What Is Beloved Community?

Our UU Six Sources Series: Jewish and Christian Teachings

If we are to consider Beloved Community all month - more than that, if we are to strive to build Beloved Community - let us begin with understanding what it means. Jewish and Christian scripture both hold that we should love our neighbors as ourselves. In this service we'll dig deep into what it means for us as UU's that we count this specific teaching as one of the primary sources of our living tradition.

Sunday February 14 Love, Community, and Getting Free

Australian Indigenous activist Lilla Watson says, "If you have come here to help me, you are wasting your time, but if you have come because your liberation is bound up with mine, then let us work together." Join our guest preacher, the Rev. Laura Randall of UUSC, as we explore the love and liberation being created by community-led justice movements today.

Bio: As the Associate Director for Congregation Relations at UUSC, the Reverend Laura Randall facilitates partnerships to strengthen the impact of UUSC and the social justice reach of UU communities. Prior to joining UUSC, Laura's ministry included serving as the Legacy Campaign Director for the Unitarian Universalist Association and hospice chaplaincy. She lives in Medford, Massachusetts with her spouse and their three dogs.



Sunday, February 21 Anti-Racism is for All Of Us

Part of building the Beloved Community is to resist oppression in all its forms. Throughout this church year we have been considering anti-racism in our worship services, inspired by our national reckoning with race and our Black Lives Matter banner that hangs on the front of our church. In this service we'll consider what UU organizer Chris Crass means when he calls us to "all get free together."

Sunday, February 28

How Do We Apologize?

The Universalist part of our UU identity roots us in a strong tradition of forgiveness, and offers us the promise that all of us are more than the worst thing we have ever done. But, of course, we do mess up from time to time. Part of building the Beloved Community is being able to offer one another a real apology. This sermon will build on disability justice activist Mia Mingus' framework of accountability: self reflection, apology, repair, and changed behavior.

From the Minister



Dear ones.

It's February! I'm a little late to the party, but I wanted to let you all know about a program I just learned about called "30 Days of Love." This is a program of Side With Love (SWL),

which is an interfaith public advocacy effort sponsored by our Unitarian Universalist Association; since 2008 SWL has organized around LGBTQ issues, immigration issues, racial justice issues, and more. Every year, Side With Love celebrates 30 Days of Love from MLK Day to Valentines Day. Thirty Days of Love points to our calendars and asks us to consider the connections between intersectional* (*intersectional, as in, not just race but also how race interacts with class, gender, ability, and more.) racial justice and what Love calls us to do. There's stuff for kids, youth, adults, and multigen offerings as well! Check out the videos, articles, activities, live virtual events (may require preregistration), and more.

One of the pieces on 30 Days with Love is a delightful video about Joys & Concerns by Lauren Wyeth, a religious educator in Minneapolis, Since beginning as your settled minister, I have noticed and appreciated the special sacredness of Joys & Concerns at UCS. There are many meaningful components to our Sunday services. For some, the music may be utmost, for others, it's the prayer time, for still others it's simply the moment when we say hi to one another. Maybe for you it changes week to week. Heck, it could even be the sermon! As for me, I believe that Joys & Concerns is often one of the spiritual centers of our communal worship experience. It can be tricky. I imagine many of you may be familiar with why some of my colleagues quake at the thought of an open-ended invitation to share: "what if it goes on too long?!" I have also heard the opinion that a particularly long and cozy Joys & Concerns session can make newcomers feel even more on-the-outside of the big group. And there is that pesky question of what kind of information belongs in announcements or coffee hour rather than in Joys & Concerns.

But in my mind, none of these concerns outweighs the power of sharing and listening to the joys and concerns of our hearts as a church community. I love how Lauren Wyeth expresses the theology of Joys & Concerns in her video: "As UU's we have faith in the saving potential of our relationships with one another." When we share our joy, she remarks, it grows, and when we share our sorrow, others may help lessen the weight. Our worship theme for the month of February is "Beloved Community." All month we will consider different aspects of this idea during our Sunday services. But all year we practice Beloved Community when we hold one another's joys and concerns in worshipful reverence.

In case anyone missed the news I shared during worship on January 17, I wanted to share one particular joy with you all: Adam and I are expecting another child! This little one is due in late July. Thank you so much for all your kind words of support and congratulations. Our Board of Trustees and I, along with lay leaders from Committees across the church, will work out the plan for covering the parental leave I plan to take in late summer and fall. Stay tuned for those details.

From the President

QUO VADIS?

For those of us who took Latin in school, this question was asked often. It means "Where are you going?" With the pandemic almost a year old, the question has relevance. Even with pending vaccination, I ask the same question. Where are you going? What will be different? Social distancing and masking up will still be required. What

about people who choose not to take the vaccine? There will still be lots of uncertainty.

This past year of isolation has allowed time for self-reflection. It has brought important life-altering choices into perspective. One major reawakening for me is our existential challenge called "climate change". "Quo vadis?"

What inspired me years ago during my senior year in college was a sudden concern for the environment. Atmospheric inversion layers over the Los Angeles metro area were trapping exhaust gases from automobiles to create a "smog bowl" causing serious human health problems. Other cities with daily traffic jams were suffering similarly. My long-standing love for car engines took a 180-degree turn as I started to focus



on the exhaust gases coming out the tailpipe. I joined students across the country in a competition called the Clear Air Car Race. Our goal was to demonstrate engineering solutions to reduce vehicular emissions.

I feel that young people involved in the Sunrise movement are calling us to action just like the students in the Clean Air Car Race. Unwanted carbon in the atmosphere is the number one problem contributing to ozone depletion and warming temperatures. Their sense of urgency has motivated this senior citizen to seriously consider "Quo vadis"?

Dr Susan Solomon, MIT Professor of Environmental Studies, gave a recent talk about this very problem. She scientifically confirmed the inescapable truth that mankind is responsible for what's happened. A coordinated effort involving all nations, such as the Paris Climate Accords, is needed to reduce global dependence on fossil fuels for energy. Individual actions that we can all take include choosing wisely for vehicular transportation – hybrid or electric are the viable solutions! I find myself full circle in the days of the Clean Air Car Race.



Brown Envelope & Related Collections

Our year of social distancing and online connections continues, and the congregants of the Unitarian Church of Sharon have found endless ways to reach out and help

those less fortunate as we all struggle through the Covid pandemic. Here are updates of current social justice projects and opportunities:

\$661 for Sanctuary Boston, (thesanctuaryboston.org), a program founded by UU young Adults who often find themselves without a spiritual home. Sanctuary is a contemporary worship community and is one of the largest

ministries to UU Young Adults in the country. Sanctuary Boston is a powerful presence and they're contributing new music, new leaders, and new possibilities to Unitarian Universalism. Thank You for supporting their work, and please join their online services on the first and third Wednesdays every month at 6:30pm.

In keeping with our longstanding tradition, all donations collected during our Christmas Eve services this year were donated to Father Bill's & MainSpring House in Brockton to support the vital work for our regional homeless community. Over \$1215 was raised, and the SJC voted to add an additional \$910 from our hunger and homelessness reserve (funded by our sales of Shopping for Justice grocery cards). We are also happy to report that our combined donation of over \$2125 is eligible for a 1:1 corporate match by a FB&MSH sponsor, for a combined impact of over \$4250. thanks to your generosity.

The Martin Luther King Jr. Interfaith Program on Sunday, January 17th included a call for donations to the Sharon/Stoughton Food Pantry, both staple food items and cash donations, and the effort was guite successful. Additional donations came from the National Day of Service challenge in Sharon. The UCS offered to coordinate the drive, and a tidal wave of bagged items arrived (along with our own ongoing donations), in parallel with numerous monetary donations that were converted into

Shopping for Justice grocery cards for distribution to the clients of the pantry. To date, since the beginning of the Covid last spring, over \$33,000 has been raised in this effort (including the Interfaith Thanksgiving collection, and of course the ongoing month-to-month generosity of the UCS community). Donations have gone to both the Sharon/ Stoughton pantry, as well as 4 additional pantries in the surrounding towns of

Ecumenical Community Food Pantry of Norwood, Inc. 150 Chapel Street Norwood, MA 02062

One of many 'thank you' notes from the staff at one of our local food pantries as they struggle, with our help, to supply the

Canton, Norwood, Walpole and Foxboro. And of course our January Brown E collection supported the Fair The December Brown Envelope collection raised at least Foods relief program in Greater Boston. This has been a truly remarkable outpouring of support for our neighbors in need during a most difficult year; sadly, the needs continue to grow, and we know that the UCS and the wider Sharon community will continue to answer the call.



For the past 32 years, Fair Foods has provided healthy produce to low income families in the greater Boston area with a unique \$2 Bag Program, which goes beyond emergency hunger relief by making an affordable diet of fresh fruits and vegetables a reality. Based throughout Boston, including a key distribution site at First Parish Roxbury (home of our UUUM programs), your support of Fair Foods will have a lasting impact on folx struggling to remain healthy and safe in these troubled times.

SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS

Anti-Racism Working Group offerings:

As stated in the November Newsletter, "Racial injustice is deeply rooted in our culture, and the ongoing work for social justice calls us to examine this problem in all its complexity." The UCS Anti-Racism Working Group plans to continue offering opportunities to engage with this topic on an ongoing basis this year and in the years ahead, recognizing that this work requires a lifelong commitment.

Our current programs focus on the book Caste: The Origins of Our Discontent by Isabel Wilkerson. In the book, Wilkerson "gives us a masterful portrait of an unseen phenomenon in America as she explores, through an immersive, deeply re-



searched narrative and stories about real people, how America today and throughout its history has been shaped by a hidden caste system, a rigid hierarchy of human rankings." (Source: Politics and Prose, an independent bookstore located in Chevy Chase, Washington, D.C.)

Dwight Garner, the chief critic of The New York Times, called Caste "an instant American classic and almost certainly the keynote nonfiction book of the American century thus far."

The program on Caste began with a series of discussion groups in December and January, with a video interview of Isabel Wilkerson by the historian and author John Meacham. We have an opportunity for a congregational read of the book, with group discussion(s) available, including one by **The Not Boring Book Group** at its February 3rd meeting.

During the Meacham interview of Wilkerson, we hear Wilkerson's report that the U.S. is actually built on an unrecognized caste system which has created substantial barriers to those at the bottom of the system, with African Americans being the lowest caste. MainSpring House lunch making program is still a thing....

The SJC has maintained our monthly commitment of assembling and delivering 100 Brown Bag Lunches to the **MainSpring House** homeless shelter in Brockton every month; that's over 1000 meals donated since we last worked together during Coffee Hour in the Vestry last spring. 
