conception, pregnancy, birth and the joy of welcoming a new baby in the family. The final OWL session on 3/15 will focus on celebrations and ways we recognize milestones--and ends with a class birthday party! Children in grades 1-2 who are not participating in OWL are welcome to join the P-K or Grade 3-6 class. See Louise Marcoux dre@uusharon.org for details. On 3/22 and 3/29, all the grade 1-2 children will be preparing for RE Sunday.

The **Grade 3-6 class** will explore peacemaking and how each of us can find creative solutions to solve conflict, work cooperatively, and cultivate inner peace. They will hear the true story of "The Christmas Truce," during WW I, where soldiers on both sides, abandoned their weapons for a day of peace. They will also hear the story "Serenity, Courage, and Wisdom," in which a girl learns how the "Serenity Prayer" can shed light on a conflict with a friend. They will experience both a walking and a guided meditation and make their own strands of knotted meditation beads. On 3/15, 3/22, and 3/29, they will prep for RE Sunday.

The **Grade 7-8** class will take a leadership role in RE Sunday on 4/5. On 3/1 and 3/8 they will be developing their plan for RE Sunday. On 3/15 they will attend the Credo Sunday Service with parents and on 3/22 they are encouraged to attend the service led by the Senior Youth Group. 3/29 will be devoted to rehearsing for RE Sunday.

America's most famous sex therapist.



SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS



Here is the latest Social Justice news about what's happening here at the UCS. We all participate one way or another in these efforts, and working as a community, our impact is felt both within and beyond our walls. Learn more about some of the projects that you might want to keep an eye on

this month:

Brown Envelope donations



Every month the SJC selects a program, cause or organization working towards social justice, and we offer congregants a chance to support their work via our Brown Envelope donations when we pass the plate during services. We attempt

to reach out to a range of recipients, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally, on a wide range of topics.

In January 2020, the Brown E collection raised \$1,242.64 to support the work of the **Equal Justice Initiative** (www.eji.org), an Alabama human rights organization led by Bryan Stephenson. The EJI is committed to ending mass incarceration and excessive punishment, to challenging racial and economic injustice, and to protecting the basic human rights of the most vulnerable people in America. The work of the EJI is the basis for both the book (2014) and movie Just Mercy (in theaters now).

The February Brown Envelope collection has supported the work of **UUMass Action** (<u>uumassacton.org</u>), the organization that unites UUs from across the state for social justice causes:

"Our mission is to organize and mobilize UUs in Massachusetts to confront oppression. We provide pathways towards justice and identify opportunities in which we can live our values."

For the first 4 Sundays in March, the primary collection will be for **GLSEN** (glsen.org), the Gay, Lesbian & Straight Education Network. GLSEN is an organization of educators creating safe and affirming environments in schools for LGBTQ students, through training for faculty and the formation of Gay-Straight Alliances.

On the final Sunday of March, the Brown Envelope collection will be sent to **UUtheVote**. Massachusetts is a Super Tuesday Presidential primary state, so Massachusetts voters who registered by February 12 are eligible to vote on March 3. UUtheVote.org is the UUA's organizing effort for congregations. Have questions about what's OK for congregations to do and not to do in an election season? It's there. Want to form a team to phone bank, canvass, and partner with others who support platforms consistent with UU values? Ideas

This year's **Mother's Day Walk for Peace** will be on Sunday, May 10. In addition, UCS will be cosponsoring the recruitment and participation in Sharon with Sharon Interfaith Action (SIA). March will be kickoff and outreach month for recruiting sponsors. signing up walkers, recruiting churches, synagogues, mosques in Sharon. The goal is to broaden the participation in the event. On March 4, the Walk breakfast and kickoff will be held at UU Roxbury: 8:30AM -10:30AM. We invite UCS members, as well as SIA members, to join us. This will be an informational event and there will be changes in the Walk this year. In addition, there will be alternate ways to participate in the Walk, and fund-raising besides actually completing the Walk. Transgender Inclusion Workshops



The excitement around the Transforming Hearts Collective online course -Transgender Inclusion in Congregations - continues

to build as we delve deeper into the series and as we prepare for Sunday, March 29th when Zr. Alex Kapitan, one of the founders of the Transforming Hearts Collective and one of the course lecturers, will be joining us for the day. Alex will be participating in both morning worship services and then offering a workshop in the afternoon. The workshop, which will start immediately after Coffee Hour, will focus more deeply on the theme introduced during the 10:30 service – "Radical Welcome" and how to truly include trans folk in our congregation. It will also be an opportunity to bring your questions to Alex in what we hope to be a safe and nurturing space.

In order to provide an opportunity for as many people to

attend as possible, a light lunch will be served and childcare will be available. We hope you will take the opportunity to attend this important and informative workshop and that, if you haven't already done so, you will consider viewing at least a few of the videos of the online course. Session 1 discusses the value of a practice of beloved community - being truly welcoming and fully affirming of the full spectrum of gender identities and experiences. Session 2 discusses how our faith communities are affected by culture-wide, assigned gender roles which are in fact rules that prop up an unjust patriarchal system. As Alex noted, in so many words: if you doubt that the roles are rules, well, try doing or being differently and see how that plays out.

We have already had a number of congregants view the first 2 sessions and we are now offering March dates (see below) for the viewing and discussion of Session 3, "Unpacking the Gender Binary." Philosophers coined "the binary" as a way to explain how any salt-and-pepper view of the world serves to stigmatize the spice cabinet that is in fact a whole and healthy part of every human being and society. Put another way, from the title of one of the course resources: science doesn't support the existence of the sex binary and so, what now? Session 3 seeks to explore gender as diverse, distributed, dimensional and experiential.

Each of the videos, which range from 46-53 minutes, are easily accessed online, by using an Access Code provided to our congregation. A Return to the Border: One Year Later

I visited the Arizona-Mexico border in January 2019 and decided to return a year later to see if and how things had changed there. The MPP (Migrant Protection Protocol), also known as the "Remain in Mexico" policy, was recently established at the Nogales Port of Entry (official immigration checkpoint where people can request asylum), creating an even more precarious and uncertain situation there for migrants and those who provide legal and humanitarian aid. I was able to see the new migrant shelter and aid center established by the Kino Border Initiative in Nogales, which will begin providing expanded services soon, including 140 beds for people who need them, more meals than in the smaller dining room (el comedor) across the street, classes, and more. I even helped finish work on some of the handmade quilts that will cover each of the beds, fulfilling the vision of a leader and the many people who contributed time and materials. I also had the opportunity to go on a desert search with the Green Valley/ Sahuarita Samaritans, and we left some food and water on the vehicle barriers at one end of a section of the wall near Sasabe, Arizona. Stay tuned for a date for an informal conversation about the border!

February 23

Did you know that washing two loads of laundry weekly in cold water instead of hot or warm water can save up to 500 pounds of carbon dioxide each year? Use a cold water detergent that includes enzymes designed to clean better in cold water.

Did you know that clothing that is discarded in the landfill produces methane (a greenhouse gas) as it decomposes? Donate gently used items to the clothing bank, discard non-donatable fabric items through the textile recycling program (bins located at most Sharon schools), and avoid purchasing fast fashion or items that quickly go out of style.

February 9

According to the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization, 30% of food is wasted globally across the supply chain, contributing 8% of total global greenhouse gas emissions. Plan menus prior to grocery shopping so you only purchase what you need. When you find you have unused food, consider ways you can freeze leftovers, or create vegetable broth or soups out of your wilting veggies.

- Change the State Flag & Seal S.1877/H.2776
- Prohibit Native American Mascots in Public Schools S.247/H.443
- Protect Native American Heritage S.1811/H.2948
- LGBTQI Data Bill S.905/H.1341

Passing statewide legislation that reflects our values creates positive, systemic change. The progress we've made this session reflects an amazingly huge amount of hard work in our coalitions. Thank you to everyone who joined UU power and took action!



She will share the particulars of her journey, including an electric car, geothermal heating, solar panels, diet changes and energy/materials conservation. Sue brings grounded hope to her audiences/students, emphasizing all that can (and is being) be done to improve our environmental future. With dual expertise in science and philosophy, Sue's work addresses both the technical details and the big-picture considerations.
