#### From the Parental Leave Minister



I don't have the best sense of direction. So when I started my drive to Sharon in early August I considered consulting my GPS in case I didn't remember the way. "No, come on, you'll remember!!" I quickly said to myself." And once I got through the tricky part

of figuring which way to go on 93 and got myself safely onto RT 95 South, I knew I was okay. Because I was **SURE** that it was **EXIT 10** for Sharon. I've driven on RT. 95 countless times in the past 11 years since finished my interim ministry at UCS, and whenever I'd see Exit 10, I'd think of this congregation, sometimes lifting a hand to wave hello

Imagine my consternation when I discovered Sharon is no longer Exit 10! No one asked me before changing it something not even close to 10!

Things change, don't they? We think we know what's up, we make plans with assurance, we are sure as shooting that we know something, and then....it's different than we thought, it changes without any notice, and we learn/relearn for the umpteenth time that we aren't in control of much of anything. Except how we will respond to what is.

The Delta variant has thrown a wrench into plans for the fall, complicating lots of things, including plans to return to in-person worship. The leadership of this congregation, like so many congregations, has had to grapple with many factors and continued uncertainties to form a plan for a safe opening. This plan is described in the Board President's column on page 3, and I join you in thanking the Safe Reopening Taskforce and Board of Trustees for their thoughtful deliberation. Though our coming together as a community is (wisely) somewhat restricted, it will still be a joy to be together more than has been possible in the past year.

You may be encountering other changes in your lives, from unexpected illnesses to new jobs, from worries about elderly parents to the birth of new babies, from relationship challenges to celebrating milestone wedding anniversaries. And you may also be holding in your heart the reality of Afghanistan and Haiti, the UN report on Climate Change and other pains, griefs and worries. ### From the President



#### Starting Again...

September is the month for new beginnings. UCS Board of Trustees has accepted updated guidelines from our Task Force for Safe Re-opening to allow use of the church buildings. Rev Tricia Brennan, our minister while Rev Jolie is on parental leave, has started planning for worship service to take

place in the sanctuary. Christine Bulman, Director of Religious Education, is doing likewise for family worship service. The date for start of in-person worship will hopefully take place sometime during September. If not by September 12<sup>th</sup>, the first Sunday after Labor Day, our Zoom Team under Jeff Rose will keep us connected online in virtual sanctuary for services. And we will continue the Zoom transmission of our services, even after we start meeting in person for worship

Essential to Safe Re-opening is a set of procedures that keep everyone safe and healthy while worshiping together. You will use a new software application called Breeze to sign up for each in-person service. Ushers will greet you upon arrival at church and manage access into and out of the building. Masking will be required while in the building. Stay tuned for more information as we publish detailed guidelines for safe gathering.

Our church playground is undergoing a transformation. The swings, slides and jungle gym have been removed. Planning for purchase of nine play stations in the vacated space from Creative Playgrounds in Concord NH is well underway. Sean Bisson-Donahue, the project leader, has also recommended bench seating for parents and others to enjoy the ambiance of the new playground. Installation of the stations will take place gradually during the church year. DRE Christine Bulman also plans to use the vacated space for outdoor RE classes.

Buildings & Grounds Committee has purchased two Hathaspace air purifiers which are identical to the models used in Sharon schools. They have been tested in our church buildings since mid-July and confirm that air quality is very good throughout all rooms. Additional units will be purchased as needed to equip each room with its own air purifier when the church resumes full operation indoors

I close this column with mention of several recent joys that you may already know. Rev Jolie give birth to baby daughter Margo on August 4<sup>th</sup>. Rev Tricia Brennan started with us officially on August 1st and told me that our minister's office/study is the bestever! She was the first minister to work in this space back in 2010 when the new building was completed. DRE Christine Bulman has agreed to work with us for an additional year in order to build up the RE program before starting our search for her replacement. And we welcome our new Administrator, De'En Tarkpor, and Youth Ministry Coordinator, Kate Oldshue. What a busy summer it's been!

#### **Our Whole Lives (OWL) Update**

It looks like we will be adolescent OWL this year!! The current plan is to provide OWL classes for all of the 7th, 8th and 9th graders who want it this year. We will do this first by partnering with Franklin for a 7th/8th grade OWL consisting of Sharon 7th graders and Franklin 7th and 8th graders (about 14 total in the group). It looks like we have facilitators in place for this, though we are not quite ready to publish details. Second, we will run an additional OWL class for Sharon 8th and 9th graders. This is also potentially a group of fourteen. As of this writing we have two facilitators who have stepped up to run this as well as a couple of substitutes. Please stay tuned to weekly emails for more information as it becomes available and watch for parent orientation dates.

#### Brown Envelope Collections

The June Brown E recipient was the Massachusetts chapter of **GLSEN** (Gay, Lesbian, Straight Education Network, <u>https://</u> www.glsen.org/chapter/

<u>massachusetts</u>). Our donations totaling \$728, are greatly appreciated.

Throughout the summer break, our Brown Envelope collection during our Lay Led services will go to support the Summer Youth Programs of the **UU Urban Ministry** (uuum.org). You can send in a check to the UCS church with a memo BE Summer 2021, or donate via <u>our website</u>, or pay directly to the Urban Ministry at their <u>website</u>.

Our Brown Envelope collection in September (starting the Sunday after Labor Day) will be directed to our **Partner Church in Gyulakuta**, Transylvania. For many years, our congregation has supported our Partner Church in Gyulakuta. The money we raise via our Brown Envelope Collection in September pays for a musician during their worship service and for a copy of the monthly Romanian Unitarian magazine for each family, as well as other urgent projects. They are enormously grateful for this support. Caution: we only have 3 services in September to support this effort please give soon!

Donations to local food pantries over the past 18 months during the Covid crisis have now totaled \$42,475, a remarkable effort that has benefited countless families in need throughout our neighborhoods. Sadly, the need continues, and your ongoing support is greatly appreciated..

#### A CONGREGATIONAL INQUIRY Dismantling racism and other forms of oppression and creating justice and equity for all

The Anti-Racism Working Group is committed to the ongoing work of creating racial justice and practicing Beloved Community here at the Unitarian Church of Sharon and beyond. To help us plan for future conversations, events and action regarding the dismantling of racism and other forms of oppression, in recent months we have shared an <u>Inquiry Form</u> to find out how the UCS congregation feels about the new Black Lives Banner which was installed in September of 2020, and the proposed 8th Principle circulating in among UUs nationwide, and also about types of future activities you would be most interested in participating in as we make plans for the coming months. The online form remains open to anyone who has not yet shared their views, but here is a summary of what 64 members and friends have already shared.

When asked about their overall reaction to the new BLM banner, 87% welcomed it, 10% had mixed feelings, and 3% would have preferred not to have it installed.

When it came to the banner's impact on one's thoughts and feelings on racism and equality, 81% were greatly or somewhat engaged, while 19% indicated that they were not impacted.

Interest in learning more about the 8th Principle and ways to take "actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions", 94% supported taking action (50% very interested, 44% somewhat).

Responses to proposed specific types of events the ARWG is considering for the coming year will help us to shape the type and duration of programs and activities being considered.

While necessarily anecdotal, individual comments left in response to 'open' questions showed significant patterns: there is widespread interest in examining this topic, with the expected range of opinions across the spectrum. On the impact of the banner, 'proud' was most often used (part of 16 of 54 responses), along with 'inspired', 'reminder of our principles', 'assumed that we would have a BLM banner'; as well as 'waste of money' and that it 'sends a divisive message'.

Questioned about one's feelings towards race and equality in our culture, responses ranged from 'frustrated', 'overwhelmed', 'sad', 'weary' and 'much to learn'.

As for the best means to focus our collective activities, ideas such as a close examination of specific local issues, engaging the youth of the church in the programs, engaging in 'difficult' conversations with facilitators, having white folx stop talking and focus on listening, and exploring linkage to other, related social justice topics ('intersectionality') were all suggested.

Additional comments expressed concern over the limits that Covid restrictions will still have on our collective action, frustration over 'zoom fatigue', and a perceived lack of balance for often overlooked Native American issues.

We greatly appreciate the insights gained from the thoughtful sharing by the UCS community found in this inquiry. There is much work that lies ahead and we look forward to collaborating with the congregation on these important issues. See below for a reflection on the importance of this work as seen by Barbara Nelkin-Rose.

The  $8^{\text{th}}$  Principle: Here is the current version as discussed at GA 2021, with well over 100 UU congregations across the country already endorsing some version of this commitment within their own church communities:

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

#### **Beloved Conversations:**

During this past year, I, along with a few other members from our congregation, as well as Rev. Jolie, have been engaged in a program called Beloved Conversations, designed for Unitarian Universalists seeking to embody racial justice as a spiritual practice.

The curriculum consisted of 6 main sessions, which slowly and methodically offered space for a deep inner dive and focused on the aspect of SPIRITUAL WHOLENESS.

While this approach can certainly be challenging at times, especially in light of the many inequities and injustices that currently exist in our world begging for IMMEDIATE AC-TION, I have come to more deeply understand that the work of creating social justice and dismantling the many forms of oppression that exist both personally and systemically in our world is very complex work and demands BOTH immediate action AND an ongoing commitment to engage in deep conversation and build meaningful relationships, especially with those who we deem different from us. It requires that we become better skilled at

> $\cdot\,$  listening deeply to others' stories with openmindedness and compassion rather than judgment

and dismissal,

 $\cdot\,$  willingness in making ourselves vulnerable in sharing our own stories and recognizing the possible biases we currently hold, and

 $\cdot\,$  developing deep and meaningful connections based on shared power.

One of the primary focuses of the Anti-Racism Working Group this year is to provide space for small discussion groups where we can practice the skills listed above and understand how we can integrate spirituality into social justice work as we truly practice Beloved Community. More information about these groups will be provided in the coming weeks and we encourage you to join us, to share your stories and to let us know what the heart of social justice is for you.

Two such discussion groups are currently being planned around the following topics:

1. Is there a need for an 8<sup>th</sup> Principle as endorsed by Black Lives of UU Organizing Collective, which reads: "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions"?

2. How and when should we celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day, a holiday celebrating and honoring Native American peoples and commemorating their histories and cultures? This will be a lead up to the October 10<sup>th</sup> Worship service honoring Indigenous Peoples Day and will provide space for folks to share their perspectives and understanding around the controversy regarding the October 11<sup>th</sup> holiday, long known as Columbus Day, but now being called Indigenous Peoples' Day in many parts of the country.

Additionally, based on the numerous responses to our Congregational Inquiry, we are hoping to offer a number of other types of events as well, including an ongoing book discussion group on Caste: The Origins of our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson. Last year, a number of congregants read the book and we had a wonderful discussion at the February meeting of the Not So Boring Book Group, however it is a comprehensive and educational book which lends itself to continued discussion and exploration. The plan is that each meeting will focus on a particular chapter or chapters of the book which will allow folks to read the book slowly and attend those meetings they are available for.
