May 3 We Are Many, We Are One

Us UU's value our freedom as individual thinkers and believers. And yet we know that we must not only think of ourselves but also of the interdependent whole. We will begin reflecting on our May worship theme of "Thresholds" with this service on how to cross the threshold into community. May 10 The Myths of Not Enough

Today on Mother's Day we will reflect on what it means to move from scarcity to abundance, to say to ourselves and one another: we are enough, and the saving power of this message whether or not we are mamas ourselves.

May 17 Finding the Sacred Within and Without

During this time that we cannot come together in our beloved church building, how can we continue to set aside sacred space and time? Our worship service today will include reflections on Ramadan, Islam's holy month of fasting and renewing religious commitments, as we approach the end of Ramadan.

May 24 Lest We Forget

In our lay-led service this Memorial Day, we both remember the terrible costs of war and honor the extraordinary service it has called forth from too many Americans. Valerie Vigoda will share her father's searing memories of World War II combat. Wilbur Edwards will honor his father's long military service through two wars and beyond as an African-American in an initially segregated and never fully equal Army. Rory McGregor will reflect on the struggles of those called to serve in the Vietnam War. Beth McGregor, worship leader. We are welcoming members of the other Five Point Cluster congregations to join us.

May 31 Coming of Age

The search for truth and meaning is at the center of Unitarian Universalist practice. Since last October, eight youth from this congregation have been questing for truth with the guidance of a mentor. As our youth share their credos, we will celebrate their coming of age as Unitarian Universalists.

From the Minister



The day and date don't mean so much lately. Days blur together with their cycles of meals, Zoom calls, and walks in the park. This time of pandemic reminds us there are vastly more important things than the difference between Wednesday and Thursday. We miss our extended families, our

friends, our congregation, and much more. We rage against and lament the inequalities laid bare and exacerbated by coronavirus, we recommit ourselves to the struggle for human dignity and the flourishing of all life on our planet. We grieve our losses, personal and global. We keep trying to take care of ourselves and one another as best we can.

Social distancing bends time: one moment, it feels like the last month and a half has passed lightning-quick; the next, sharing handshakes and hugs with all of you feels like a distant memory. Every now and then, I catch myself picking up my phone to scroll on news feeds searching for an answer to this question: When will this be over? As if my phone is a fortune-teller, as if there is a definitive answer to that question.

It's alluring, trying to peer into the future. I need to keep pulling myself back to right now: I do what I can, with what I have, where I am. I have been looking to nature for guidance on staying present. The trees outside my window do not try to predict the future. The spider crawling across my community garden plot does not count the days. From one moment to the next, all these living things arrive in the present. May we all arrive in the present too, and keep trying to do what we can, with what we have, where we are.

I am wondering: how are your hearts these days? I am thinking about our people who are health care workers, our people who are multitasking with kids and work at home, our people who may be feeling isolated or lonely, our people who are navigating changes and uncertainties of all kinds. I am thinking about all of you, however you are making it through this time, whether it be heavy or light or somewhere in between for you.

On another note, did you know I am in an evaluation period? As I am a minister in Preliminary Fellowship with our Unitarian Universalist Association, our congregation will be submitting evaluations this year and next to the UUA to help me progress to Final Fellowship. Our UCS Board of Trustees and our Committee on Ministry are both responsible for evaluating me. Please take a moment to fill out this survey and help our Committee on Ministry craft an informed evaluation. Your feedback will help strengthen my service to this congregation.

From the President



The Board recently discussed our next steps, given the Governor's decision to close Massachusetts schools until June 29, 2020, closing all but essential services and continuing the stay at home advisory. The Board agreed to mirror the plan for the schools and remain a virtual

church until June 29, 2020.

This date brings us to the end of our church year. It means that our annual meeting on June 12th will be held via Zoom. The Board and Finance Committee are working on a final budget to present to our members in early June. We have made a decision to increase the hours of a new and interim Religious Education Director - demonstrating our continued commitment to religious education, our families and our youth. We will also continue to compensate our staff equitably and within the guidelines of the Unitarian Universalist Association. We have continued to pay all our staff during this pandemic as part of our principles of fairness and equity. Your continued support in pledges and donations is critical to the church and our mission now and in the future.

The Worship Committee is beginning to work on our summer services, but whether they will be in person or via Zoom (or both) has not been determined.

The Board has created a Safe Church Re-Open Task Force to formulate a plan to safely re-open the church building once it is determined by the Governor and the Board that it is safe to do so. The Task Force, which will be chaired by me, includes Linda Godfrey-Bailey, Amy Taylor, Janet Limke, Erin Cassidy-Lunman, Elizabeth Maranzano and Reverend Jolie.

The Board has also decided to form a Fellowship Committee to intentionally enhance fellowship and community within the Church by providing oversight, line of communication and support to existing programs and to determine what additional programming may be needed to enhance fellowship within the congregation. We are in the process of recruiting members for this committee. If you are interested in enhancing joining the committee please email me at president@uusharon.org.

We are acutely aware of the changes social distancing has wrought in our congregation and community. We are also grateful for the efforts being made by our minister, staff and members to find ways to stay connected.

We hope to return to regular operations on Monday, June 29th. Because of the evolving nature of COVID19, the Board will continue to meet regularly (via Zoom) to review our current situation and will notify you of any changes.

WELCOME TO VIRTUAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2020!

The UUA Board, GA Planning Committee and Staff



held off a decision on a 'live' General Assembly in Providence as long as they could, but finally concluded that it just isn't responsible or feasible to bring thousands of UUs from all around the country together in crowded spaces in Providence on June 24-28.

But there will be a General Assembly, with extensive program offerings and interactive participation. UUA staff and committee members are busily scaling up the already robust technology for offsite participation that has worked effectively for several years now. While we will miss the fun and excitement of being together physically, there are actually some advantages to taking it all online:

- It will cost only \$150 to register, not \$400. And there's no travel, saving both money and carbon footprint.
- Registrants will have access to a rich and wide variety of programs. And unlike at a live GA, you won't have to choose among multiple offerings occurring in one time slot. One will be livestreamed and the others available to you later on demand.
- Many of the sessions will be interactive, with opportunity to offer questions and comments, and there will chat rooms set up to continue discussion in smaller groups.
- Delegates will be able to join fully in debating and voting on UUA initiatives and policies.

While most of the programming is open only to registrants, the big worship services will be broadcast to all, and we can enjoy and be inspired by them together in whatever size groups we feel comfortable gathering in by late June.

I encourage you to go to www.uua.org/ga to read about the theme and some of the program highlights, and to register for this June's General Assembly. I'll be there (virtually), and I hope many of you will be also. Need to know more? I'm happy to answer any questions I can..

Another month of challenges for everyone, but also opportunities for all of us to remain connected and engaged in the work of Social Justice along with all the rest. Of course we need to look after our neighbors, our families and ourselves, but we can also

find ways to reach out to others in need. Let's continue to work together to find ways to make the best of these troubled times.

Brown Envelope donations



Every month the SJC selects a program, cause or organization working towards social justice, and we offer congregants a chance to support their work via our Brown Envelope donations when we 'pass the plate' during

services. We attempt to reach out to a range of recipients, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally, on a wide range of topics. This month, while we gather together electronically from our homes, we ask that you consider making a Brown Envelope donation by other means, either with a check mailed to the church with "Brown E donation & Date" in the memo line, via PayPal, or directly online with our chosen recipient. Thank you for keeping others in mind while we all adjust to these uncertain times.

The **March Brown Envelope** was split: the first 4 weeks of the month supported the work of **GLSEN** (glsen.org), the Gay, Lesbian & Straight Education Network. GLSEN is an organization of educators creating safe and affirming environments in schools for LGBTQ students, through training for faculty and the formation of Gay-Straight Alliances. Donations sent through the mail, via PayPal (and perhaps more given directly online), plus a modest transfer of the profits from our Fair Trade sales at Coffee Hour, allowed us to send GLSEN a check for \$1000.

On the **final Sunday of March**, the Brown Envelope collection was for **UU the Vote**, (<u>UUtheVote.org</u>) a non-partisan faith initiative to engage our neighbors, educate our communities, mobilize voters, and rally around key ballot initiatives. All through 2020 the UUA is supporting congregations and UU organizations in activating thousands of Unitarian Universalists to mobilize for electoral justice at the local, state and national levels. Donations, plus a share of our Fair Trade profits, permitted us to send UU the Vote a check for \$354 (plus other potential gifts given directly online). Thank you for your generosity.

April has been a bit different for donations: Our recipient is the Louise D. Brown Peace Institute (Idbpeaceinstitute.org). We had hoped to be a presence at their Annual Mother's Day Walk for Peace in May, and our Brown E donations in April are given in support of their programs. The Walk has now been recrafted as a virtual event on May 10th (more about that below), but our goal remains unchanged; to continue to ask for donations during our April services and beyond, via online donations through a special fundraising sponsorship page at the Institute, by Pay-Pal, or by checks mailed sent to the church, your own friends and connections. Our goal is to exceed our giving from last year, and to build a relationship with the Peace Institute for the years ahead. See more information below.

Urgent need for surgical caps, gowns and masks at Brockton ER—We are hearing distressing news directly from the medical staff in Brockton: "We are running out of masks, including homemade masks for patients to minimize spread of the virus....now, EVE-RY patient coming in is COVID-19 and there were three deaths on my shift. Also, we need gowns and surgical caps, some with buttons for hold straps of masks and some with tie for holding buns. WE HAVE NO MORE AT ALL. These things can be made. Please ask your networks for help!" If you are able to help with this effort, consider these steps:

- 1) donate elastic material from you sewing closet, or purchase if you are able;
- 2) donate fabrics for masks, caps and gowns (100% cotton);
- 3) break out your sewing machine and join the effort.

TRANSGENDER INCLUSION IN CONGREGATIONS

We are delighted to have Zr. Alex Kapitan, one of the founders of the Transforming Hearts Collective, and a lecturer on the video series, Transgender Inclusion in Congregations, joining us virtually on JUNE 7TH both for our morning worship services and for an afternoon workshop. SUNRISE Movement

Over the past several months the Social Justice Committee has provided support to the **Blue Hills chapter of the Sunrise Movement**, https://

www.sunrisemovement.org/, a national youth-led organization working to stop climate change, create new jobs, and promote environmental justice. The group has held monthly meetings at the UCS church building, with participation from adult allies from our congregation and community.

Since schools have been shut down due to COVID-19, the Blue Hills chapter members have shown their dedication by moving meetings from a monthly basis in person to a weekly basis via Zoom. Chapter members have also begun attending Sunrise School, https://www.sunrisemovement.org/sunrise-school a national program intended to "seize this moment" of quarantine to create stronger connections, learn about climate issues, and determine ways to act locally while social distancing. This most recent crisis has shown just how seriously these youth are taking the climate crisis and their commitment to a better future, and we are proud to be allies in their efforts. [A donation of \$200 from the Social Justice Fair Trade Fund has been made to support their vital work.]

MainSpring House Lunch Making update:

While we are unable to join together during Coffee Hour after services, please know that our monthly project to assemble 100 bag lunches for the guests of MSH continues without missing a beat. SJC members are assembling the meals at home and delivering them in Brockton where they are desperately needed and appreciated. In addition, through an ongoing effort to



expand our Shopping for Justice program with the UUs in Foxboro, their members are also sending 100 bag lunches to MSH each month.

During our extended closure, we were concerned that our inventory of Fair Trade items, as well as Shopping for Justice grocery cards, was sitting idle, and we all know how UUs crave their caffeine and chocolates (!). So, with the blessing of the Board of Trustees, we offered a one-time-only, drive-by sale of pre-ordered goods. In addition, folks could add funds to our Food Pantry drive.
