From the Minister



It is with a mixture of sadness and joy that we are saying goodbye to our Congregational Administrator, Linda Cveckova. The sadness we may be feeling is because it is hard to lose such a beloved and essential member of our community. Lin-

da, your warmth and generosity of spirit has always shined through. You excelled at your job - that would have been enough! - but you also always understood that our church is like a family, and we are here to love and support each other in our life journeys. So thank you for being a part of that. And at the same time, we may feel some joy for Linda, who will be in her homeland of Slovakia with her husband Juraj and their three kids for a whole year, immersed in their home culture and surrounded by extended family. Three cheers for Linda! We hope everyone joins us at the (weather-dependent) outdoor service on June 20, as Linda will attend the service that day and say goodbye to people in person, on our church grounds.

As you know, I am planning a four-month parental leave which will start at the end of July, when my baby is due. I will be on leave from July 25 (or so we'll see what happens!) until the end of November, and will return to my role on December 1. We have contracted with Rev. Tricia Brennan, a former interim minister here at UCS, to provide part-time ministerial coverage for this leave. She will begin in August, working limited hours. During August she'll focus on getting oriented, meeting with lay leaders and staff, and planning. Beginning September 5, she will work 20 hours per week. Her duties will consist of: leading worship two to three times per month (depending on if it's a four-Sunday or five-Sunday month), supervising and supporting staff, advising our Board of Trustees, advising and supporting lay leaders, and pastoral care as needed. Her role will be limited as compared to the role I have as your solo minister. That said, her kind and spiritual presence, her decades of experience in UU churches, and her ministerial leadership and guidance, will be an enormous support to the congregation during the four months that I am focused on my family. It helps me prepare for my leave to know that this congregation will be in such good hands.

I wanted to add my heartfelt thanks to our Stewardship Committee for leading an enormously successful 2021 Stewardship Campaign. And to every-

one who pledged, thank you for your generosity. We are rounding out budget season, planning for our next church year and preparing for our Annual Meeting. It is a testament to the strength of this community that our BOT will be able to come before the congregation at the Annual Meeting with a budget proposal for next year that reflects our vision and values as well as your collective commitment to support this church.

From the President

The New Normal for Me

I spent 3 days in the hospital this past month to treat a sudden attack of anemia brought on by a stomach ulcer. Polyp removal in my stomach during a routine endoscopy procedure led to the ulcer. A fainting spell was the warning sign that internal bleeding was reducing my red cell count and not enough oxygen was getting to the brain.

Memory of my time at Beth Israel Needham had two distinct parts: anxiety in the ER while the medical team figured out my problem; starvation because I hadn't eaten in 48 hours. I realized that I was going to be ok after receiving a blood transfusion and IV fluids. But the hunger was going to be with me a while longer because they wanted to repeat the endoscopy and find the source of the bleeding.



I have always had a fear of being hungry and not having enough to eat. In this situation I knew the ordeal would end so best to tough it out even as my stomach grumbled more loudly. During my earliest years in gradeschool I could barely wait for the lunch bell to ring. I worried that my mom's bag lunch might not be enough to fill me.

Even before the Covid pandemic I worried for many who might not have enough to eat. I know that the pandemic has exacerbated this problem for those who lost jobs.

I attended the recent Speak Out session sponsored by Sharon Pluralism Network and learned from social workers that families right here in Sharon are suffering from food shortages.

This fear of hunger has led me to always think of those less fortunate when food shopping and pick up items for

local food pantries. It's one small way that I can help. And I am thankful to our Social Justice Committee for making lunches for MainSpring House and providing "Shopping for Justice" food gift cards – both reminders that there are ways to help make a difference. There is no doubt in my mind that better food equity for all will make the world a happier place.

The Not Boring Book Group meets (via Zoom for now) at 7pm on the first Wednesday of most months.

On June 2nd at 7pm, we will discuss Pulitzer Prize finalist **The Dutch House: A Novel** by Anne Patchett. The novel follows a brother and sister who enjoy a fairy tale life despite their mother's having fled the pressures of managing the household when they were young. When their father dies and leaves his fortune to their stepmother, the kids are left to fend for themselves, going on to

live a drastically different life than they had imagined. The house of their youth haunts them through adulthood, and they want revenge – in an unexpected way.

While the discussion date is TBD at this writing, we've decided to read **Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants** as our summer selection. Botanist Robin Wall Kimmerer was trained to ask questions of nature using the tools of science. A member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, she embraces the notion that plants and animals are

our oldest teachers. Bringing these lenses of knowledge together, she shows that a wider ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgement and

celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. (Think of the Unitarian Universalist 7th Principle: Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.)

Everyone is welcome. Our discussions are lively and June spark a response even if you haven't finished – or even started – the book.



As I write this, the state of Massachusetts prepares for an announcement from the governor that all industries in the state will be allowed to reopen as well as a significant lifting of the face covering mandate. While we were unsure last month what the timeline would be to resume regular church programming,

we are now preparing to run RE as close to "normal" as we can beginning in September! Because vaccination rates of children are uncertain, we plan to hold classes outdoors through October weather permitting.

The RE Committee has been planning some exciting offerings including a Montessori style program for kids K -2, a wizarding social justice class for grades 3-5 and some project based learning for grades 7-8. And OWL? Yes! But we need facilitators! As of this writing the UUA still has no training scheduled so we will need to run programs with volunteers who are already trained. Brown Envelope Collections



For the April Brown E recipients, the SJC selected two organizations, both working in support of environmental justice and resource preservation, with donations being split between them: **Neponset River Watershed Association** (<u>neponset.org</u>), a grassroots, member-supported

conservation group, and GreenRoots

(greenrootschelsea.org), working to achieve environmental justice and greater quality of life in Greater Boston. While some donations may have gone directly to the organizations, we raised \$488 in April, which the SJC rounded up to \$600 so that each group received \$300 of support.

During May, we again supported the **Louis D. Brown Mother's Day Walk for Peace,** which this year was a virtual event (Visit<u>here</u> to view the broadcast). Fundraising will continue until Father's Day at the Sharon Walks for Peace portal at the Peace Institute (<u>https://</u> <u>Ibdpeace.z2systems.com/uusharon2021</u>), but to date we have already raised over \$1900, with an additional \$750 that resulted from a donor 1:1 match to early donations. Your support for this important effort is greatly appreciated.

The June Brown E recipient will be the Massachusetts chapter of **GLSEN** (Gay, Lesbian, Straight Education Network, <u>https://www.glsen.org/chapter/massachusetts</u>). GLSEN Massachusetts is a grassroots initiative, working locally in our communities to ensure safe schools for all students, regardless of sexual orientation and gender identity. There are 43 Chapters around the country doing this important work. Our chapter supports students and educators locally, organizes around LGBTQ-affirming public policy, plans teacher trainings, and hosts events for students, educators, parents, and allies.


Donations to local food pantries over the past 14 months during the Covid crisis have now totaled over \$38,000, a remarkable effort that has benefited countless families in need throughout our neighborhoods. Sadly, the need continues, and your ongoing support is greatly appreciated.

A CONGREGATIONAL INQUIRY – Dismantling racism and other forms of oppression and creating justice and equity for all

The Anti-Racism Working Group is committed to the ongoing work of creating racial justice and practicing Beloved Community here at the Unitarian Church of Sharon and beyond. To help us plan for future conversations, events and action regarding the dismantling of racism and other forms of oppression, we have created an Inquiry Form to find out what types of future activities you would be most interested in attending. It consists of a few multiple-choice questions, followed by questions allowing for longer responses. We hope that you will all take a few moments to respond to at least the multiple-choice questions. The questions mainly focus on 2 topics: 1) the Black Lives Matter banner hung outside our church AND 2) a proposed 8th Principle, first called for by the Black Lives of UU Organizing Collective, which is to be discussed at this year's General Assembly in June. There is much work that lies ahead and we look forward to collaborating with the congregation on these important issues.

Stackable Garden Project Update

The towers are planted! Thanks to Alan Post for assembling the tower structure, to Bri McAlvery and Kathy Farrell for delivering soil, to Karin Hendricks and Tawnya Smith for placing wood chips under the towers, as well as to our growers: Charley and Lauren Grasso, The Quinns, Cooper and Karen Woods, Kate and Dave Slater, Jeff Rose and Barbara Nelkin-Rose, Elizabeth Siftar, and Rory and Beth McGregor. Also, thank you to those who have donated to the project and to Gare Reid and Christine Bulman for their wisdom and support.

Phase One includes the first 6 tower stacks, along with some sack plantings below, and an experiment in the Memorial Garden to raise a *Three Sister's* patch. Phase Two will explore the utilization of rainwater collected from the church roof instead of treated 'city' water, and a drip irrigation array powered by a solar panel for a sustainable footprint.

Update on Indigenous Peoples' Day Proposal for Sharon:



There was strong community support for Indigenous Peoples Day in Sharon at a spring Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Committee (DEIC) meeting (<u>https://</u> www.townofsharon.net/diversity

-equity-inclusion-committee), and the Sharon Select Board is currently considering options for action on this topic. Since it will ultimately need to be brought to a Sharon Town Meeting to make a formal change of this nature, the DEIC had to decide whether they wanted to advise the Select Board on informally changing Columbus Day to Columbus Day/ Indigenous Peoples Day this year. The DEIC unanimously decided against advising the Select Board to do this, given the inherent harm involved in celebrating both holidays together. The DEIC then unanimously decided to advise the Select Board to (1) issue a resolution for October 11, 2021 that would solely recognize Indigenous Peoples Day and (2) to advise the Select Board to sponsor an article for the next town meeting to replace Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples Day. There are currently Massachusetts House and Senate bills pending to accomplish this step at the state level.

Building Up People Not Prisons Update:

Interest remains strong for the reevaluation of the proposed \$50 million women's prison in Norfolk County. Numerous groups are working to organize for racial justice, including working with 2 organizations led by incarcerated women, formerly incarcerated women, and women with incarcerated loved ones - The Building Up People Not Prisons (BUPNP) coalition and Families for Justice as Healing. There are complications and differing views on the best outcome of these efforts, and the SJC and the Anti-Racism Working Group will remain connected to the work in the months ahead as groups look to demonstrate how the funding for the prison could be put to much better and long-lasting results if the money went directly into creating safe and productive communities. While we begin to sort out how things will work as we




move out of Covid restrictions, our monthly commitment to provide bag lunches for MainSpring House remains strong. Currently family teams are signing up to assembling small batches of

New Office Software:

Breeze and Quickbooks

In early Spring a New Business Software taskforce was formed headed by Rory McGregor and Jeff Rose with a primary focus to find a better IT solution for management of RE records. At the same time we decided to look at all the software solutions we are using in the office to see if we can find a better software to match all of our needs.

After a review we concluded that at the end of this fiscal year we will retire the infamous Church Windows software and RE excel spreadsheets and we will move to two new software packages: QuickBooks for accounting and finance, and Breeze to manage membership data, pledges and donations as well as RE data and class attendance.

Not only will the combinations of Breeze and Quickbooks provide much easier and efficient data management for the backoffice, Breeze will also serve as a front office application. That means with Breeze in place each member will be able to login online, use Breeze as an instant directory to lookup information about other congregants, update their contact information and view their pledges and contributions.
