From the Minister



Dear Ones,

Some of you have heard me talk about a daily spiritual practice I observe: my intentions and gratitudes. Every day I send a message to a friend of mine who has agreed to be on the receiving end of these texts. The messages are short and simple, and consist of something I'm grateful for, and something I intend for the day - that's it. She might respond, she might not. It's up to her. I'm satisfied just knowing that someone else knows what I'm feeling thankful for and what I intend each day.

The moment when I sit down to compose this message each day, any number of things can happen. I might draw a total blank. I might have a hundred thoughts scrambling for my attention. I only have two rules for myself: don't overthink it and be honest. I usually start with whichever one comes easiest. Sometimes my intention helps me find my gratitude.

and vice versa. Sometimes my gratitudes are rather mundane, like, I am grateful for this yogurt I am eating right now. Sometimes they are huge, like, I am grateful for planet earth. As for my intentions, sometimes they read like a to-do list, while other times they are more along the lines of "I intend to be kind to myself." And then there are those times when my honest assessment is that I am not feeling grateful for anything and I don't care what happens. In such cases a few moments of mindfulness, paying attention to my breath, or to the sounds I'm hearing around me, can usually help me find my way back to the present, and back to some bit of real gratitude or guiet intention.

I got the idea for this in part from something I learned about in seminary: an Ignatian spiritual practice known as the Daily Examen. Based on the teachings of the 16th-century Spanish Saint Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuit order, the Examen is an exercise to prayerfully review one's thoughts, desires, and actions at the end of the day. Jesuits, and others who observe this practice, reflect on which moments of their days brought them closer to God, and which moments distanced them from God. I was intrigued when I learned about the Examen and tried something like it for one of my seminary classes. At the end of each day, I would ask myself: when was I aware of my part in the interdependent web, when did I feel my connection to the whole human family? When did I feel disconnected? It was very difficult to keep up such a practice. I could rarely remember moments that were usually quite fleeting, and the questions I was posing for myself were way too broad. I have found that, rather than looking back in search of something, to instead start my day with gratitude and intention has helped me cultivate more simple moments of connection on a daily basis.

I wanted to share this in some detail with you all because I know that it can be hard to find a meaningful daily practice that fits into our lives. I wonder, what have you tried? What would you like to try, to find your way to deeper connection?

I would be really sorry that our kids didn't get to experience the sex-positive, responsible message of the Our Whole Lives human sexuality curriculum. I would miss Revels.

We know we would miss movie night and potlucks and Conversations at the Meetinghouse because we DID miss them during the height of the pandemic. I know I would miss the affectionate smiles of Forbesy and Dinah and Ellen and Gary and Janet and Rory and John at choir practice and Jennifer's laugh and the frown on Colleen's face as she notices dust on the pulpit or a bit of fluff on the carpet. Brown Envelope Collections

UPDATE: The December Brown give a shout-of E donations, reported last month shopping trip! as \$964 for the UU Urban Minis-

try (uuum.org), has been corrected to the new tally of \$1,189 overall (a few quarters recently found under the sofa cushions...).

For the January 2023 Brown Envelope collection, the SJC chose World Central Kitchen (www.wck.org), with a focus on their efforts to feel those suffering in Ukraine; a total of \$1,712 was collected. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

The February Brown Envelope donations joins our ongoing commitment to support the work of local food pantries during this extended period of great food insecurity for many of our neighbors. With an emphasis on the Sharon/Stoughton Food Pantry, serving clients in both towns, and including additional pantries in Foxboro, Walpole, Canton, Norwood and another pantry based in the Congregational Church in Sharon, donations will be converted to grocery cards at local stores through our Shopping for Justice program.

Since the spring of 2020 when Covid first struck, our collective fundraising for local food pantries has resulted in over \$60,000 in donations. This amazing sum has had a tremendous impact on this crisis, but the need remains, and your donations are greatly appreciated.

We buy the cards in bulk, and get a 5% discount, which funds the lunch program (your grocery purchases are one-to-one, dollar for dollar, since the 5% donation comes from the stores). And then wash your hands, grab a mask, and find your spot in the assembly line on the 12th!




WE WELCOME YOUR INPUT






