From the Minister



Dear ones,

I wonder if, like me, you are tired. I wonder if, like me, you miss your loved ones. I wonder if, like me, you are sad. The ache of this time of pandemic and shutdown has been so prolonged, it has dulled over the

months. But still I miss laughing hard while holding onto a friend's arm, gasping and hollering at the movies, singing loud in church with you all, sharing hugs and shaking your hands. My longing for closeness with other humans is sharp. Our collective grief over the loss of more than a quarter million souls to coronavirus is almost unspeakable.

Back in the spring, a message went around our Unitarian Universalist Ministers' Association mailing list with the subject header, "I Did Not Sign Up For This." The email was exactly what I needed to read at the time - a colleague's reflections on how she never planned to be an online minister, to have a church without a building, to be a working parent with no childcare or school. I was moaning on the phone with another minister, a dear friend of mine, about pandemic ministry, and mentioned that email. "It's so true!" I said, "I did not sign up for this!" My friend empathized with me, but then gave me a little nudge. "Didn't you, though?" he asked me. The implication being that, by signing up to be a minister, we never know exactly what we are signing up for, other than to serve the people and our faith through whatever life brings. True enough.

My friend went on to explain that, as a former community minister whose ministry used to be primarily with incarcerated people, he's pretty comfortable ministering "from afar." Visits constrained by being required to maintain a certain distance from the person you're talking to? Check. A monthly newsletter as a primary means to share ministerial reflections? Check. Phone calls and letters being the only way to connect, but we keep trying anyway? Check. Now he works at a church, except the church he serves is closed for almost all in-person activities, as ours is. So, he is back in familiar territory, tele-ministering, not holding people's hands, and everyone is just doing their best, as we are.

If the email about not signing up for this was what I thought I needed, then the conversation about facing reality and my friend's perspective about ministry with people in prison was what I actually needed. All of us have been impacted by this virus in countless ways, and all of us keep adapting as best we can.

I will be on vacation from December 25 through January 1, returning to work on January 2. With that in mind, I wanted everyone to be clear about what leave means in terms of getting in touch with me. If I'm on leave, whether it's study leave or vacation time, there are still some instances when it is appropriate and important for you to contact me. If anyone in our UCS community of members and friends is newly facing grave illness, death, fire, or some other serious event, please call me even if I am on leave. Also, if there is a memorial service scheduled for a member of our church, please call me even if I am on leave. I do not check emails or my church office voicemail when I am off, so call my cell phone: (617) 851-9356.

Education for our nation's youth has been a huge challenge during the pandemic. Virtual learning became the approach in Massa-

chusetts last March when the State shut down. Most schools have continued with online instruction programs in the current school year.

My daughter's family in Somerville struggled last Spring to coordinate virtual learning while working regular jobs. As grandparents, we lent support by working with the two boys on lessons at their home and monitoring online classes in case adult intervention was needed. We even experimented with having the boys live with us in Sharon since teaching was completely virtual. We all survived but admitted that it had been stressful and tiring.

During the summer, my nephew from Washington DC visited Sharon to play softball with my team in the Over 30 Men's League and tour Boston area sights. Our grandsons were also living with us and discovered that he was a wonderful playmate. Since he was without employment, we started to imagine that he could become the aux pair our grandsons needed. When he returned to DC in August, we continued to discuss this new job possibility.

Our offer to return to Sharon was more enticing than the boredom of waiting for new jobs in the moribund oil & gas market. He returned mid-September and has become one busy young man working with our grandsons on their education and coordinating outdoor recreation activity. We are no longer exhausted, our daughter is tending to her job without interruption, and the boys are happy campers.

Update From the Committee on Ministry

The Committee on Ministry was formed last year to oversee the evaluation process for Reverend Jolie and otherwise provide support for her ministry. The evaluation was one of three that are required of new ministers by the UUA. If successful, their ministries are then renewed for another year.

The Committee worked with Reverend Jolie to complete her evaluation last summer. The evaluation process included getting feedback from staff, from the Board, and from the Congregation in general. Not surprisingly the evaluation was very positive. It also included recommendations which stressed the importance of self-care.

The evaluation was submitted to the UUA in July, and Reverend Jolie recently got the news that her ministry was renewed for another year! This is the second evaluation she has gone through – the first was during her time as a hospital chaplain. She will need to have the third, and final, evaluation this coming summer.

The Committee recently met to discuss the timing and process for this third evaluation. As before, we will be soliciting comments from the Congregation next Spring. During our monthly meetings we also discuss other ways in which we can support her ministry.



We'll also share strategies for parents to recognize, understand, and manage their own emotional and physiological responses and tips on supporting children in recognizing and accepting their own experiences in this time and empowering them in their resiliency. Katie Byron is the Youth Coordinator and Interim RE Assistant at UCS. They are also a social worker with experience supporting parents and families who have experienced domestic violence, community violence, and other forms of trauma. Katie brings knowledge from the Attachment, Regulation, and Competency (ARC) Framework, which was designed to support children who have experienced trauma and their caregivers, as well as a desire to build on the strengths that parents already have in supporting themselves and their families.

watching videos, celebrating quarantine birthdays, and playing a lot of games together!


Junior Youth Fellowship Group



Anti-Racism Working Group

As stated in the November Newsletter, "Racial injustice is deeply rooted in our culture, and the ongoing work for social justice calls us to examine this problem in all its complexity." The UCS Anti-Racism Working Group has recently facilitated two churchwide programs to assist in this endeavor, and plans to continue offering opportunities on an ongoing basis this year and in the years ahead, recognizing that this work requires a lifelong commitment.

Our next program focuses on the book *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontent by Isabel Wilkerson. In the book, Wilkerson "gives us a masterful portrait of*

an unseen phenomenon in America as she explores, through an immersive, deeply researched narrative and stories about real people, how America today and throughout its history has been shaped by a hidden caste system, a rigid hierarchy of human rankings." (Source: Politics and Prose. an independent bookstore located in Chevy Chase, Washington, D.C.)

During the Meacham interview of Wilkerson, we hear Wilkerson's report that the U.S. is actually built on an unrecognized caste system which has created substantial barriers to those at the bottom of the system, with African Americans being the lowest caste. The video offers an important new perspective on American history, and we have broken it down into 3 separate sessions in order to provide more time for reflection and discussion of the information being provided. We will be offering a variety of dates and times to watch and discuss the video with other congregants, as provided below. We encourage you to attend all 3 sessions with the same group; however, we understand that there may be times you need to attend other dates. Brown Envelope Donations

The October Brown Envelope collection raised \$619.44 for the **Unitarian Universalist Service Committee**'s disaster relief efforts (<u>uusc.org</u>), supporting grassroots partners and ad-

vocates responding to numerous climate emergencies. Because of Covid limitations, we understand that additional funds were contributed directly to the UUSC.

A special Friday **Vote Love** worship service on 16 October raised a collection of \$381.83 in support of the UUA's campaign **UU the Vote**, designed to expand voter participation during this election year.

Throughout November UCS families have been encouraged to participate in the UUSC program **Guest at Your Table**, with home collection box kits and discussion materials meant to encourage conversation and reflection. Donations should be converted to checks made out to 'UCS' (memo: G@YT) and sent into the church in early December; they will then be bundled and forwarded to the UUSC.

The November Brown Envelope recipient is the **Gifts for Kids** program, an annual effort to support regional families in economic distress during the holiday season (www.giftsforkidsma.org). Due to Covid-19 restrictions, the tradition of sponsoring specific children and their wish lists has become a fundraising effort that will allow our community support agencies to help individual families shop for their children this holiday season. This year, please consider a donation to this worthy program, by either sending a check to the church, using our <u>PayPal</u> <u>portal</u>, or sending a check directly to GKF. Thank you for your generosity. (We have already sent early donations of over \$500 to the GKF program to help with their early deadline for meeting regional needs; a final payment of additional funds will be sent in early December.)

Support for Local Food Pantries remains an ongoing effort, with more than \$22,600 raised since last April. In addition, in late November, the **Sharon Interfaith Thanksgiving Service** selected the **Sharon/Stoughton Food Pantry** as the Offertory recipient, and the UCS was chosen to coordinate both the physical staple food collection as well as monetary donations from across Sharon. We will again use our Shopping for Justice grocery card program to donate the funds to the pantry, and the SJC will add the additional 5% that we thereby raise to the overall donation. A full report will follow next month once the dollars and pounds of food donated are tallied.

The December Brown E recipient will be **The Sanctuary Boston** (<u>thesanctuaryboston.org</u>). Sanctuary Boston was founded by UU young Adults who often find themselves without a spiritual home. Sanctuary is a contemporary worship community and is one of the largest ministries to UU Young Adults in the country. Sanctuary Boston has grown from a local community, to a regional ministry, to a national presence. They are not only ex-

perimenting at the forefront of UU worship, but increasingly sharing their learnings with the wider UU movement. Sanctuary Boston contributes new music, new leaders, and new possibilities to Unitarian Universalism. Sanctuary Boston

The Sanctuary Boston is a community of vibrant worship and real connection offering contemporary worship , grounded in the values of Unitarian Universalism and open to seekers of all kinds. Worship gatherings are centered in communal singing and shared ritual. They are multi-vocal, lifting up the many voices of our community.

Sanctuary Boston is like any other congregation in a number of ways, while at the same time, they are a Boston area ministry to young adults and other seekers. They are the largest UU ministry to young adults in the country, with 30-50 people attending regular services, more than 75% of whom are 18-35 years old.

The Sanctuary Boston is entering its 7th year as an emerging community and is in a time of transition. Startup funding grants have come to an end and they're in the process of putting together a plan for long term sustainability. While working to increase lay leadership and the financial commitments among participants, they won't be sustainable in the foreseeable future without significant support from the wider UU community.
