Claudia Fox Tree Program:

Settler-Colonist Ties to Thanksgiving and Columbus: The Indigenous Perspective

If you missed this powerful program on 2 November due to technical problems with the virtual broadcast, there is a limited time opportunity to see it again in full. This was an educational presentation that dispelled inaccurate information, addressed the myths surrounding Thanksgiving and Columbus, and provided missing historical facts from the Indigenous perspective. The presentation transformed what we have been taught about the Indigenous experience and highlighted the resiliency, contributions and enduring impact of First Nations in order to develop a common memory of historical events. We are proud that the Unitarian Universalist Association recognizes the Unitarian Church of Sharon as a Welcoming Congregation. As part of this distinction, and in conjunction with our goal of building the Beloved Community, the Social Justice Committee is pleased to share the news that UCS is deepening our commitment to justice by implementing a long-overdue realignment of the current societal norm of restroom

labels with binary gender signage. A recent unanimous vote by the Board of Trustees has approved the proposed changes, and after a period of time for congregational reflection and discussion, we anticipate making the change to gender-neutral signage for all of our restroom facilities.

Currently, there are two identical but separated 2-stall restrooms upstairs, one for 'women', the other for 'men', along with two single stalls restrooms for anyone to use at the lower level. The proposed plan is to designate all restrooms for "all genders." The bathrooms downstairs can also be used for people who prefer a private space or aren't ready yet for this change.

We anticipate that there will be some who are more comfortable than others with the prospect of sharing a 2stall room with another person of an unknown gender, and this reluctance is understandable, based on our past cultural reluctance to recognize the reality of gender diversity. Our proposed changes will flip the assumptions that so many of us have grown up with, and assert the respect for each individual to use our facilities equally. As a nod to this potential level of discomfort, we propose adding signage outside of the upstairs, 2-stall rooms indicating that there are single stall rooms available on the lower level, giving everyone the opportunity to choose the privacy that a restroom for one person allows. Given the HC access at both levels, and the presence of the elevator, that gives everyone equality of options, and removes the potentially hurtful and disrespectful signage that we currently have in place.

The SJC is planning for a number of opportunities to discuss and reflect on this change in labels in a range of formats, including small groups, Sr and Jr Youth gatherings, and via existing church committees. Depending on what we hear from the congregation, we hope to install the new restroom labels in early 2022. We look forward to hearing everyone's thoughts and reactions to this plan.

Brown Envelope Collections

For October, the Brown Envelope donations supported the **Indigenous Environmental Network** (ienearth.org). IEN was formed by grassroots Indigenous Peoples and individuals to address environmental and economic justice issues. IEN's activities include building the capacity of Indigenous communi-



ties and tribal governments to develop mechanisms to protect our sacred sites, land, water, air, natural resources, health of both our people and all living things, and to build economically sustainable communities. Donations totaled \$503.80 for their work.

Our Brown E recipient during November was the **Gifts for Kids** program, an annual effort to support regional families in economic distress during the holiday season (www.giftsforkidsma.org). Once again, due to Covid19 restrictions, the tradition of shopping for specific children and their wish lists has become a fundraising effort that will allow our community support agencies to help individual families shop for their children this holiday season. If you gave to the program in past years, you likely have received a donation request in the mail. This year, please consider a donation to this worthy program (established over 30 years ago by our own Pat McDougal!), by either sending a check to the church, using our online payment portal, or sending a check directly to GKF.



UCS support for Gifts for Kids was once again strong this year; perhaps we will be able to shop for individual children again in 2022!

The Brown Envelope recipient for December will be **NeighborWorks Housing Solu-**

tions (www.nhsmass.org). Health and well-being start with having a safe and affordable home in a stable and opportunity -rich community, and NeighborWorks promotes these condi-

tions by developing housing, and by providing housing resources and education in collaboration with partners in the public and private sectors. Their services include rental assistance; emergency financial help; shelter and homelessness prevention; first-time homebuyer education and counseling; financial coaching; foreclosure prevention; affordable residential and small business loans; and construction and management of high-quality rental housing across Southern Massachusetts.

During our Christmas Eve service/s this year, whatever Covid will allow, we will once again devote the entire collection that night to the work of **Father Bills & MainSpring House** in Brockton (https://helpfbms.org) to support their work on behalf of the homeless population in our region.

Food Pantry Donations:

Our ongoing special collection for the Sharon/Stoughton Food Pantry, and 4 other local pantries is adjacent towns, has raised over \$47,350 to date. As the Covid pandemic continues to unfold, the needs at our local food pantries continue to expand, and they are grateful for our support. Donations by check to the church are converted to Shopping for Justice grocery cards (and that means that we can increase you donation by the 5% discount that we get from the stores), which the pantries then distribute to their guests. This effort for over 1½ years has been truly astounding – thank you to all who have participated.

And a tip of the hat to Ellen Schoenfeld-Beeks who recently coordinated the drop off of our grocery cards and food stuffs at the Sharon/Stoughton Food Pantry. Ellen made an extra delivery that day of some home baked treats for the devoted staff of the Pantry who work behind the scenes to make the process as helpful as possible for their recipients – we all owe those dedicated volunteers our thanks for their work month after month. Thank you Ellen (& David) for showing them some UU love.
