From the Minister



Dear Ones,

Have you seen the draft of the new Article II of our Unitarian Universalist Association's Bylaws? Article II is the section of the UUA's bylaws where our UU Principles are documented. As we speak, there is a committee of six UUs, the Article II Study Commission, working on completely rewriting that section. It's a historical moment for us as Unitarian Universalists! The committee was officially appointed by our UUA and has been engaged in this process for more than two years now. They have been collecting input from a long list of UU stakeholders including congregational leaders, professional associations, identity groups, philosophical and theological groups, and more. I wanted to offer a snapshot of two of the sections they have come up with so far, in the hopes of getting us more engaged in the process here at UCS.

At General Assembly back in June, the Commission presented two possible new versions of the UUA **Statement of Purpose**:

Draft Purpose A: The UU Association shall devote its resources to and exercise its organizational powers for religious, educational, and humanitarian purposes. Its primary purposes are to equip congregations for vital ministry, to support and train leaders both lay and professional, to heal historic inequities, and to advance UU values in the world. We do all this consistent with our theological pluralism.

Draft Purpose B: The UUA's purpose is to grow and resource faith communities that support people through their lives' journeys and transform the world by liberating ourselves through love. We make that love real through care and justice for ourselves, for our communities, and for the larger web of existence that we are all in. We are called upon to risk ourselves for love.

The two drafts are so different from one another! I am drawn to Draft Purpose B. What about you? And here are the proposed Shared Values of Unitarian Universalism, a proposed new section of our Bylaws. They are intentionally arranged in a circle:



What do you think? I am amazed at how different this would be from our current list of Principles. I hope you save the date to reflect on the proposed changes: On October 30 after the worship service we will gather for a Cottage Meeting on Article II. I hope to see you there!

Brown Envelope Collections

As we had only infrequent and informal gatherings at church on Sunday mornings this summer, there was no regular Brown E

collection for much of July and August. However, some funds were donated, and the **Minister's Discretionary Fund** was chosen as the recipient for this period. In addition, the SJC voted to seed the fund with \$1000 from our discretionary account (primarily our Fair Trade sales income). This fund allows Reverend Jolie to support various needs within the UCS community as well as special cases that come to her attention. Combined, a total of \$1,908 was raised for this important work.

Our Brown Envelope collection in September (starting the Sunday after Labor Day) was directed to our **Partner Church in Gyulakuta, Transylvania**. For many years, our congregation has supported fellow UUs in Romania. The money we raised via our Brown Envelope Collection in September pays for a musician during their worship service and for a copy of the monthly Romanian Unitarian magazine for each family, as well as other urgent projects. They are enormously grateful for this support.

In October the Brown E funds will support **UU The Vote** (uuthevote.org), a nation-wide effort by the UUA to register and educate voters on a broad range of important topics this election season. Focused on a numerous critical social justice ballot measures and combating voter suppression laws that have made it more difficult for people to vote, organizers will host events across the country to engage and mobilize voters in key states. Working with UU State Action Networks and other partners, the goal is to reach 4 million voters before Election Day in November. (Note: in order to expedite our donations, we will make an initial contribution to the program by mid-October, and then follow up with the balance of our funds in early November after our collection is complete). Your generosity for this important work is greatly appreciated.



Food Pantry Donations:

Our ongoing special collection for the Sharon/ Stoughton Food Pantry (and now including the Community Food Pantry managed by the Congregational Church of Sharon), plus 4 other local pantries in adjacent towns, has raised over **\$56,270** in the 2 ¹/₂ years since the economic impact of Covid began to take hold. As the pandemic evolves, the needs at our local food pantries continue, and they are grateful for our support. Donations by check to the church are converted to Shopping for Justice grocery cards (and that means that we can increase your donation by the 5% discount that we get from the stores, equaling more than a \$2,680 boost to date), which the pantries then distribute to their quests. And we of course continue to accept canned and other staple food items in the collection bins at church: kid snacks, canned soups and ready-toeat cereal are especially requested. As we endure the 3rd year of the Covid pandemic and related economic uncertainty, this ongoing effort by our community is making a real difference in the lives of our neighbors. Thank you for your generosity!

MainSpring House lunch making: join in for an intergenerational project on Sunday, 16 October during Coffee Hour as we assemble 90 brown bag lunches for the guests of MainSpring House in Brockton. Each month we send lunches to the shelter, and we need your help to put them together (and to deliver them). Want to help more? Contact Gare Reid (agreed@rcn.com) if you want to be a shopper, or to deliver the boxes of lunches. Do you and your household eat food too? We fundraise to do this with our Shopping for Justice program (S4J), where we ask you to purchase grocery cards from local chain stores for you personal shopping needs. We buy the cards in bulk, and get a 5% discount, which funds the lunch program (your grocery purchases are one-to-one, dollar for dollar, since the 5% donation comes from the stores). Stop by the Social Justice Table in the Vestry during Coffee Hours to learn more about this user-friendly program. And then wash your hands, grab a mask, and find your spot in the assembly line on the 16th!



FT Marketplace – Wednesday, 19 October, 4-6pm

In addition to our Social Justice Table during Coffee Hour each Sunday morning following the services, the SJC will continue to offer our monthly Marketplace for preordered coffee, chocolates, other special food items, as well as S4J grocery cards. As fall arrives, with Halloween in the wings, we will offer pickups on the 3rd Wednesday afternoons each month. Look for an emails to the congregation for details about what, when and how to order. and then stop by the church on 3rd Wednesday afternoons to gather your goods. Thanks for your patronage - all profits support various Social Justice projects and programs, and our S4J program funds the 90 bag lunches that we assemble and send to the MainSpring House homeless shelter in Brockton each month.
